NEVADA'S LAWMAKERS VISIT STATE UNIVERSITY

Several Members Addressed the General Assembly of the Faculty and Students Friday.

The members of the present session of the Nevada Legislature took a short recess last week, and on Friday visited the University in a body. The following members composed the party: Senators W. C. Gallagher of White Pine, T. L. Oddie of Nye, Osear Graham of Elko, John O'Kane of Humboldt; Robert Raffrice of Eureka and N. W. Roff of Washoe, and Assemblymen J. A. Clark, A. Gifford and W. E. Williams of Lincoln; F. M. Clark and W. O. Moorman of White Pine; P. Anker and C. G. Smith of Humboldt; Walter Hastings, E. R. Dodge, T. J. Jones, J. W. Wright, A. W. Holmes, and R. H. Kinney of Washoe; E. Sadler and F. J. Brossemer of Eureka; T. B. Belzer of Esmeralda; B. C. McCann of Nye; E. L. McMahon of Elko and F. A. Regan of Lyon. The purpose of their visit was to become acquainted with the needs of the University.

Shortly after their arrival on the campus, the lawmakers were escorted to the gymnasium, where they listened to the address of Dr. L. W. Cushman on Everyman. When he finished his speech, Dr. J. E. Stubbs called the following gentlemen to the platform: Senators T. L. Oddie and John McKane and Assemblyman J. W. Wright, E. R. Dodge and W. E. Williams.

Senator Oddie was the first speaker to address the faculty and students. He said that the state was a battleground and that future generations must fight the battles. He told how the graduates of this institution had acquitted themselves nobly in the conquest of the Southern desert. "There are many difficulties to overcome in life, and if we are successful, our victory will be great," said the Senator in closing his remarks.

Senator O'Kane of Humboldt

was totally unprepared for a speech when Dr. Stubbs called on him, but his remarks were interesting as he gave the students the benefits of his many years of practical experience.

Assemblyman W. E. Williams of Lincoln made one of the most interesting speeches of the day. He said in part: "I do not desire to appear before you in a fatherly attitude, for in that position I would be an inglorious failure. Many believe it is a disgrace to perform manual labor, but God pity those who hold such views. I have made history the study of my life because it has kept out of my mind all selfish thoughts. Bible history is especially alluring. Divine thoughts come from the study of history. A thought that appealed especially to me was the last words of an old Catholic priest: 'No man ever did me an injury.'"

E. R. Dodge entertained the audience by his witty remarks on various subjects, and by his amusing anecdotes. He said: The people of the world are all members in stock company of Everyman, and everyone is working for himself". He said that nearly all the members of the legislature were self-made men, and that the story of Senator Oddie was not a picture of romance.

After the speeches had been finished, President Stubbs announced the program for the remainder of the day.

After assembly the visiting lawmakers, under the guidance of Prof. G. J. Young of the mining department, visited the site of the proposed mining and metallurgical laboratories. Here was described to them the facings and dimensions of the proposed building, the bill for which they are soon to make or kill. The next proceeding was to witness the regular drill of the cadet battalion under Capt. C. T.

Boyd. Despite the wind, the battalion executed the different movements in a creditable manner.

After fifteen minutes of drill inspection a move was made towards the dining hall. It is needless to state the move was not listless. During the progress of luncheon, E. R. Dodge of Washoe made a neat little speech, expressing the thanks of his brother solons for the entertainment and complimenting the meal. A unanimous vote in favor of the new dining hall was taken at the conclusion of Assembly-Dodge's talk. After dinner, cigars having been lighted, further needs and contemplated improvements were inspected.

The sight for the proposed dam was first in order. Here was explained the great source of beauty, the aid to sanitary conditions, and the means of recreation such an improvement will be. From the point of this observation, the site for the new dining hall could be seen on the left. The legislators then proceeded to Manzanita Hall. The improvements contemplated here are among the most necessary and sometime was spent in describing the portico. The University in general favors the granting of this bill. Nevadans are noted for chivalry. The inconvenience to the young ladies of the University in having no portico to their dormitory has been borne long enough. We take for granted this bill will be passed. We suggest that ample arrangements for lighting the portico be not forgotten.

Dr. Stubbs then escorted the lawmakers to his home. A bill for an appropriation to remove the debt of \$9418.70 will be presented this week.

During the progress of the investigation of the grounds, the plan of the University to secure a mounted chemical fire engine at a cost of \$675 delivered, was discussed. The

ASSEMBLY ADDRESS

BY DR. CUSHMAN

Dr. L. W. Cushman, Professor of the department of English, gave the General Assembly address last Friday on the play Everyman, which will soon be given in the Opera House. The members of the Legislature the attaches, and many friends of the University were present on the occasion, and listened attentively to the address.

He first related how the drama had been developed in Greece, and how it had reached its highest point under the three tragic writers. He spoke of how the writers of the middle ages had reached the same plane although their work had been of a wholly independent nature.

He traced the development of such plays as Everyman from the earliest times. The mystery and morality play which were followed by the works of Shakespeare, were fully described.

In order that the students might become acquainted with all the details of the play, the Doctor gave a summary of Everyman. Throughout the whole evening, there is one continuous scene. The play was founded on the Black Death, which terrorized all Europe. The underlying theme of the play is the clash between man and the evils of this world. This feature is ever predominant, and this idea will be impressed thoroughly on the minds of anyone who attends the play next Tuesday evening.

Historical Research Society Interested

During the past week, the Indians of the Washoe and Piute tribes held a love feast at the camps back of the University campus. It will probably be remembered that during the early days of this state these two tribes were very often engaged in deadly conflict. It is interesting to note, therefore, that a reconciliation of their many difficulties should take place at our very gates. We are sorry, however, that the news of this reconciliation should come to us so late as to deprive the students of an opportunity of witnessing the ceremonies. Dr. Church and Prof. Weir of attended the festival on a number of evenings in the interest of historical research. We will not divulge any of their observations, inasmuch as we realize our inferiority to these enterprising members of the faculty in the art of story telling.

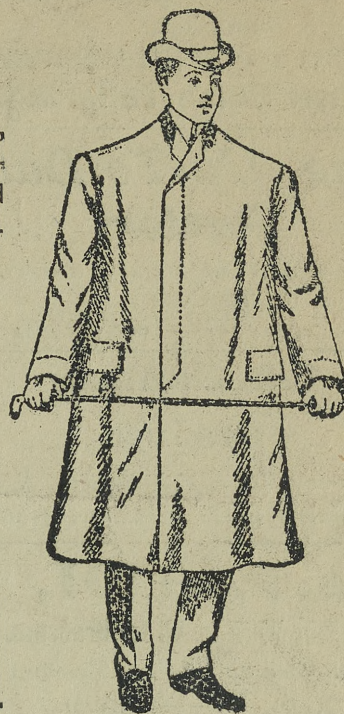
