The two cabins used by the survivors of the B-17 aeroplane disaster on the Eldorado Forest were what is known as the Bassi Cabins, owned by a grazing permittee named Swift, located as follows: Upper Bassi Cabin in Section 5, T. 12 N., R. 15 E., M. D. M. and the Lower Bassi Cabin located in Section 14, T. 12 N., R. 14 E., M. D. M. Both of these cabins are summer headquarters for one of our cattle grazers and of course upon leaving in the fall the permittees usually leaves some food properly protected, blankets and enough dry wood so that when he returns in the spring some of the necessities for opening camp would be available.

We have no cabins on the Forest that are stocked with the necessities by the Forest Service but nearly all the cabins of the stockmen are so fixed up as well as several Forest Service and Stockmen cabins which are used by the snow survey people from the Department of Public Works on their trips into the mountains during the winter months.
