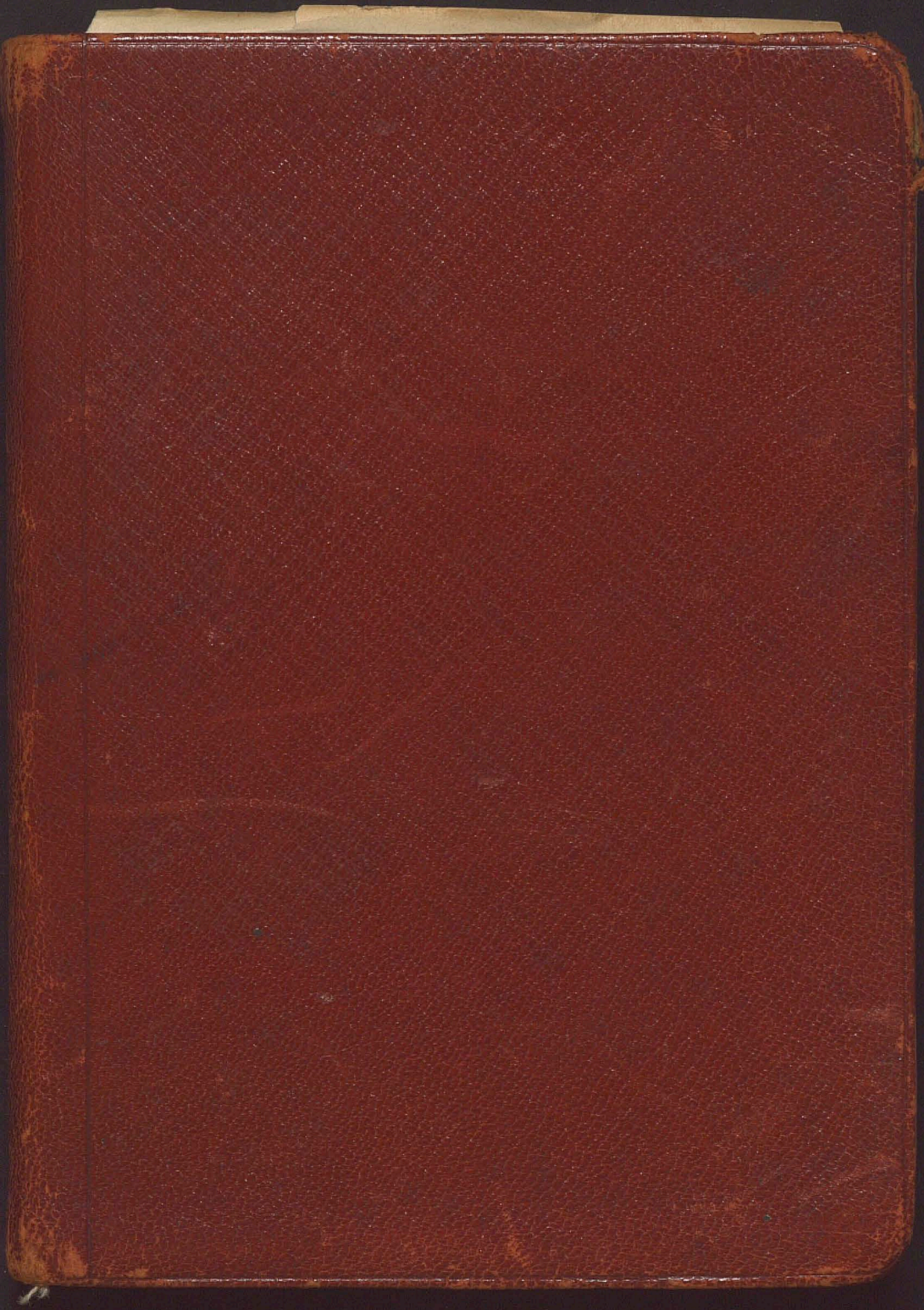

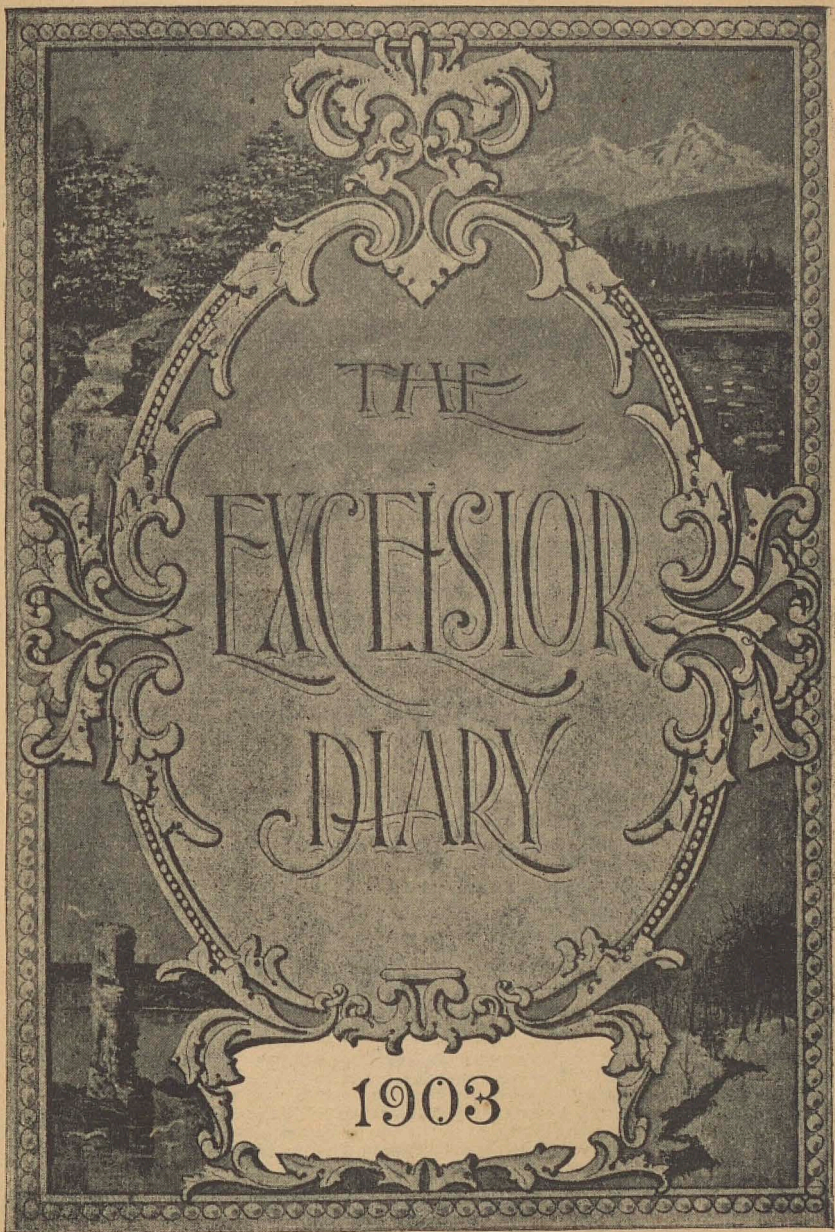

ON ITALIAN ART.

First of Course of Lectures at the University to be Given To-Morrow.

The course of free public lectures in the history of art to be given at the university will begin to-morrow. For the past few years it has been the policy of the institution to secure the services of prominent lecturers for talks in the university chapel designed to prove of popular as well as scholastic interest. Those given last year on sociological themes were especially well attended. It is believed that the lectures not only have a broadening influence on faculty and students, but tend to bring the university in contact with the outside world and thereby serve as an advertisement for the institution.

The course to be given this year promises opportunities for culture that have not been offered heretofore. It is through the generosity of George D. Hale, of the class of 1870, that this course has been introduced. It is held that the aesthetic side of culture is greatly neglected in the curriculum, and it is in accordance with this belief that the lectures this year are to be devoted to the subject of art. The officers have secured the services of Dr. Elizabeth H. Denio, of Albion, who has pursued studies in three of the leading German universities and secured a doctorate in philosophy at the University of Heidelberg.

The lectures will be confined to the history of Italian art, and will show the birth

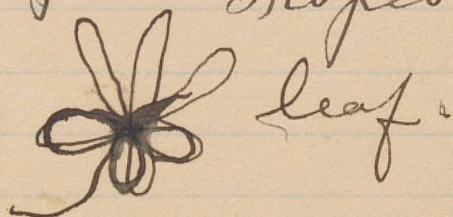

Vos pleased us by his splendid color, and seemed to my unrefined taste quite as good as Rembrandt. Took train for Rotterdam at 2.21 — Arrived 4.10 and went to Hotel Coornhise. Then took a car ride to the Park a beautiful ride along walled canals and feet of the shipping. Walked in the Park along the grass where was a fine view of the Maas and boats of every sort. Many fine suburban homes along car-route near Park.

FRIDAY 19.

1903.

Went out for a walk this morning and to get our bearings wandered in several directions trying to find the "Hoog-straat" and every Dutchman we asked sent us in a different direction. Took carriage and drove over the winding mountain road to the nearest junction and walked to the upper glacier of Grindelwald. Went into the ice grotto 20 ft long with the guide. Beautiful fashions with fine cattle and chalets thick on the slopes under the mountains. A lovely spot for a stay. Back to Interlaken and saw Jungfrau beautifully.

September, SUNDAY 20. 1903.

Left for Berne this A. M.

Many old old houses and very narrow streets - all dirty. Got two volumes on Romania & Lorraine Switzerland.

September, SATURDAY 26. 1903.

Staid in bed until noon

place. Farther on some
tourist hotels. One the
Hotel Mont Blanc, good.

September, WEDNESDAY 30. 1903.

Left from Martigny at
11 A.M. for Zermatt. Fine
side of the mountain
jolly or regular track
and just back of former
Spengliel along the cañon
of the Visp with - peaks of

Reached Zermatt about 3 and
went immediately to the
Gorner Hotel - on top of
the mountain. Glaciers and
mild in an amphitheatre

A very hard day. Rose at 5.30, left Brienze at 7 by carriage with Italian dresses to cross the Simplon Pass. Began to rain in an hour or so, a slow drizzle that made the road slipping, and as it was a continual precipice for miles and the driver seemed careless we got very nervous. Driver walked most of the 12 1/2 miles to Simplon where we had dinner and rested horse two hours. Down hill all the way from there to Domo d'Ossola where we arrived at 6 P.M. Did not rain in afternoon but was grey and depressing. Crossed on road across the glacier which fell some years ago into the valley and is slowly melting leaving great piles of rocks. At Delle was custom-house. Asked if we had any tea. Did not give baggage to see. Passed through long struggling streets - crowded houses, dirty rooms full of dirty people. Streets also babies. Dogs led by women along route clean and trim. Family pets.

Sun yellow corn drying on walls of barns
along Lake Maggiore, Italy - against the white-
plaster. Saw enormous pl-Doms d'Arvola

October, SATURDAY 3. 1903.

Had time after breakfast to walk
about in Dome d'Arvola before
being left for Gravelona. It was
market day and a crowd of
good-natured noisy people were
bartering in the old square.
I bought three strings of garnet
beads of a young Italian for 5 francs.
Reached Gravelona in one
hour by train. Took 2nd seat
on diligence for another hour
for Palenza. Arrived about
3.30. A pretty drive along
a narrow stone walled street
between flat-green fields
studded with trees. Many
cattle with women tending
them and knitting. As we
nearly reached Palenza drove along Lake
Maggiore on one side and villages
and fields & meadows on the other.

October,

SUNDAY 4.

1903.

Bright and fine. Miss B,
went to church and I took
a long walk along lake
shore past villas with
gardens of Jatropha, oleander
acacias, Magnolia etc. like
leaf. Wrote to mother

Postals to Mrs. Gray. Eva & Mrs. Thafe
Read after dinner in Ger-
man Switzerland and took a
walk up on hill and through
orchard, narrow stone walled
paths, very green and foreign.
Read again after
dinner and watched
the moon rise over the
garden at Hotel Pullangai
and across the lake.
Lovely sight.

October,

MONDAY 5.

1903.

Tour - by steamer this 9. AM
across the ~~lake~~ **Lake to** Stresa
stopping at Baveno, Isola
Bella and Isola Pescatore
on way. Heed about half
an hour to stroll about in
Stresa. Iner narrow streets
and old old houses as
everywhere. After lunch
we walked to Intra
and after strolling about
the place and having
a cup of tea in front
of a cafe, took a cab
back to Palcungo. Nice
drive along lake all
the way.

October,

TUESDAY 6.

1903.

Took a rover this morning and went to Isola Bella, 4 miles, through the chateau and the celebrated garden. Saw many familiar trees and shrubs. A camphor tree 3 ft through among others. Then roved to Isola Madre and roved through the garden there not formal like Isola Bella but in the English style. Roved around the tiny island. Saw Giovanni near Pallanza Hotel on my back. After lunch took a long walk and lay down for awhile. Packed up and ready to leave tomorrow for Menaggio via Luino & Lugano where one will probably have to spend the night.

October, WEDNESDAY 7. 1903.

Left on steamer for Lecco at
10.13 - Arriving in Lecco for lunch
at station and had an hour
to stroll about. Market-day -
large lots of cattle tried under
trees to be sold. Train to
Porta Strassa. Boat on Lake
Lugano to Portè Leggia, a
beautiful ride to Lugano
where we stopped for an
hour. Walked about - all
we could. It was dark
soon after so could see
nothing. Train from
Portè Leggia to Menaggio
for $\frac{1}{2}$ hour. Arrived at
8.30. Hotel Menaggio -

Took a walk along quay
to Hotel Victoria this A.M.
Like our own better so had
no regrets at-choic. Walked

villa Carlotta to see the
fine marbles by Thorvalden

It was beautifully clear
after the storm and every-

The distant peaks had

felt too tired to go out so
staid in our rooms and read
over all our letters. I intended
going to Bellagio after lunch
but a message came from
Mrs. Nylius asking me to
come up there for 3 o'clock
tea so I gave up Bellagio.
The carriage took us there
and Miss Blake went
for a ride for an hour
while I drank tea and
walked around the fine
old garden. An island
spot for warm weather.
Enjoyed my call immensely.

SUNDAY 11.

1903.

Went to Bellagio this morning. Mr. Mylius called just before boat started so I had a little chat with him. He is very pleasant I think and I am sure I could enjoy knowing them better. Their home is very interesting indeed. At Bellagio we walked the long path through the garden of Villa Donnabella clear to the top where the old ~~ruins~~ ~~crowns~~ the hill. Magnificent view of the Lecco and Como basins. Bought an inland box at store for 6 for a pretty thing of olive wood inland made at the factory in Bellagio.

October,

SUNDAY 18.

1903.

Arrived at Murren at 5 P.M.
Left car. A fine ride through
the Tyrol. The last hour, a
flat country of no special
interest. Saw many fine old
castles along route. One at
Kufstein especially fine and
large. An old fortress -

We came to Pension Glockner
Maximilian Strasse where
we have a fine, large,
double room. It rained
all day and we had

we went to Palace and
were shown through with
a guide and the usual mob.

authority - for many centuries.
Took a carriage and drove
for an hour. Saw the fine
castle with - magnificent
gardens behind, and statue
of Walter von der Vogelweide in
front. Went - into - the Cathedral
but could not go around as it was
during service. Went to the
Newminster and looked down
into - the open crypt where were
interred St's Hilain, Kolonat and
Tolman the special saints of Franconia.
On outside saw tablet erected
by the Ludwig I to Walter von der
Vogelweide, with - dish and birds
feeding. Drove over two fine
bridges, the old Main bridge
with - 10 statues of Saints and
leopard bridge with - carved lions. Had
fine view of fortress of Marienberg -
1650. Site formerly occupied by the
bishops castle, taken by G. Adolfus,

(A woman (Athens))
Weimar, Hotel Erb Prinz -

November, TUESDAY 3. 1903.

Reached Weimar at 7.30. Passed through Erfurt after dark, would have liked to stop off because of the connection with - Luther's early life. Napoleon also lived there his council of Princes. This morning went at once to the Goethe house and had guide etc to ourselves and plenty of time. House full of interesting objects - and associations. Walked to Old castle and the House and crossed the bridge to see Museum of Goethe & Schiller. After dinner visited Schiller House and later Liegt's house.

The woman who showed us around lived with - Liegt for many years and remembered Miss Healy Stevens and Army Day among his pupils - The House filled with - elegant gifts from royal and noble friends of the great musicians. This A.M. went also to the church where Herder preached 26 years. died 1803. Goethe died 1832. Wieland died 1813. Schiller died

Saw the rooms in which Goethe died in his chair and where Schiller died in low single bed. Saw Goethe, Schiller, Wieland, Herder & Liegt monuments. Walked to the cemetery to see chapel where Goethe and Schiller are buried.

November, WEDNESDAY 4. 1903.

The old castle of Wartburg, the scene of Luthers work is distant only $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours from Weimar by rail, in province of Eisenach - Would have gone out - had weather been fine. A dark, cloudy day, walked to Regie Platz and saw soldiers in castle yard, later saw the Grand Duke in carriage with attendants - drove toward castle - Last eye saw the Duchess in front - with the Duchess drove into castle grounds, she was bowing constantly to the people along the way - Afternoon took car out to Falkenburg through a fine avenue of trees, and walked nearly out to Schloss Belvedere - Got ticket and gave it up, went to St Jacobs Kirche and saw fresco of Cranach the artist and Hechstette Becker who took the part of Euphrosyne in Goethes play. Goethes wife also buried here, but did not find the spot.

November, THURSDAY 5. 1903.

Came on here yesterday P.M. arriving

Passed a wretched night. Had a chill and had to get up and take more whiskey. Had to read my other letters of some cousin Cornelia, Elsie House, Inez H. and from people about letters of credit. I feel as if I could take no interest in any of it now. Would like to crawl off into my own room away from everybody, but have to keep up. Wrote to Annette and to Millard this morning. 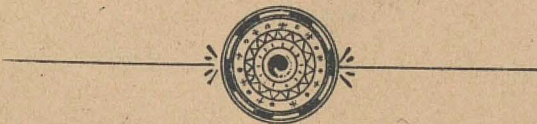

This afternoon walked over the Ponte Vecchio to Pitti and Boboli gardens only to find them closed. Read in Mediceal "Florence" and guide books this evening.

A fine bright day. Yesterday's much
dried and good walking. Went

to the glory of the Dominican Order.
