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### PART 1

### LANDS OF THE UNITED STATES AND POSSESSIONS

Including Alaska and Hawaii, the gross area of the United States is 2.3 billion acres. (Less than 2 percent of this is inland water surface; see table 1.) The Federal Government has, at various times in U.S. history, held title to about four-fifths of the Nation's gross area. Today, Federal civil and defense agencies administer about 762 million acres, or about one-third of the gross area (table 7).

The Bureau of Land Management has exclusive responsibilities for about 60 percent, or 448 million acres, of Federally-owned lands (table 10). More than half of this area is in the State of Alaska.

Other major land holding agencies in the Department of the Interior include the National Park Service, Fish and Wildlife Service, and Bureau of Reclamation. The Forest Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture, has jurisdiction over 24 percent of the total Federally-owned land.

Up to the present, title to approximately 1.1 billion acres has been transferred to individual citizens, business and non-Federal governmental organizations under Federal legal authority generally referred to individual citizens, business and non-Federal governmental organizations under Federal legal authority generally referred to as the "land laws." Substantial portions, amounting to 278 million acres, were removed from Federal ownership by authority of the Homestead Laws. Another 328 million acres were granted to States to help support public schools, develop transportation systems, and for general economic development (table 4).

In western Oregon an area of 2.6 million acres comprise the O&C lands. Originally public domain, this acreage was reconveyed and revested to the United States from grants made to private concerns to construct the Oregon and California Railroad and the Coos Bay Military Wagon Road.

#### DEFINITIONS OF TERMS

### Acquired land:

Lands in Federal ownership which are not public lands. Acquired lands were obtained by the Government through purchase, condemnation or gift, or by exchange for purchased, condemned or donated lands, or for timber on such lands.

#### Disposition:

A transaction which leads to the transfer of title of public lands, and/or resources upon or in these lands, from the Federal Government.

#### Inland water area:

Includes permanent inland water surface, such as lakes, ponds, and reservoirs having acres or more of area; streams, sloughs, estuaries, and canals 1/8 of a statute mile or more in width; deeply indented embayments and sounds, and other coastal waters behind or sheltered by headlands, or islands separated by less than 1 nautical mile of water, and islands having less than 40 acres of area.

#### Land area:

Includes dry land and land temporarily or partially covered by water, such as marsh land, swamps and river flood plains; streams, sloughs, estuaries, and canals less than ½ of a statute mile in width; and lakes, reservoirs, and ponds having less than 40 acres of water-surface area.

#### National forest:

A designated area of reserved Federal land, set aside for timber, watershed or a variety of purposes determined by the natural resource values involved and administered and managed by the Forest Service in the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

#### O&C lands:

Public lands in western Oregon which were granted to the Oregon Central railroad companies (later the Oregon & California Railroad Company) to aid in the construction of railroads, but which were later forfeited and returned to the Federal Government by revestment of title. The term "O&C" lands as often used includes reference also to the reconveyed Coos Bay Military Wagon Road lands, which are public lands in western Oregon that were once granted to the State of Oregon to aid in the construction of the Coos Bay Military Wagon Road, but were later forfeited and returned to Federal ownership by reconveyance.

# PART 2

# BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT PROGRAM OPERATIONS

#### LAND DISPOSITION AND USE

Under the nonmineral public land laws, the Bureau administers some 451 million acres of Federally-owned lands. In so doing, the Bureau issued 1,072 patents during fiscal year 1975 which transferred 806,927 acres of public lands from Federal ownership (table 15). There were also 822 original entries and selections covering 11,761,718 acres and 513 final entries covering 728,390 acres (tables 13 and 14). Patents or certificates were issued for 40 homesteads which involved 3,847 acres (table 15). The total of other patents and certifications was 1,032 and these covered 803,080 acres (table 16).

As of June 30, 1975, there were 63,283,754 acres of patented lands on which the minerals were reserved to the United States. A total of 80,945 acres was patented with minerals reserved to the United States during 1975 (table 17).

The Bureau of Land Management allowed homestead entries on 1,868 acres (table 13) during 1975 and 3,847 acres (table 15) of homesteads were patented during the same period.

In 1975, 65,310 acres of Federal lands were exchange for 94,-287 acres of State or private land (table 26).

During the same period 267,605 acres were withdrawn from all forms of entry, while withdrawals were revoked on 133,093 acres (table 27).

On June 30, 1975, there were 127 small tract leases covering 351 acres in effect. The annual rental paid to the Bureau for these leases was \$12,973; 12 of these leases covering 20 acres were issued during the past year; 26 small tracts covering 49 acres were sold in the same period (table 31).

Special land use permits covering 1,838,070 acres were in effect as of June 30, 1975. Rentals of \$229,998 were charged for 432,738 of these acres (table 32).

There were 1,341 miscellaneous leases in effect on June 30, 1975, covering 171,145 acres. The annual rental for these leases was \$247,863 (table 33).

On June 30, 1975, there were 7,525 unperfected entries pending involving 5,662,321 acres (table 23).

# DEFINITIONS OF TERMS

#### Acquired land:

Lands in Federal ownership which are not public lands as defined below, acquired lands having been obtained by the Government through purchase, condemnation or gift, or by exchange for purchased, condemned or donated lands, or for timber on such lands.

## Carey Acts:

The acts of August 18, 1894 (28 Stat. 372), and March 15, 1910 (36 Stat. 237, 43 U.S.C. sec. 643), which provide for grants of desert lands to States for disposition to bona fide settlers.

#### Ceded Indian lands:

Public lands, Indian tribal title to which was relinquished to the United States by the Indians on condition that part or all of the proceeds from their sale or other disposition would be covered into the Treasury in trust for the Indians.

#### Certification:

The act of final approval of a State selection by the Director; also, the document which passes title to the selected lands to the State; also, a document which attests to the truth or authenticity of papers attached to it.

#### Disposition:

A transaction which leads to the transfer of public lands and/or resources in these lands, from the Federal Government.

#### Entry:

An application to acquire title to public lands:

#### Entry allowed:

An application to acquire title to public lands which has been approved, either as an

# Original entry:

Where the applicant is permitted to proceed with earning title to the land or as a

## Final entry:

Where all the requirements of law and regulations have already been complied with. A final entry may be a

#### Cash entry:

Where the entryman pay cash or its equivalent, or a

## Commuted entry:

When the entryman pays the statutory price for the lands, in consideration for reduction of residence and improvement requirements.

#### Entry unperfected:

An original entry has been allowed, but the entryman has not met all of the requirements of the law and/or regulations to permit him to make final entry for patent.

#### Exchange:

A transaction whereby the Federal Government receives land in exchange for other land and/or timber.

### Private exchange:

An exchange between the Federal Government and any landowner other than a State.

#### State exchange:

An exchange between the Federal Government and a State.

#### Taylor Act exchange:

An exchange which is consummated under the provisions of section 8 of the Taylor Grazing Act.

#### Federal land:

All classes of land owned by the Federal Government.

#### Isolated tract:

A parcel of vacant public lands, not exceeding 1,520 acres, which is surrounded by appropriated lands.

#### Patent:

A document which conveys legal title to public land.

#### Pittman Act entry:

An entry of public lands in Nevada made by an individual or association of individuals who earned the right to acquire title to the lands through discovery of underground sources of water.

#### Public auction:

A sale of lands through competitive, usually oral, bidding.

## Public land or public domain lands:

Original public domain lands which have never left Federal ownership; also, lands in Federal ownership which were obtained by the Government in exchange for public lands or for timber on public lands.

## Public purpose:

Any authorized activity undertaken by a government agency or unit; also, any activity which serves the interest of the general public consistent with public policy.

# Reclamation homestead entry:

An entry initiated under the act of June 17, 1902 (32 Stat. 338; 43 U.S.C., sec. 43 et seq.), which provides for the issuance of patents to entrymen who settle upon and improve agricultural public lands, not exceeding 160 acres in size, within reclamation projects.

#### Reclamation sale:

Sale of excess or nonirrigable public lands within reclamation projects.

## Recreational entry:

A cash entry for public ladds by a State, country, municipality, or other local governmental agency, or by a nonprofit organization, which are to be used for recreational purposes.

#### Reservation:

A withdrawal, usually of a permanent nature; also, any Federal lands which have been dedicated to a specific public purpose.

#### Reserved land:

Federal lands which are dedicated or set aside for a specific public purpose or program, and which are, therefore, generally not subject to disposition under the operation of all the public land laws.

#### Restoration:

An action, concurrent with or following a revocation, which affects the opening to disposition of public lands in a withdrawal; also, in respect to ceded Indian lands, an action which returns lands to tribal ownership.

#### Revocation:

Generally, an action which cancels a previous official act; specifically, an action which cancels a withdrawal.

#### Selection:

In general, an application to acquire title to public lands which is submitted by an applicant who acquired the right to apply for such lands by receipt of a grant surrender of his own lands in an exchange, by relinquishment of his rights to other lands (lieu selection), by surrender of scrip or by similar means.

#### Small tract:

A parcel of public lands of 5 acres or less which has been found chiefly valuable for sale or lease as a home, recreation, business, or community site under the act of June 1, 1938 (53 Stat. 609; 43 U.S.C. 682 a-c), as amended.

# Special land use permit:

A permit which authorizes the use of public lands for purposes not specifically authorized, or forbidden, by law.

# Vacant public land:

Public land or public land which is not reserved, appropriated, or set aside for a specific or designated purpose.

## Withdrawal:

An action which restricts the disposition of public lands and which holds them for specific public purposes; also, public lands which have been dedicated to public purposes.



# PART 2

# BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT PROGRAM OPERATIONS

#### FOREST MANAGEMENT

The Bureau of Land Management is responsible for the management, development, and protection of more than 23 million acres of commercial forest land (tables 34 and 35).

Of the total, 1,991,000 acres in western Oregon are generally recognized to be one of the Nation's most productive and valuable commercial forest properties. During 1975 approximately 1,158,660 MBF of timber, valued at \$186 million, were sold (table 38).

Over 1 billion board feet of timber, valued at more than \$192 million, were sold from the public lands during 1975 (table 42).

Reforestation accomplishments totaled 32,144 acres planted and seeded during 1975 (table 47).

#### DEFINITIONS OF TERMS

#### Allowable cut:

The volume of timber that may be harvested annually from a well managed and regulated forest property.

#### Access roads:

Mainline roads constructed primarily to facilitate the removal of timber from forest areas, and financed by appropriated funds.

### Commercial forest land:

Lands growing stands of forest trees which possess present or potential merchantable value.

## Cord:

A standard unit of measurement of round or split wood filling a stack  $4 \times 4 \times 8$  feet and occupying approximately 128 cubic feet, commonly used in measuring fuel or pulpwood.

#### Forest cover:

All trees and other woody plants in the forest.

#### Master unit:

A sustained yield operating area for which an allowable cut has been computed.

## MBM or MBF of M bd. ft.:

Thousand board feet. The board foot is a unit of lumber measurement 1 foot long, 1 foot wide, and 1 inch thick, or its equivalent. It is the standard

unit of measurement in the logging and lumber industry by which standing timber is measured and sold, and manufactured lumber is merchandized.

# Producing capacity:

The amount of wood fiber which forest land is capable of growing.

#### Right-of-way:

A permit or an easement which authorizes the use of lands for certain specified purposes, as the construction of forest access roads.

#### Sawtimber:

Trees that will yield logs suitable in size and quality for the production of lumber.

#### Set aside sales:

A timbered area designated for sale on which bidding is limited to small business concerns as defined by the Small Business Administration in its regulations under the authority of section 15 of the Small Business Act of July 18, 1958.

## Sustained yield:

Management of the forest to assure continuous production with the aim of achieving, at the earliest possible time, an approximate balance between growth and harvest, either by annual or somewhat longer periods.

#### Woodland:

Forest lands usually supporting open-grown, widely scattered trees of marginal mechantability, and generally more valuable for watershed or wildlife protection purposes than for the production of timber for commercial purposes.



# BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT PROGRAM OPERATIONS

## OUTDOOR RECREATION AND WILDLIFE

The Bureau of Land Management protects, preserves, and manages the public land resources, much of which is valuable for outdoor recreation and wildlife. This includes preservation, protection and enhancement of open space values, land and water resources, natural phenomena and archeological and historic values.

Because of the increasing importance of the public lands in satisfying the increased public needs and demands for outdoor recreation, BLM is maintaining an inventory system that provides statistics on the use of public lands for recreation and wildlife purposes. It includes data on visitor use of established and potential recreation sites as well as lands or sites leased to non-Federal interests for recreation purposes (tables 50, 51, 52).

# Outdoor recreation

To further protection and development of the public's recreation resource, revised outdoor recreation regulations were issued in January 1969. They relate to the use and development of recreation lands and identify circumstances under which use of such lands may be restricted in order to protect the public health, safety, natural resources and values. The object of the regulations is to promote public use and enjoyment of the public lands for outdoor recreation use in the manner that will protect the health, safety, and comfort of the public and preserve and protect natural resources and values.

Recreation facilities for camping and picnicking were first constructed in western Oregon in 1960. As of 1975, 426 recreation sites had been developed on all BLM lands (table 49).

Long-term recreation objectives of the Bureau are: To provide the maximum variety and supply of quality outdoor recreaion uses on the public lands commensurate with public needs and resource potentials; and to preserve and protect significant natural historic and cultural resources, and provide for their public use and enjoyment where consistent with preservation goals. Within these objectives two major programs have developed.

The public needs are reflected in the BLM's urban program which orients and increases recreation opportunity where the people are. The urban program will focus BLM's supply of public outdoor recreation in the western States and Alaska on those areas directly accessible to the 16 major areas of more than 50,000 population.

The preservation goals and protection of significant resources are reflected in BLM's preservation, protection and environment program. Environmental quality in relation to people and the Nation's natural resources are of primary importance in this program.

Through comprehensive recreation planning for the public lands it administers, BLM recognizes many different recreation values. Various opportunities associated with these values will be realized such as new camping and picnicking sites; peripheral facilities to alleviate much of the pressure on national forests and parks; development and preservation of Wild and Scenic Rivers; management responsibilities associated with the National Trails System; identification of historic and archeological sites; wildlife habitat improvement; arid land development for recreation purposes; and water-based recreation on our reservoir and rivers.

Specific recreation activities are coordinated government-wide within the framework of the Bureau's recreation programming and planning system. This provides an orderly planning process for the proper and timely utilization of the recreation resources.

## Wildlife

Annually public land fish and wildlife resources contribute hundreds of thousands of dollars to sport and commercial users.

The BLM's wildlife program provides for the protection and enhancement of fish and wildlife habitat and for access to hunting and fishing areas. Rare and endangered species habitat receives priority treatment. Recreationists, hunters, fishermen, birdwatchers, and nature viewers are assisted by the Bureau's wildlife programs of nature interpretation, hunting and fishing camp development, road construction to wildlife areas, wildlife maps developed in cooperation with State game and fish agencies, directional and interpretive signing programs and wildlife habitat management and improvement. Commercial values of wildlife habitat, such as salmon spawning areas, are protected

by coordinated land planning and enhanced through positive wildlife habitat programs.

Central to the program is cooperation with State and Federal agencies engaged in the conservation and management of fish and wildlife and their habitats. State wildlife agencies are primarily responsible for the management of wildlife. The primary concern of the Bureau is for development and management of wildlife habitat. Policies and procedures for cooperation are defined in Memorandums of Understanding between each BLM State Office and State wildlife agencies.

### DEFINITIONS OF TERMS

## Archaeological and historical site:

Site which contains objects of antiquity or cultural values relating to history, that warrant special protection.

## Buffer zone and scenic strip:

A public land area adjacent to a recreation site, road, lake, reservoir, or major stream of value for outdoor recreation. The area is important to protection of scenic beauty, vegetation, water supply, or other factors that contribute to the attraction concerned.

## Family Unit:

An installation with camping, picnicking, or trailer camping facilities to serve the needs of one family-sized group.

#### Recreation Lands:

A tract of public land (usually several thousand acres in size) on which outdoor recreation or wildlife has been determined to be the primary use. Recreation lands may have facilities for intensive recreation use or they may remain in a relatively undeveloped condition for extensive forms of use. Where wilderness values predominate, an area may be preserved in a primitive, roadless condition.

#### Recreation Site:

A tract of public land, generally less than 500 acres, on which concentrated recreation use is the primary value. A recreation site may be administered by the Bureau of Land Management, or by BLM and another agency; or it may be suitable for lease or sale to State or local government or nonprofit organizations.

#### Recreation visit:

A visit to lands and waters under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Land Management by a person for the purpose of engaging in any activities except those which are part of or incidental to the pursuit of a gainful occupation, whether for a few minutes or for a full 24-hour day.

### Recreation visitor day:

An aggregation of 12 visitor hours, where a visitor hour is the presence of one or more persons on land and waters for outdoor recreation purposes for continuous, intermittent, or simultaneous periods aggregating 60 minutes, e.g., one person for one hour, two persons for one-half hour each, or N persons for 1-N hours each.

# BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT PROGRAM OPERATIONS

## RANGE MANAGEMENT

The range management activities of the Bureau of Land Management are carried out as one of the multiple-uses of rangelands which comprise a substantial portion of the public lands in the 11 Western States and Alaska.

The most universal use of the rangelands at this time, by live-stock, wild free-roaming horses and burros, and wildlife, is the utilization of the forage produced and natural habitat provided. The Bureau administers 52 grazing districts under the authority of the Taylor Grazing Act. These districts encompass 157,-282,886 acres of Federal range (table 57). During calendar year 1974, 13,774 operators (table 59) held 15,825 licenses or permits (table 60) to graze 5,265,966 livestock animals to the extent of-10,393,079 animal unit months (table 59). Gross receipts from grazing use returned to the U.S. Treasury from public lands within the districts totaled \$9,585,312. In addition, \$524,831 (table 110) was received for grazing use on 12,316,086 acres of LU lands and other reserved lands administered by the Bureau (table 57).

Public lands outside of the districts in the Western States are used for grazing purposes under authority of Section 15 of the Taylor Grazing Act. Approximately 17,144,121 acres (table 65) were leased to 7,634 operators (table 64) under 7,785 separate leases (table 65). Receipts from Section 15 grazing authorizations totaled \$1,548,804 (table 110). Under the Alaska Grazing Act, 34 leases were issued for a total of 1,361,180 acres (table 65). Alaska grazing use totaled 76,500 animal unit-months by 4,000 cattle and horses, and 2,400 sheep and goats, and reindeer (table 66).

### DEFINITIONS OF TERMS

## Animal unit:

A standardized unit of measurement for range livestock which is equivalent to one cow or one horse or five sheep or five goats, four reindeer all over 6 months of age.

#### Animal unit month:

A standardized unit of measurement of the amount of forage necessary for the complete sustenance of one animal unit for a period of 1 month; also a unit of measurement of grazing privileges which represents the privilege of grazing one animal unit for a period of one month.

## Grazing district:

An administrative subdivision of the rangelands under jurisdiction of the Bureau of Land Management, established pursuant to Section 1 of the Taylor Grazing Act, to facilitate management of their resources.

### Grazing permit:

An authorization which permits the grazing of the specified number and class of livestock on a designated area of grazing district lands during specified seasons each year.

## Grazing lease lands:

Lands outside grazing districts, which are owned, leased or otherwise controlled by the United States, are administered by the Bureau of Land Management, and are subject to leasing for grazing purposes under the Alaska Grazing Law of 1927, the Taylor Grazing Act of 1934, the O&C Act of 1937, or the Reindeer Act of 1937.

### Grazing lease:

An authorization which permits the grazing of livestock on public lands outside the grazing districts during a specified period of time (Section 15 of the Taylor Grazing Act).

## Exchange-of-use agreements:

An agreement with a rancher having control over non-Federal lands interspersed and normally grazed in conjunction with the surrounding Federal range for Bureau control and management for grazing purposes of these non-Federal lands.

### Crossing permit:

An authorization issued for trailing livestock across Federal range for proper and lawful purposes.

#### Free Use License:

An authorization issued only for livestock kept for domestic purposes whose products are consumed or whose work is directly and exclusively used by the family of the applicant, provided further that such free use livestock will be grazed in the immediate vicinity of the applicant's place of residence. No grazing fee is charged for this authorization.

#### Nonuse:

An authorization issued to an applicant for nonuse of grazing privileges in whole or part and usually for one grazing season.

### Wild free-roaming horses and burros:

All unbranded and unclaimed horses and burros on national resource lands managed under the Wild Horse and Burro Act of 1971 (PL 92-195).

# BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT PROGRAM OPERATIONS

## RESOURCE CONSERVATION AND DEVELOPMENT

Bureau of Land Management programs in resource conservation and development emphasizes the rehabilitation and development of public lands to control water runoff, to minimize soil erosion, siltation and other destructive consequences of uncontrolled water flows, and to maintain and improve the quality and quantity of surface and subsurface water. Such operations are conducted under authority of the National Soil Conservation Act, the Taylor Grazing Act, and the Multiple Use Act. A range improvement program authorized by the Taylor Grazing Act provides range use facilities to aid range management and utilization. The National Halogeton Control Act provides authority for control of poisonous and noxious weeds on the public lands.

Table 71 shows the major accomplishments under these programs during fiscal year 1975.

# BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT PROGRAM OPERATIONS

## MINERALS LEASED OR SOLD AND LOCATABLE MINERALS

The Bureau of Land Management administers the public mineral resources of the United States and encourages their development in accordance with statutory provisions and the principles of conservation. The lands subject to mineral development aggregate approximately 822 million acres, including the remaining public lands administered by BLM and other agencies, acquired lands, and lands which have been patented with some or all minerals reserved to the United States. Additionally, submerged lands of the Outer Continental Shelf are subject to mineral development.

Authority for disposition of mineral lands and resources is contained in the General Mining Laws of 1872, the Mineral Leasing Act of 1920, the Outer Continental Shelf Act of 1953, leasing act which pertain to acquired lands and special areas, and the Materials Disposal Act of 1947. Resulting activities are the location and patenting of mining claims; competitive and noncompetitive leasing of lands for oil, gas, potash, coal and other minerals; competitive leasing on the Outer Continental Shelf for oil gas, and other minerals; and the sale and free use disposal of mineral materials not subject to the mining or leasing laws.

The Bureau issued 30 mineral patents during 1975 covering 6,068 acres of Federal land (table 15).

A total of 50 mineral patent applications on all Federal lands was adjudicated during fiscal year 1975. Field investigation of 23 patent applications on Bureau of Land Management administered lands were made and 11 cases were recommended for allowance (table 83).

As of June 30, 1975, there were 103,762 mineral leases in effect on 81,885,130 acres of public domain lands (T. 78). There were 313 prospecting permits and coal licenses outstanding on another 733,389 acres of public lands (T. 72). Also in force were 11,892 mineral leases, licenses, and permits on 8,398,197 acres of acquired lands (T. 77). The great majority of leases, licenses, and permits are for oil and gas.

Mineral production from both public domain, acquired, and other Federal lands during fiscal year 1975 included 174,355,716 barrels of petroleum; 1,112,339,985 thousand cubic feet of natural gas; 515,529,962 gallons of gasoline and liquid petroleum gas; 50,919,472 short tons of coal, potash, and other minerals (Ts. 73, 74, and 76). In addition, 339,333,547 barrels of petroleum, 3,382,645,182 thousand cubic feet of natural gas, 1,384,739 short tons of sulfur, and 237,361 short tons of salt were produced from the submerged lands of the Outer Continental Shelf (T. 75).

A total of 702 sales of materials other than vegetal, principally mineral materials, yielded \$9,846,019 and the estimated value of material in 561 free use permits to governmental agencies and nonprofit groups amounted to \$10,731,101 during the fiscal year (T. 81).

Total receipts during fiscal year 1975 from all mineral leasing activities including rentals, royalties, and bonuses from lands and the Outer Continental Shelf conducted by the Bureau of Land Management were \$2,757,634,298 (T.110).

### DEFINITIONS OF TERMS

#### Bonus:

The cash consideration paid to the United States by the successful bidder for a mineral lease, such payment being made in addition to the rent and royalty obligations specified in the lease.

#### Competitive Lease:

A lease issued by the United States where there are known minerals, or inference of probable mineralization shown can be drawn from knowledge of the geology of the land. The lands are offered for lease by competitive bidding after publication of the offer of the lands for leasing. The lease issues to the high bidder, who is determined at a sale by public auction.

#### Field Examinations:

An on-the-ground investigation of certain public lands in regard to valuation, land use, application for entry, mineralization, etc.

#### Free Use Permit:

A permit to a governmental agency or non-profit group to use mineral materials or other resources at no charge.

#### Lease:

A contract or instrument by which interests are created or transferred to another subject to specified obligations and given in consideration of rent or some other recompense.

## License:

An authority granted by the United States to do a particular act or series of acts upon public lands without the lessee possessing any estate or interest in the land itself.

#### Location:

The perfecting of a right to possession of a mining claim for mining purposes. This includes the staking of the claim, sinking a discovery shaft, discovery of a valuable mineral, posting a notice of location, and recording the claim.

#### L.P.G.:

Liquid Petroleum Gases.

#### Mineral:

Inorganic substances occurring naturally, with characteristics and economic uses that bring it within the purview of mineral laws; a substance that may be obtained under applicable laws from public lands by purchase, lease or preemptive entry.

#### Mineral Classification:

The classification of lands as mineral lands which are lands known to contain valuable minerals.

#### Mineral Investigation:

Synonymous with field examination.

#### Mineral Materials:

Minerals such as common varieties of sand, stone, gravel, pumice, pumicite and clay which are not obtainable under the Mining or Leasing Laws but which can be obtained under the Materials Act of 1947, as amended.

#### Mineral Permit:

A permit which authorizes prospecting for certain leasable minerals on public land described in the permit.

#### Mineral Reservation:

A restriction on federally owned minerals, or of public lands which contain minerals.

#### Noncompetitive Leasing:

Leases are issued to qualified applicants for lands not specifically known or presumed to contain mineral or petroleum deposits in quantity.

#### Patent:

A Government deed. A document that conveys legal title of public lands to the party to whom the patent is issued.

#### Public Law 167:

(The act of July 23, 1955, 69 Stat. 357.) Provides for multiple use of mining claims, and for a procedure where the Government may determine that it has the right to manage surface resources not required for mining purposes.

#### Public Law 359:

(The act of Aug. 11, 1955, Stat. 681.) Provides for the location of mining claims on lands reserved or withdrawn for power or powersite purposes.

#### Sale of Materials:

A competitive or noncompetitive sale by contract at not less than the appraised price of materials (timber and mineral material) under the Materials Act of 1947, as amended.

# PART 2

# BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT PROGRAM OPERATIONS

#### CLASSIFICATION AND INVESTIGATION

Excluding timber and grazing activities, classification and investigation cases numbered 16,685 as of July 1, 1974. Case closures during the year amounted to 25,593 but 23,972 new and reactivated cases were received throughout the year bringing the Bureau's total backlog to 15,064 cases by the end of the reporting period (table 85).

Land classification conducted under the authority of the Taylor Grazing Act covered 180 separate tracts of land totaling 69,815 acres. Of these, 49,738 acres, or 114 different tracts, were found suitable for disposition (tables 87 and 88).

#### DEFINITIONS OF TERMS

#### Classification:

The designation of lands as being valuable, or suitable, for specific purposes, uses, or resources.

#### Investigation:

A fact-finding activity, which may include on-the-ground examination of lands, undertaken preliminary to determination and adjudication under the public land laws.

## PART 2

# BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT PROGRAM OPERATIONS

#### PROTECTION—FIRE AND TRESPASS

As a part of its resource management responsibilities, the Bureau of Land Management protected, during fiscal year 1975, a total of 401,923,000 acres from fire. Of this total 5,936,000 acres were protected through contracts with State, private, or Federal fire protection agencies, and the remaining 396,025,000 acres by force account (table 94).

During the 1974 calendar year, 1,087,590 acres were burned (table 93). On land protected by contract, 481 fires burned 39,795 acres (table 93). The cost of contract protection for calendar year 1974 was \$2,034,000 (table 93). On lands protected by force account, 2,525 fires burned 1,047,795 acres. The cost of suppression was \$22,614,873 (table 93).

Fire damage for calendar year 1974 was \$15,675,100 Timber and reproduction losses amounted to \$2,144,600 Losses to watershed, recreation, range, wildlife forage, and other resources were \$59,915,200 (table 90).

In fiscal year 1975, 3,888 cases of unauthorized use were acted upon and 1,249 cases were closed. Pending at the end of the year were 2,639 cases (table 95). Unauthorized land occupancy made up a large portion of the cases. Collections totaled \$377,680 of this amount \$204,883 was received from timber trespass (table 97).

#### DEFINITIONS OF TERMS

Contract fire protection:

Fire protection rendered through formal contracts with other agencies or organizations for the complete job of fire protection on lands owned, leased, or controlled by the United States which are administered by the Bureau of Land Management.

Force account fire protection:

Fire protection given lands owned, leased or controlled by the United States and administered by the Bureau of Land Management, on which complete fire protection is extended through the use of fire protection forces and facilities supervised and operated by the Bureau of Land Management.

Fire presuppression:

Fire control activities related to the organization, training, instruction, and management of the fire control improvements, equipment, and supplies to insure effective suppression.

Fire suppression:

Fire control activities concerned with controlling and extinguishing a fire, starting with the time the fire is discovered.

Trespass:

An unauthorized use of Federal lands and/or resources.

# PART 2

# BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT PROGRAM OPERATIONS

# PUBLIC LAND SURVEYS

Public land surveys are fundamental to the proper development and effective administration of the vast areas of the public domain. Such surveys create and establish on the ground boundaries of divisions and subdivisions of the public lands in units that can readily be identified and recorded in the form of official field notes and plats.

At its maximum extent the original public domain consisted of approximately 1.8 billion acres, or about 78 percent of the total land area of the continental United States. The rectangular system of surveys has now been extended over 1.4 billion acres of this vast area. Of the 405,027,320 acres of land remaining to be surveyed at the close of the 1975 fiscal year, more than 77 percent is in Alaska (table 98). The remaining unsurveyed land lies exclusively in 11 Western States, the largest unsurveyed area being located in Nevada where approximately 28 percent of the area of the State is unsurveyed.

About 55 percent of the area within public land States other than Alaska is owned by the Federal Government. Many of the surveys of these government lands were made nearly a century ago and were marked by wooden stakes or other nonpermanent material which have since been obliterated by the elements or by man-made developments.

There is now an urgent need for a resurvey of over 50 million acres of land in this category in order to redefine the boundaries of those areas subject to administration by the Federal Government. During the 1975 fiscal year, 31,373.508 acres of cadastral surveys were officially accepted. Approximately 3 percent of this area was represented by resurveys (table 99). Numerous other investigations not measurable on a quantity basis were also executed in the field during the same period. These investigations ordinarily lead to approved surveys later.

#### DEFINITIONS OF TERMS

#### Cadastral survey:

A survey relating to land boundaries and subdivisions, made to create units suitable for management or to define the limits of title. The distinguishing features of the cadastral surveys are the establishment of monuments on the ground to define the boundaries of the land, and their identification in the records by field notes and plats.

#### Meander line:

A traverse of the margin of a permanent natural body of water, defining the sinuosities of bank or shoreline, in connection with a cadastral survey.

## Original survey:

A cadastral survey which creates land boundaries and establishes them for the first time.

#### Protraction diagram:

A diagram representing the plan of extension of the cadastral surveys over unsurveyed public lands, based upon computed values for the corner positions.

## Resurvey:

A cadastral survey to identify and re-mark the boundaries of lands which were established by a prior survey.

#### Special survey:

A cadastral survey other than at original survey or resurvey. This category includes such work as small tract surveys; townsite surveys; island and omitted land surveys; homestead, homesite, trade and manufacturing site surveys; also the survey and resurvey of section lines and connecting lines not involving a closed traverse.



## PART 3

## ADJUDICATION, APPEALS AND HEARINGS

Adjudication operations started the fiscal year with a workload of 59,231 cases. New cases received and cases reactivated during the year added another 78,380 to this figure. The Bureau closed 82,113 cases (table 104). The unclosed adjudication caseload at the end of the year was 55,498.

Appeals from the Bureau of Land Management decisions numbered 987 cases at the beginning of the year. During the year 1,234 more cases were received. There were 708 cases closed during fiscal 1975 (table 106).

Bureau Hearings operations started the year with 219 cases. During he year 145 cases were received. There were 129 cases closed during 1974 (table 107).

### DEFINITIONS OF TERMS

## Adjudication:

The interpretation of statutes and regulations, and their application to a particular set of facts.

#### Appeal:

The regulations governing the Bureau's operations give all parties adversely affected by a decision of an officer of the Bureau of Land Management or of an examiner the right to appeal to the Board of Land Appeals (43 CFR 1842.2).

### Decision:

A decision is the reduction to writing of the adjudicative process: a decision orders the disposition of a case in a certain way, and contains a statement of the facts, laws and reasoning which require that disposition.

#### Hearing:

Hearings in cases the adjudication of which is based on testimony and evidence adduced at proceedings ordered and held pursuant to the U.S. Department of Interior's Hearings Procedures (43 CFR 1850).

## PART 4

## ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE

During the fiscal year 1975, the Bureau obligated \$288,226,099 appropriated by Congress or transferred to it from other agencies (table 108).

Gross receipts from the sale and management of public lands and resources during the same period totaled \$2,919,614,365. Sources of these receipts were: \$2,757,634,298 from mineral leasing, including \$2,427,965,140 from bonuses, rents, and royalties on the Outer Continental Shelf; \$108,154,926 from sale of timber; \$98,695,920 of which came from O&C timber sales; \$20,281,349 from sale of public lands; \$13,401,535 of which came from sale of Geothermal Steam; \$11,658,947 from grazing leases, licenses and permits; \$18,275,360 from fees and commissions; \$549,635 from rights-of-way leases, and \$3,059,850 from all other sources (table 110).

Receipts for the fiscal year 1975 were allocated as follows: \$172,297,383 to 23 States, of which \$49,347,960 went to 18 western O&C counties; \$172,220,514 to the Reclamation Fund; \$2,553,059,449 went into the General Fund of Treasury; \$15,148,329 to other Government agencies; \$1,453,758 to Indian Trust Funds, and \$5,434,932 for range improvements (table 116 and 117).

#### DEFINITIONS OF TERMS

Allocation of receipts:

Determination of moneys paid, or to be paid, to other funds, counties or States out of receipts collected during the fiscal year reported, as required and/or specified by law.

Geological Survey receipts:

Receipts collected by the Geological Survey in the U.S. Department of the Interior for mineral and petroleum rentals and royalties paid under the terms of leases, licenses, and permits initially issued by the Bureau of Land Management. These receipts are subsequently deposited with the Bureau of Land Management by the Geological Survey.

Nonoperating revenue:

Receipts of a miscellaneous nature, such as incidental receipts from taxes, fines, etc. which are not related specifically to or received in the process of conducting normal and regular business of the Bureau of Land Management as it pertains to the management of public lands and resources.

### Obligations:

Payments, and amounts which the Government is obligated to pay for goods and services received or contracted for future delivery made from appropriations during the fiscal year indicated.

## Receipts:

All money received and credited to the proper account required by law. Does not include collections held by the U.S. Treasury pending future determination of disposition by the Bureau of Land Management.

#### Reclamation fund:

A designated fund to which a portion of certain Federal receipts are allocated according to the law, and which may subsequently be used specially for land reclamation purposes when so appropriated by Congress.

#### Rental:

The amount paid periodically (usually annually) by the holder of a lease in payment for the right to use of the land or resources for the purposes set out in the lease.

### Transferred funds:

Appropriated funds which have been made available to the Bureau of Land Management from appropriations originally made to other bureaus and agencies.
