

Dear Mr. Nelson:

Thank you for your invitation to kin in a discussion of land management problems and issues confronting national resourceslands in the Cherry Creek Planning Area. We regret at this time, that none of us can attend in person.

This organization is committed to the welfare of wild horses and burros on the public lands, now required by law to be considered in the area where presently found, as an integral part of the natural system of the public lands. Since they are to be managed in a manner to achieve and maintain a thriving natural ecological balance with other public land users, we respectfully request that their welfare be kept in mind, and that your planning recommendations be aimed toward that goal. We have grave concerns over the commercial over-exploitation that has, in many instances, done irreparable damage to our public land resource, and we trust your planning will result in a curtailment of such mommercial over-exploitation, and that public values will be given greater consideration that the economic return to profit-seeking indmividuals or concerns.
