NOTICE OF FINAL DECISION

Bertrand Paris and Sons SR 1 Box 26 Ely, NV 89301

Dear Mr. Paris:

On March 9, 1994, you withdrew your previous grazing application (dated 2/16/94) for grazing use on the public lands of the Medicine Butte Allotment (0501) and submitted a second grazing application for a total of 12,583 AUMs (5,361 AUMs cattle and 7,222 AUMs sheep) for the 1994-1995 grazing year.

I have considered your second application for grazing use on the public lands on the Medicine Butte Allotment. It is my determination that both applications are sufficiently similar to be treated the same. Therefore, it is my decision to reject and deny your second grazing application dated March 9, 1994 in its entirety.

The reason for my decision to reject and deny your application is the same as stated in the Notice of Proposed Decision issued 2/25/94. The re-evaluation of monitoring data continues to support the adjustments identified in the Final Multiple Use Decision (FMUD). Also, you failed to include any additional pertinent information or documentation to dispute the original FMUD issued 2/3/92. The issue was included in the FMUD dated February 3, 1992 for the Medicine Butte Allotment. This decision adjusted the active preference on the Medicine Butte Allotment from 15,174 AUMs active preference to 7,232 AUMs active preference (3,557 AUMs for cattle and 3,675 AUMs for sheep). This reduction in active preference was phased-in over a five year implementation period as required in the Code of Federal Regulations. The reduction was proportioned in equal one third increments beginning in 1992 (Year 1), the year the final

decision was issued, and in 1994 (Year 3) and 1996 (Year 5). It also established nine use areas, season of use by use area and total livestock preference by use area. The decision also established the Appropriate Management Level (AML) for wild horses on the Medicine Butte Allotment at 80 horses yearlong (956 AUMs). No appeals were received during the 30 days allowed for filing an appeal.

As per the FMUD, the authorized livestock use effective 3/1/92 is as follows:

^{*} A domestic horse preference of 180 AUMs can be substituted for an equal amount of sheep and/or cattle AUMs in all the Snow Creek Seedings combined. Any use made by domestic horses would reduce the use allocated to livestock within the three Snow Creek Seeding pastures.

Livestock grazing use for the grazing year 1994-1995 will be consistent with the active preference of 9,906 AUMs (4,458 AUMs for cattle and 5,448 AUMs for sheep) as specified for year 3. The adjustment identified for years 3 and 5 shall continue to be implemented. Your applications dated February 16,1994 and March 9, 1994 were for the year 1 level and therefore not consistent with the FMUD dated February 3, 1992.

The authority for this decision is contained in Title 43 of the Code of Federal Regulations, which states in pertinent part:

4110.3: "The authorized officer shall periodically review the grazing preference specified in a grazing permit or grazing lease and may make changes in the grazing preference status. These changes shall be supported by monitoring, as evidenced by rangeland studies conducted over time, unless the change is either specified in an applicable land use plan or necessary to manage, maintain or improve rangeland productivity."

4110.3-2(b): "When monitoring shows active use is causing an unacceptable level or pattern of utilization or exceeds the livestock carrying capacity as determined through monitoring, the authorized officer shall reduce active use if necessary to maintain or improve rangeland productivity..."

4110.3-2(c): "Where active use is reduced it shall be held in suspension..."

4110.3-3(a): "Changes in active use in excess of 10 percent shall be implemented over a 5-year period..."

4110.3-3(b): "After consultation, coordination and cooperation, suspensions of preference shall be implemented through a documented agreement or decision. If data acceptable to the authorized officer are available, an initial reduction shall be taken on the effective date of the agreement or decision and the balance taken in the third and fifth years following the effective date..."

4130.6-1(a): "The authorized officer shall specify the kind and number of livestock, the period(s) of use, the allotment(s) to be used, and the amount of use, in animal unit months, for every grazing permit or lease. The authorized livestock grazing use shall not exceed the livestock carrying capacity as determined through monitoring and adjusted as necessary under 4110.3, 4110.3-1 and 4110.3-2."

APPEAL:

If you wish to appeal this final decision for the purpose of a hearing before an Administrative Law Judge, in accordance with 43 CFR 4.470, you are allowed thirty (30) days from receipt of this notice within which to file an appeal with the Egan Area Manager, BLM, Ely District Office, HC 33, Box 33500, Ely, Nevada 89301-9408. The appeal should state the reasons, clearly and concisely, why you think the final decision is in error.
