BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT, 12 13 Respondent 14 MOTION FOR REFERRAL OF APPEAL TO HEARING OFFICER 15 Appellant Nevada Commission for the Preservation of Wild Horses (COMMISSION) 16 hereby moves the Board for referral of its appeal in this matter to the Hearings Division, for 17 consolidation with the COMMISSION's separate appeal from the grazing decision for the 18 Henrie Complex. 19 This appeal is from a wild horse gather on October 1994 which reduced the size of 20 the Meadow Valley Wild Horse Herd in Nevada's Caliente Resource Area from 269 animals 21 to 15.1 The gather was in ostensible response to a wild fire which burned approximately 21 22 percent of the Meadow Valley Herd Management Area. 23 In a separate grazing appeal, see Appeal no. NV-050-94-05, the COMMISSION 24 challenged BLM's grazing decision for the same affected area. The COMMISSION in that 25 appeal charges BLM was only able to deliver up forage authorized for livestock by 26 27 The Board's clerk was unable to provide appellant's counsel with the number of the captioned case. eliminating wild horses from the area, and that therefore the grazing decision is inequitable, arbitrary, contrary to law and should be set aside.

The COMMISSION has furnished evidence in the separate grazing appeal to show the gather was conducted at the request of and for the economic benefit of the operator, not because a fire rendered the gather necessary. *See* letter dated June 27, 1994, from Richard M. Leonard to Catherine Barcomb, attached as Exhibit A ("B.L.M in reviewing the sale and at the buyers [sic] request to transfer of the allotment, did a horse and burro gather"). BLM nonetheless persists in its effort to dismiss or vacate the COMMISSION's grazing appeal, and currently has pending a motion with the hearing officer to so dispose of the it; but clearly a hearing is necessary to deal with the factual circumstances underlying the decision.

The two appeals are two sides of the same coin. They arise from the same set of circumstances, and affect the same habitat. They are both highly fact-dependent, and deserve a full hearing. To conserve resources of all involved, their hearing should be consolidated.

The COMMISSION therefore hereby requests that its appeal from the Meadow Valley Mountain Herd Management Emergency Removal Plan, Record of Decision and Environmental Assessment, docketed by the Board, be referred to the Hearings Division and consolidated with the COMMISSION's separate appeal from the grazing decision for the Henrie Complex, for the purpose of one consolidated factual hearing on all aspects of BLM actions respecting the forage resource on the affected allotments. See Animal Protection Institute of America, 118 IBLA 345 (1991).

Dear Mr. Leach:

Recently members of the Ely District and the Caliente Field Office have been discussing issues related to the Meadow Valley Mountain Herd Management Area (HMA) and the Henrie Complex Allotment with you. I understand that the resolution of issues associated with this HMA in addition to setting appropriate management levels (AML's) on all HMA's in the Caliente area are important to the Commission for the Preservation of Wildhorses as well as to the Bureau of Land Management. The Ely District has therefore developed a schedule for completing multiple use decisions for HMA's administered out of the Caliente Field Office beginning in 1996 and 1997.

During 1996 we are concentrating on completing and issuing allotment evaluations and multiple use decisions for the Clover Mountain and Clover Creek HMA's. Upon completion, this will establish an AML for both of these HMA's. Currently the allotment evaluations and multiple use decisions associated with these HMA's are in various stages of completion.

Regarding the status of the Meadow Valley Mountain HMA and the Henrie Complex Allotment, we intend to begin and complete the allotment evaluation process during 1997. This will include issuing the multiple use decision which will result in the establishment of an AML for wild horses within the Meadow Valley Mountain HMA. During 1996 additional monitoring data will also be collected on the Meadow Valley Mountain HMA and the Henrie Complex Allotment which will be incorporated into the allotment evaluation.
