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School of Medicine wins education grant

The University of Nevada School of Medicine learned last week that it has been chosen to receive a \$10,000 grant from Partners for Quality Education (PQE) for its medical residency programs that focus on managed care training.

Dr. Robert M. Daugherty, dean of the medical school, received word from PQE that 132 institutions, "including some of the country's most prestigious academic centers, submitted applications," but that only 54 would receive the grants. As a grantee, the school will be an Associate Partner in a PQE initiative to link academic medicine with managed care plans in order to address quality care issues.

Additionally, the school will receive support to send a representative to that organization's conferences. The next one will be held February 11 – 13 in Chicago, and the School of Medicine will send Professor of Medicine Dr. Louis Morrow, Associate Dean for Medical Education. The school also will be given access to on-line managed care curricular materials and job placement for residents. The initiative's goal is to create "teaching HMOs" – structures for medical education that teaches young physicians to deliver the best quality care in managed care settings.

According to Dr. Tracy Veach, Associate Dean for Educational Affairs, who wrote the grant proposal, "The school will be conducting a five-month collaborative planning project with Sierra Health Services to develop an ambulatory teaching clinic for primary care, internal medicine, and pediatric residents. The goal is to create a new teaching environment for the future."

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The University of Nevada School of Medicine learned last week that it has been chosen to receive a \$10,000 grant from Partners for Quality Education (PQE), which is funded by a PEW Charitable Trust and is modeled on Harvard-Pilgrim Health Care's teaching HMO. The initiative's goal is to create "teaching HMOs" – structures for medical education that teaches young physicians to deliver the best quality care in managed care settings. The medical school is already involved in this, and the funding will allow the school to expand its efforts. The grant will fund residency programs in internal medicine and pediatrics.

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
