In 1899, an important tradition of recording the University's history began. A couple of passionate Nevada students created the Artemisia that would develop into over 100 years of documenting campus history. Through two world wars, 108 ASUN Presidents, and the creation of the internet, the Artemisia carried on, until a lack of funding for student publications hit from the recession in 2008. This requisite document has become a lost art and tradition of the University. Pictures and information of our institution can be easily found online or on social media today; however, this can neither relate nor complete the story of this publication. Artemisia transitioned into what is now today, Insight Magazine, which includes student stories as a modern form of media. This Artemisia volume sets to inspire readers to look back on the stories of nearly 150 years and to appreciate the shared history among past generations of Nevada students. The hope is that the Artemisia is supported in future years to remember and appreciate the successes, defeats, and ambitions of our beloved University of Nevada, Reno. We look back in fondness and an equal amount of pride for the future.

The history documented in the Artemisia compliments the advancements made on our campus. We have transformed from a cow college in an untraditional setting for higher education, into the greatest institution in the world. Larry Struve, 1964 Nevada graduate and Nevada public servant, reflects on the importance of dedications to preserve records, and still references his copy of the Artemisia today. Former federal Senator, Nevada Governor, and ASUN President of 1959, Richard Bryan, took actions to preserve historical records in his many years in Nevada public service. In their actions to make documentation of history accessible, future generations may know how democracy responded to the needs of society, so that young people may be inspired by the practices and qualities of history's successful leaders. In that pursuit, we present this edition of the Artemisia: reviving tradition, making history.

This edition holds a collection of photos and information as a year in review from 2022 to 2023, but the bigger goal of restarting the Artemisia is to inspire readers to reflect on the unique history of the University of Nevada, Reno.







BACK IN TIME... ARTEMISIA 1924 OUR UNIVERSITY— MAY IT LIVE FOREVER!

"THE University's first fifty years! And what a fifty years for man!

Fifty years of magic in business and of miracle in science! Space defied by telephone, wireless, automobile and aeroplane! Time defied by steel structures and perfected power machinery! Pain conquered by anaesthetics and plague by sanitation and by serum! The unheard become audible, the unseen visible, the uncountable numbered and the unmeasurable fathomed! Matter itself challenged in its last electron lair!

Explorers, victors over farthest north and farthest south, *annexers* of the last island, climbers nearing the summit of the highest peak! Deciphered tablets, unearthed cities and unsealed tombs trebling the years of history! Timeless strata, with prehistoric Yoricks lengthening the human story to half a million years !

Fifty years so changeful that Tutankhamen would have less difficulty to get his mental and material bearings in the world of 1874 than would the man of 1874 to adjust to the mechanics and the thought of 1924!

Yet, great as have been the achievements of this half century of marvels, greater must follow. Much is to learn and much to do before man shall make conquest in the true human levels, the social and the spiritual worlds. Who has laid the Malthusian ghost? Who has resolved the clash of nationality or the riddle of race? Who has shown Democracy how to widen leisure without enlarging the Devil's workshop or how to develop and to avail itself of great leadership rather than to remain at the dull levels of mediocrity or to sink through octracism? Who has pointed the way to a world of peace, without softened thews and regnant sentimentalism or to a world of plenty, without hucksters at the helm and blind idlers in the lookout?

To realize the highest potentials of every man and woman in all the world is the great goal. Men cannot become more like gods merely by heaping banquet-boards, by multiplying garments, by running to and fro on longer journeys or by widening the range of gossip. These things mark men as luxuriating animals only. If the race is truly to grow, to increase in soul stature, better ways must be found to lessen uncleanness, greed, selfishness and pride and to widen cleanness, charity, comrade-ship and reverence. Constructive search after truth, creation and appreciation of beauty, perfecting of will to serve, development of humility, tolerance and spiritual vision — these are of the upper air in which alone souls breathe.

For fifty years our University has been an upland of truth, a temple of beauty, a shrine from which men and women have gone with shining faces to serve their day. May the heroisms of this, its morning half century, the heroisms of pioneering builders and of alumni, that first eight hundred, scattered, laboriny in all lands, inspire us and myriads after us throughout its everlasting day ! May an endless company of men and women, their torches lighted at the broadening altars on this hill, go forth as light bearers for the race to bring nearer and nearer the day when all the earth shall be radiant in the glory of the light that never was on land or sea!




SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK

BACK IN TIME... ARTEMISIA 1928




THE UNIVERSITY OF NEVADA was founded at Elko in 1874 and moved to Reno in 1886. Since the erection of the first building at Reno, the growth of the institution has been consistent and rapid. Over one-half of the present Campus structures are visible from the Tram and lie mirrored in Manzanita Lake — an artificial body of water sustained the year around. The long building at the extreme left of the panorama sweep is Manzanita Hall, the women's old dormitory; and directly to the rear and merging into it is the dining hall. Farther to the right

and partially screened by the low willow tree is Artemisia Hall, the women's new dormitory; while just to the left of the center at the head of the lake is Lincoln Hall, the men's dormitory. To the right of the fold and barely visible, are the Hospital and Education Buildings. Nearest the shore of the lake and in full view is the Agriculture Building, which hides part of the white sandstone Chemistry Building. Dwarfed by surrounding structures, a corner of the old Library is visible between the Chemistry Building and the Alice McManus Clark Memorial Library, the long structure extending nearly to the right extremity of the view.







University of Nevada, Reno President Brian Sandoval arrived in style to the Gateway Parking Complex ribbon-cutting ceremony in an original 1960s Batmobile. The event celebrated the completion of the parking complex, which opened to the University community and public on January 20, 2023. The seven-story complex is located on the southwest corner of Lake and East Ninth Streets in the Mathewson University Gateway. It includes 814 parking spaces for use by University students, faculty, staff and visitors as well as a pedestrian bridge on the north end of the garage, allowing people to safely cross Ninth Street onto the University campus.




NEW MACKAY FIELD





The Mackay Song






MACKAY SACRIFICE

Be it the aim of Nevada records to speak truth, to be the voice of the Nevada spirit, that the future may build on the present, and retrospection be mellow.





