



Dear Mr. Cribley,

Thank you for the notification of the proposed fence project between your District and the Carson City District. At this time it appears that I will be unable to attend the field tour due to previous commitments. However, I do have some concerns which I would like addressed in the EA that will need to be prepared for proposed fence.

Please provide the following information and include these concerns as issues to be addressed in the EA.

- 1) Map depicting herd area boundaries versus placement of fence.
- 2) Wild horse distribution and movement data and if the proposed fence will affect normal or historical movement of the herds.
- 3) Location of water source for wild horses and if the proposed fence will affect normal or historical access to those waters.
- 4) If the fence will be affecting the herds in any manner please provide the proposed mitigation for wild horses.
