The grazing regulations require consultation, cooperation, and coordination with affected permittees or lessees, the State having lands or responsible for managing resources within the area, and the interested public prior to the issuance or renewal of grazing permits or leases. The transfer of livestock grazing privileges to another permittee includes the issuance of a grazing permit. Therefore, to comply with the consultation requirements of the grazing regulations, the following decision is being issued:

AREA MANAGER'S PROPOSED DECISION

In October 1995, the Bureau received your application to transfer grazing privileges in the Utah/Nevada (South) Allotment from Charles R. Kippen and Sons to Sherie Rae Goring. The request for transfer is based on a three (3) year lease between the above parties. The following is the extent of the permitted use proposed to be transferred.

The base property for the grazing permit was also redescribed in the transfer application. See the enclosed map for the location of the allotment.

Sherie Rae Goring would be the sole permittee in the Utah/Nevada (South) Allotment. The grazing permit for this allotment has historically had 3,249 suspended nonuse AUMs, which are now documented in the Terms and Conditions of the grazing permit.

The Wells Resource Management Plan Record of Decision (RMP/ROD), which addressed public lands in this allotment, was signed July 16, 1985. The Utah/Nevada (South) Allotment was classified as an "M" (maintain) allotment, which means maintain the allotment in its current satisfactory condition. The initial stocking rate for this allotment, as stated in the Rangeland Program Summary issued on September 15, 1986, is the current permitted use.

Implementation of grazing use adjustments, if necessary, would be implemented based upon monitoring evaluations. A monitoring evaluation of the allotment is scheduled for 1996.

The Utah/Nevada (South) Allotment has been one of three pastures included in an allotment management plan (AMP) licensed under Charles R. Kippen and Sons. In 1992, the North pasture and the Silver Island pasture (in Utah) were transferred to other sheep operators. As a result of these transfers, the permittees requested and were granted temporary deviations from pasture rotations described in the AMP. Permanent changes to the AMP will be made, as appropriate, through the allotment evaluations.

It is my proposed decision to approve the application to transfer grazing privileges and the associated three year grazing permit (enclosed and described below).

Terms and Conditions

Suspended nonuse associated with the Utah/Nevada (South) Allotment is 3,249 AUMs.

The above grazing schedule is annual use authorized as a temporary deviation from the Utah/Nevada No. 1 AMP, pending completion of the allotment evaluation and decision process. Payment of grazing fees will be made prior to livestock turnout.

Actual use will be submitted to this office within 15 days of livestock removal.

Supplemental feeding is limited to salt, mineral and/or protein supplements in block, granular or liquid form. Such supplements must be placed at least 1/4 mile from live waters (springs, streams and troughs), wet or dry meadows, and aspen stands.

All riparian exclosures, including spring development exclosures, are closed to livestock grazing unless specifically authorized.

Payment of grazing fees is due on or before the due date specified on the grazing bill. Failure to pay the grazing bill within 15 days of the due date specified on the bill shall result in a late fee assessment of \$25.00 or 10 percent of the grazing bill, whichever is greater, but not to exceed \$250.00

Approval of the transfer and permit is consistent with the Wells Resource Management Plan. The transferee, Sherie Rae Goring, meets all qualifications of 43 CFR 4110.1, 4110.2-1, 4110.2-2 and 4110.2-3.

Any applicant, permittee, lessee or other affected interest may protest this proposed decision under 43 CFR 4160.1, in person or in writing to Bill Baker, Area Manager, P. O. Box 831, Elko, Nevada, 89803 within 15 days after receipt of the decision. The protest, if filed, should clearly and concisely state the reason(s) as to why the proposed decision is in error.

In the absence of a protest, the proposed decision will become the final decision of the authorized officer without further notice unless otherwise provided in the proposed decision.

Any applicant, permittee, lessee or other person whose interest is adversely affected by the final decision may file an appeal and petition for stay of the decision pending final determination on appeal. The appeal and petition for stay must be filed in the office of the authorized officer, as noted above, within 30 days following receipt of the final decision, or 30 days after the date the proposed decision becomes final.

The appeal shall state the reasons, clearly and concisely, why the appellant thinks the final decision is in error.

Should you wish to file a motion for stay, the appellant shall show sufficient justification based on the following standards:

- (1) The relative harm to the parties if the stay is granted or denied.
- (2) The likelihood of the appellant's success on the merits.
- (3) The likelihood of immediate and irreparable harm if the stay is not granted, and
- (4) Whether the public interest favors granting the stay.

As noted above the petition for stay must be filed in the office of the authorized officer.



THE ABOVE GRAZING SCHEDULE IS ANNUAL USE AUTHORIZED AS A TEMPORARY DEVIATION FROM THE UTAH/NEVADA NO. 1 AMP, PENDING COMPLETION OF THE ALLOTMENT EVALUATION AND DECISION PROCESS. PAYMENT OF GRAZING FEES WILL BE MADE PRIOR TO LIVESTOCK TURNOUT.

ACTUAL USE WILL BE SUBMITTED TO THIS OFFICE WITHIN 15 DAYS OF LIVESTOCK REMOVAL.

SUPPLEMENTAL FEEDING IS LIMITED TO SALT, MINERAL AND/OR PROTEIN SUPPLEMENTS IN BLOCK, GRANULAR OR LIQUID FORM. SUCH SUPPLEMENTS MUST BE PLACED AT LEAST 1/4 MILE FROM LIVE WATERS (SPRINGS, STREAMS, AND TROUGHS), WET OR DRY MEADOWS, AND ASPEN STANDS.

ALL RIPARIAN EXCLOSURES, INCLUDING SPRING DEVELOPMENT EXCLOSURES, ARE CLOSED TO LIVESTOCK USE UNLESS SPECIFICALLY AUTHORIZED IN WRITING BY THE AREA MANAGER.

Subject: Proposed Decision - Utah/Nevada

Dear Mr. Baker:

The Commission for the Preservation of Wild Horses appreciates making comments to decisions concerning the transfer of this permit. It was uncertain if this allotment has winter key areas were delineated in the Wells Wild Horse Amendment. We would appreciate some clarification concerning this issue.

The Antelope Herd Management Plan assured the Commission that livestock stocking rates and wild horse appropriate management levels would be established by allotment evaluations/multiple use decisions. As proposed the transfer does not established allowable use levels or utilization limits for winter key forage species, necessary for evaluations or environmental assessments. If wild horse appropriate management levels are to be established, then similar limitations should be set for each allotment for other users.

It would appear the season of use may conflict with the critical growing season for key winter forage species with the Resource Area.

We would appreciate your attention on this matter.

This letter is in response to your correspondence of November 21, 1995, concerning the 3-year lease on the Utah/Nevada Allotment and the transfer of the permit on the West Whitehorse Allotment. We do not construe your letters as protests, but asking for clarification. We would like to take this opportunity to clarify your points about the Allowable Use Levels and Appropriate Management Levels.

The Utah/Nevada Allotment does fall within the Antelope Valley Herd Management Area combined winter use areas by wild horses and livestock as depicted on map 2 and 5 of the Proposed Wells Resource Management Plan Wild Horse Amendment and Environmental Assessment. The decision concerning this lease does not set allowable use levels nor appropriate management levels for livestock or wild horses. This will be done through the allotment evaluation and multiple use decision process.

The West Whitehorse Allotment also falls within the Antelope Valley Herd Management Area combined winter use areas, however wild horse use in this allotment is incidental and the last four years of aerial census data have not shown any wild horses in the allotment. Once again, allowable use levels and appropriate management levels will be set through the multiple use decision process.
