

RESULTS OF INVESTIGATION OF ANY HUMAN HEALTH CONSEQUENCES  
OF THE UREA SPILL

There were no human health consequences of the urea spill. There was one allegation of human health consequence which upon investigation was shown to be without merit. John Deck, a REECO teamster who claimed that he was ill on November 1, and 2, 1988, claimed to have drunk the water that made the horses sick. Deck claimed that he rinsed his mouth with water from his water-pull truck on November 1 and 2, 1988 (the water-pull trucks are normally filled at the construction sumps).

However, it was impossible that John Deck could have drunk the urea contaminated water on November 1 or 2, 1988. According to Deck's signed statement and reports from supervision, John Deck left work and the TTR at 12:30 on November 2, 1988 because he wasn't feeling well. AT 4:00 p.m. on November 2, 1988 the truck and the urea that was to become involved in the urea spill accident was still parked in its normal parking place at Building 186.
