My Dear Friend

I had, until a short recep
only was determined on, been anticipating a speedy
return to Nevada upon the adjournment of Congress,
to greet friends, enjoy the fresh air, and enter upon
the Campaign for the cause of Liberty and Peace
represented by Grant and Colfax. Our own noble
little State was born amid the throes of Civil War,
and was urged by the loyal hearted men of the land
to put on the garments of Sovereignty, and to enter the
sisterhood of States in order that by her votes she

might
aid in the maintenance of free institutions. I hope
the Country has not been disappointed at any time
by the votes or words of her representatives at Wash-
ington. The record of her people at every election is
bright and sound and now that we are in the grand
final struggle, I know that they will let no stain
come upon the good name of Nevada. I predict
the election of our grand Hero and Pacificator - Grant -
by the electoral votes of all but five states, and some
of them may be swallowed up in the great victory
which is to crown our cause in November. Let Nevada
march with firm tread in her accustomed place in
the grand procession - So great is my affection for
her, so strong my gratitude for the honors she has
seen fit so frequently to confer on me, and so high my
faith in the patriotism of her people, that I do not
allow myself to contemplate for an instant a triumph
within her borders of the beaten and enraged rebels and
their sympathizers.

I shall remain here in order that I may attend the
September Session. The Conduct of the President will
control the length of that session - If he seeks to work
his will contrary to the obligations of his oath of office

the Senate, reinforced by a loyal and reconstructed South
will stand ready to apply the Constitutional remedy if
invoked as it would surely be by the faithful represen-
tatives of the people in the House of Representatives.
If peace and order prevail, the meeting of Congress in
September will be for a few days only, and I shall be
able, health permitting, to visit home and say some-
thing to the people during the month of October - I
trust I may be enabled to do so. My Colleague goes
home to enter into the canvass with his accustomed
ardor and energy - a truer-hearted and more valuable
and industrious man does not sit in the Senate than
William W. Stewart - He is full of zeal, strong and
true in his convictions, ready in debate, efficient in
Committee and most worthy to be continued in his
place - I hope the people of Nevada will see
fit to return him to the position he now so worthily
fills and such is the universal feeling of all loyal
and true hearted men here
