# History of Armour Rose.



**A** LITTLE BALL of red and white had just finished its first breakfast and stood with wide eyed astonishment looking at two or three visitors who were inspecting the new comer. It was an everyday occurrence on a Hereford farm, and none of her visitors dreamed that the little white face, with its wistful eyes, was to play an important part in a great undertaking. Some one remarked that she was as pretty as a rose. The comment seemed to fit her, and she was christened Rose, with the prefix Armour, since she was a product of the Kirk B. Armour breeding establishment.

Armour Rose was born February 13, 1898. Her dam was Armour Naiad XII., one of the great cows of the Armour collection, and her sire, Beau Brummel, Jr., is one of the premiers of the same herd.

Mr. Armour was holding a public sale of Hereford cattle in October, 1898. Some of the animals in the sale were bringing One Thousand Dollars. Mr. E. M. Clendenning, Secretary of the Commercial Club, and Mr. A. F. Seested, Business Manager of the Kansas City Star, told Mr. Armour that if he would give them a calf they thought it could be made the nucleus of a grand gift concert to be given for the purpose of raising money to complete the great Kansas City Convention Hall. Mr. Armour gave them the choice of his young herd, and Armour Rose was selected. One hundred and sixty thousand tickets were sold in three weeks. Armour Rose was exhibited everywhere, and seemed to enjoy her notoriety. She was drawn by Mrs. R. W. Ryan, and was redeemed by the Armour Packing Company, who gave Mrs. Ryan a check for \$1,000, the value placed upon the animal when donated.

Armour Rose has grown to be quite a lady. She is as gentle as a kitten and delights in being petted. She is not only a beautiful animal, but from a Hereford standpoint, very fashionably bred, and is practically a perfect individual specimen.

## L'ENVOI.

When the foregoing sketch of Armour Rose was first printed only half of her history had been written. Today her name is known in two continents. The little creature of destiny poses as having brought the highest price ever paid for a Hereford cow. The Hereford breeders of America held at Kansas City during October the most remarkable show of its character the world has ever seen—a Hereford show and a Hereford sale. Three hundred animals passed under the hammer, bringing a total of \$100,000.

Armour Rose, after a remarkable bidding contest, sold for \$2,500, the top price at the sale for any animal, and the highest price ever paid for a Hereford cow. She was bought by John Sparks, of Reno, Nevada, owner of the Alamo herd of Herefords. Her buyer earned the double distinction of paying the highest price for an animal in the sale, and also sold in the same sale the next highest priced cow, Babe of Alamo, who brought \$1,650, and went to Mr. Frank Rockefeller, Vice-President of the Standard Oil Co., Cleveland, Ohio.

At this writing there is a modest little lady wandering about the beautiful alfalfa pastures of the Truckee Valley. She has entirely recovered from an attack of homesickness, incident to leaving Meadow Park Farm, and the same soulful eyes that looked with grateful recognition upon the admiration of thousands of visitors at the Kansas City show, are gazing up at the purple shadows of the Sierra Nevada Mountains, and a gentle little heart is saying, "Thank you, brothers and sisters of the Alamo, I feel like a bride who leaves a beautiful home to find one equally so, It is a sweet destiny, and I am pleased with my lot."

# Descriptive Pedigree of Champion of the West.

**FLORA OF THE OAKS**, 8141, the dam of Champion of the West, is a remarkably handsome cow, and an extra good one, so that her son, Champion of the West, could not be otherwise than handsome and all right. She was imported in 1879; is a beautiful solid, light orange fawn, a real model Jersey cow, and is on record in Campbell Brown's book, page 112, as having made 14 lbs. 7 oz. of *unsalted* butter in 7 days. If salted, her test would have been at least 15 lbs. 3 oz. of butter, and had the butter of his sire's dam been salted it would have been at least 17 lbs. 2oz., an average for the dam and sire's dam of over 16 lbs. per week.

If there is anything in blood or breeding, surely Champion of the West must be right, and well worthy the honor of heading a fine herd of Jerseys. The majority of breeders prefer a bull whose dam has a well authenticated record of over 14 lbs. of butter in seven days, and the best breeders will not have a bull unless his dam has a good record of over 14 lbs. The dam of this bull *has an authentic record* and he will please any breeder in every way, and his calves will be sure to sell for good prices.

**GOLD CUP**, 3983, the sire of this grand young bull, is a first-class bull in every respect, and comes from the very finest stock. When only ten months old he was awarded the first prize over all Jersey bulls at the International Fair in New York City, in December, 1879, competing among others with the celebrated bull, Much Ado, 2405, who took first and special prize at the New Jersey Fair in 1878 and 1879, New Hampshire State Fair in 1876, and at Washington, D. C., in 1880.

**VICTOR**, F. S., 148, won first prize over all Jersey in 1877, 1878 and 1879, beating all prize bulls on the island for three years in succession, including such celebrated animals as Duke Grey Prince, Grey King, sire of Farmers' Glory, and numerous others, and never was defeated himself. Victor sired Foribundus 2d, that tested 18 lbs. 8 oz. at four years old, for L. L. Tozier, Batavia, N. Y.; also sire of Dairy Pride 6th, 16 lbs., for Wm. Taylor, Burlington, N. J.; also of Isabella of Avon, 13,428, 12 lbs. 12 oz., for V. E. Fuller, Hamilton, Ont.

**FLORA OF ST. PETERS**, 8626, made 16 lbs. 5 oz. of *unsalted* butter in 7 days, when three years old, on green feed only, without forcing. See her record in Campbell Brown's book, "Butter Tests of Jersey Cows." She is one of the most perfect types of a Jersey cow to be found anywhere, and her photograph can be seen in catalogue of Mrs. E. M. Jones, Brockville, Canada, where she is described as long, broad on hips, deep in flank, a most capacious body, on short, fine legs, with skin rich as gold, and a superb udder that measures 54 inches around. Seven months after making 16 lbs. 5 oz. per week, she tested 11 lbs. 12 oz. per week without forcing, so that she must have made between four and five hundred pounds of butter in 7 months, without forcing. Besides being dam of the great prize bull, Gold Cup, she is dam of Rival's Florist, the young bull that took first prize and silver medal over all bulls in Canada, at Guelph, 1883. Flora was exhibited four times, and took the prize every time. Her greatest triumph was in the fall of 1883, when, with T. S. Cooper as judge, she took first prize in her class over all Jersey cows in Canada, including three superb imported cows, one of which had taken first prize over the whole island of Jersey.

**WELCOME**, 172, is sire of two cows that made over 14 lbs. butter in 7 days, and is sire of Jersey Boy, 92, who sired Oakland's Cora, that tested 19 lbs. 9½ oz. butter in 7 days, and 81 lbs. 5½ oz. in 31 days, for V. E. Fuller.

**WELCOME**, 166, H. C., is grand sire of Khedive, who sired Princess 2d, that tested 27 lbs. 10 oz. in 7 days, and 107 lbs. 3 oz. butter in 31 days, and Ona, 20 lbs. 13 oz. in 7 days.

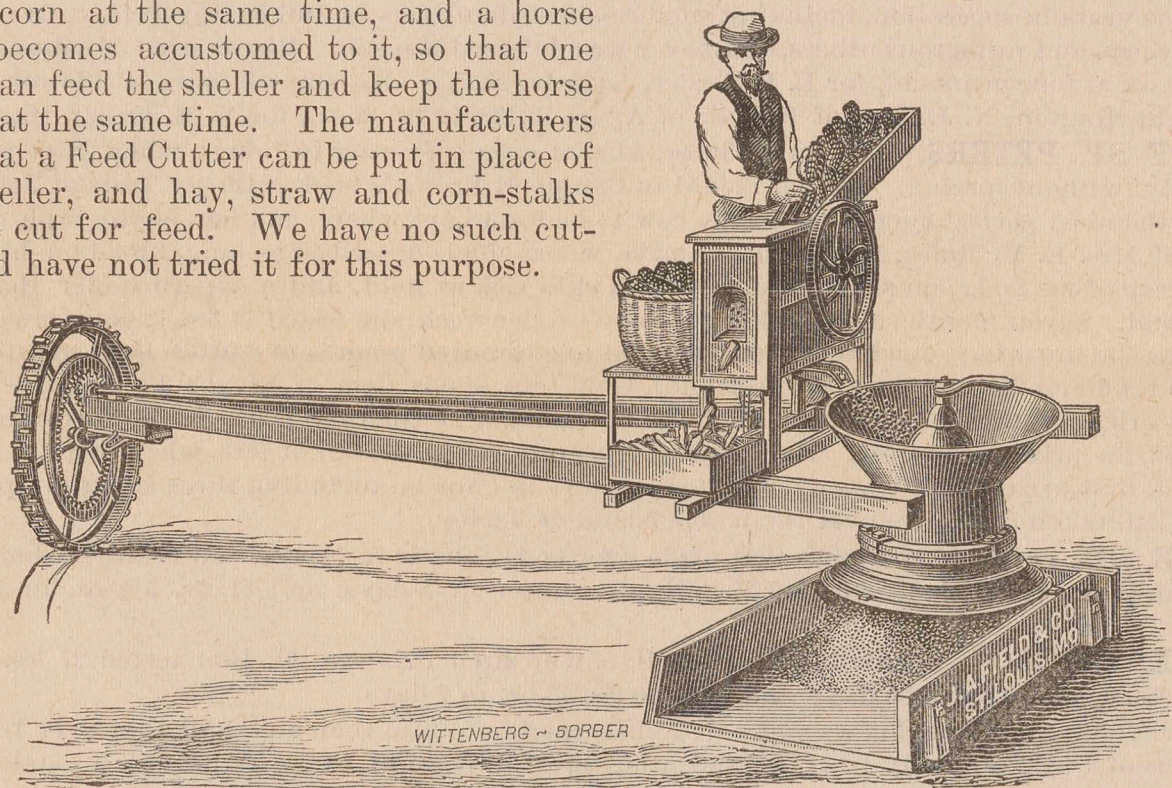

# RULES GOVERNING ROUNDUP

No. 1905.

Round-up No. 1905 will meet at Denver, January the 9th. The country to be worked will be all of the United States and any other part of the earth that will stand for it. The rules for the round-up are as follows:

1. All reps must be twenty-one years of age and must have credentials showing that they have had ahold of the rope.
2. No member will be allowed to say, "go way around them, Shep."
3. Any member who shoots out the lights or makes anyone dance will be cut into the wild bunch and will be necked, hopped or hog tied, and will go with the first shipment.
4. All strays must be identified by their brands and cut into their proper bunches.
5. All ropes and branding irons must be left at home; any member found using same while in Denver will be tied to the wagon.
6. All members must report at eight o'clock for night guard, and will stand all-night relief.
7. The bunch must be removed from the bed ground early in the morning and trailed all day without feed or water till dark.
8. When bunch is put upon bed ground, great care must be used in handling same to prevent stampedes, for we expect to get some aged and matured stuff, who are generally wise and foxy.
9. All members must keep a saddle horse tied to their wagon in case of high water, as we are expecting wet nights; we may have to swim out.
10. The sorting of the bunch will be done by the foreman, the fat ones in, the thin ones by.
11. The sorting of the she stuff will be done by experienced hands. Any stuff without marks will be immediately roped, thrown and branded.
12. There will be one large pen for all the stuff gathered, with plenty of feed and water.
13. Any railroad or stock yards company who complains that the stock men have been paying them too much will be fined free transportation for the entire bunch both ways.
14. No railroad will be allowed to run stock over ten miles per hour.
15. All high-binders, banks, railroads, packing houses, stock yards, coal dealers and others will be properly branded and ear marked. They will also be compelled to give the high sign, so that they can be properly identified by each and every member of this round-up.
16. All packing houses buying cattle must do so at their own risk. No losses will be refunded.
17. After the round-up is made no person will be allowed to ride into the bunch or through it without the permission of the foreman, for the work must be done without ginning or milling, and those holding up must give the men working the heard plenty room to make their cuts. The hold-ups must be held close to the main bunch, so that they can be seen at all times, and before they are moved they should be inspected to see that there are no strays.
18. All stags and old bulls will be cut by themselves.
19. No saddle irons or rings will be allowed.

**A** LITTLE BALL of red and white had just finished its first breakfast and stood with wide eyed astonishment looking at two or three visitors who were inspecting the new comer. It was an every-day occurrence on a Hereford farm and none of her visitors dreamed that the little white face, with its wistful eyes, was to play an important part in a great undertaking. Someone remarked that she was as pretty as a rose. The comment seemed to fit her, and she was christened Rose, with the prefix Armour, since she was a product of the Kirk B. Armour breeding establishment.

Armour Rose was born February 13, 1898. Her dam was Armour Naiad XII., one of the great cows of the Armour collection, and her sire, Beau Brummel, Jr., is one of the premiers of the same herd.

Mr. Armour was holding a public sale of Hereford cattle in October, 1898. Some of the animals in the sale were bringing One Thousand Dollars. Mr. E. M. Clen-

denning, secretary of the Commercial Club, and Mr. A. F. Mr. Armour gave them the choice of his young herd and Armour Rose was selected. One hundred and sixty thousand tickets were sold in three weeks. Armour Rose was exhibited everywhere, and seemed to enjoy her notoriety. She was drawn by Mrs. R. W. Ryan, and was redeemed by the Armour Packing Co., who gave Mrs. Ryan a check for \$1,000, the value placed upon the animal when donated.

Armour Rose has grown to be quite a lady. She is as gentle as a kitten and delights in being petted. She is not only a beautiful animal, but from a Hereford standpoint, very fashionably bred, and is practically a perfect individual specimen.

The portrait of Armour Rose was made by Mr. Geo. Ford Morris, of Chicago, whose work in field, animal and sporting drawing has made him famous. Mr. Morris regards the portrait of Armour Rose as one of the best things he has ever done. He has other subjects in the Armour collection under way, notably the heifer Tea Rose, bred by Queen Victoria, England, and the bull, Young Kansas Lad. EXCERPTS COPIED FROM  
"A RANCHMAN'S RECOLLECTIONS"

by

Frank S. Hastings

Published in 1921

Among the stalwarts of those times was John Sparks, originally from Georgetown, Texas, and afterwards governor of Nevada, and, as I recall it, the pioneer breeder of registered Herefords in the far northwest. He was also a large breeder of stock cattle, with ranges between Elko and Reno, Nev. His herd was almost wiped out by a severe winter in the '80's. The friendship between Kirk Armour and John Sparks was one of those rare intimacies which occur between men drawn together as if by a magnet, probably the closest intimacy Mr. Armour ever had in the cattle industry. Both had absolute faith in the great ranges becoming the great eventual source of well-bred cattle, and the foundation of my faith in that result came largely through being with them much, and listening to their talks. And this reminds me of a thing which seems absurd, but in a way I still resent the advent of the auto. My mind goes back to the easy exchanges of long rides behind a team against the difficulty of close conversation in a "jitney".

John Sparks drew his basis for registered Herefords from several of the best Missouri herds, and was in a sense forgotten until the records of Oregon, Nevada and northern California began to tell the story of improved range breeding. Mr. Sanders records that Sparks was the largest factor in that work. In 1899 Mr. Sparks sent a wonderful draft from his Reno herd, joining Kirk B. Armour and James A. Funkhouser in a public sale in Kansas City. For many years I looked after a lot of little private business for Mr. Sparks in Kansas City, and probably the most important thing I did was to locate the supply for his annual 'possum dinner in Reno. He would wire the date, and I would set the word going for live 'possums. The Midland Hotel was Mr. Sparks' Kansas City headquarters, and all the official family loved him. The steward would set a cellar-room aside, and it became a veritable 'possum den during the period of accumulation. It is told of Mr. Sparks that he ran for governor to pardon a man who he was convinced was the victim of circumstances, and innocent.

Another prominent man of those times was Frank Rockefeller. He was a close friend of Mr. Sparks and Mr. Armour. All of them bring to my mind the love of men vital in general industry for the country, and good cattle.

Another time I was getting up a catalog for a sale of Herefords to be held by Kirk B. Armour, James A. Funkhouser and John Sparks in Kansas City, Mr. Sparks bringing his cattle from Nevada. It will be recalled that Mr. Sparks bought his basic stock in Missouri, and started a registered herd at Reno, Nev. The herd was in a way forgotten for a long time, until stories of Herefords all over California, Nevada, Oregon and Washington began to come in. There is no doubt that John Sparks' work was of major importance to improved breeding all over the extreme west and northwest.

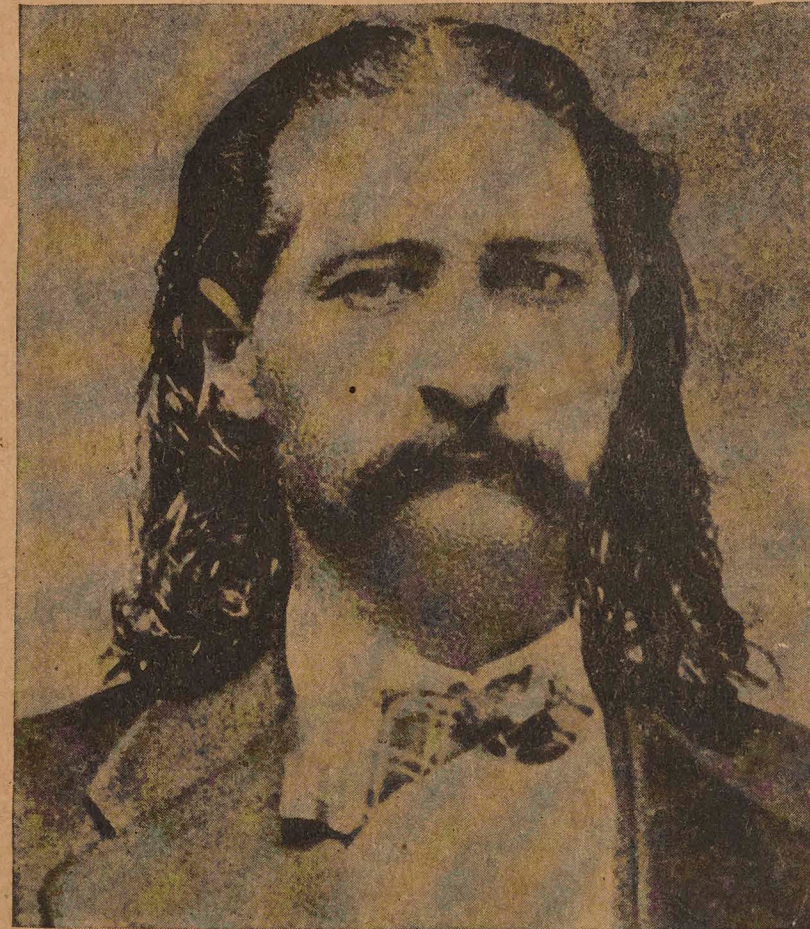
