Students Must Wear Uniforms Continually If Regents Decide.

The members of the Board of Regents will discuss a question of special importance to the students at their meeting this morning. If the Regents pass favorably on the proposed question, every student will be compelled to wear his uniform at all times.

An old alumnus has made the request that the subject be treated by the regents, but his name could not be learned. He seems to take great interest in University affairs, and no one can explain what his object is in putting such a question before the Board of Regents.

## R. M. Brambila who Has Won Honor in Regular Army Will Be Military Instructor at His Alma Mater.

The University has just received an affirmative reply to its request for the appointment of R. M. Brambila 1st Lieutenant 14th Infantry U. S. A., to be Military Instructor at the University of Nevada, for a period of three years beginning Sept. 1st, 1905.

Lieutenant Brambila is a graduate of the University of the class of '97. During his college days he was very popular and familiarly known as "Toby". In his Senior year, 96-97, he was Captain of the Cadet Corps. After graduation he passed very credibly the examinations for entrance into the United States Army and entered as 2nd Lieutenant in the 23 Infantry.

Lieutenant Brambila has been very active in the military operations in the East. He took part in the Philippine campaign and he marched to the relief of Peking during the Boxer insurrection. The 14th Infantry, of which he was a member was the first troop to enter the sacred portals of the ancient Chinese capital. This year Lieutenant Brambila will add another bar to his shoulder straps.
