## TELEGRAPHED TO EASTERN MEN

### Asked if They Still Want Position of Physical Director.

The joint meeting of the executive committee occurred last evening as was scheduled. A number of applications for a physical director were read. After much discussion the committee decided to telegraph to James A. Vaughn, of Dartmouth College, and C. A. Fairweather, of the University of Illinois, and ask them if they were still willing to accept the position.

The Reno High School made an application for the use of the University track. The request was denied because it would not be fair for the other high schools in the state. The High School did not appreciate what the University did for it two years ago, and it is the general opinion that it should not be allowed to train on the track.

B. G. McBride reported the condition of the finances. All outstanding bills have been turned in, and the debts of the association amount only to \$43.06.

The question of the coming academic field day was taken up and discussed. Elko and Reno have already sent in their list of men who are eligible to enter the field day. Tonapah would like to become a member of the league. Nearly every high school in the state will be represented. The

meet will take place on May 15.

The following is the substance of the report presented by the chairman of the faculty committee on athletics: a new constitution should be adopted because there are defects in the present constitution, and it should be drafted by the officers of the association. The present one will be adopted except where changes are deemed essential. The name shall be changed from Athletic Association to Student Body or Associated Students. The present name is too narrow to cover the interests managed by the association. The purpose shall be to govern athletics, debating, and other interests. The faculty hall be stricken from the membership list.

There shall be a committee of five members for each branch of athletics. One shall be chosen from each college class and the other shall be named by the association without regard to rank. They shall act as an advisory committee. The executive committee shall be composed of the four officers, the various managers, and the advisory committee of the faculty. A personal notice of every meeting shall be served on the members. The faculty committees on athletics and debating shall constitute the advisory board. The powers of the executive committee are limited defined: 1 to apportion the funds to the various branches of athletics, subject to the ratification of the student body, 2 to audit the accounts of the treasurer and managers, and approve all requisitions presented.

## UNIVERSITY TEAM TALKS AT ASSEMBLY

### Nevada Debaters Give Short Talk on a Variety of Subjects.

In order to give the University debaters who are to meet Stanford on the rostrum a little practice, the assembly hour yesterday was given over to them. Each of the three debaters had prepared a speech for the occasion. J. W. Ayres, the debating coach, presided at the meeting, and introduced the different speakers.

D. M. McDonald '06 was the first speaker. He took for his theme "Some Features of Yellow Journalism" He gave many examples of the evils caused by these yellow journals. Louis Goldstein '07 gave a very interesting address on "Tallyrand at Vienna." The greatness of this man who by his diplomacy gained the end for which he was striving was impressed upon the audience. J. D. Scott '06 addressed the assembly at considerable length on "Benedict Arnold at Saratoga." The purpose of his speech was to prove that one incident in a person's life cannot be taken as a criterion for his whole career. The most noteworthy feature of the day was the small attendance.

The regular semi-monthly meeting of the English Club took place last evening in Room 6.

## MANY APPLICANTS FOR MINERALOGIST

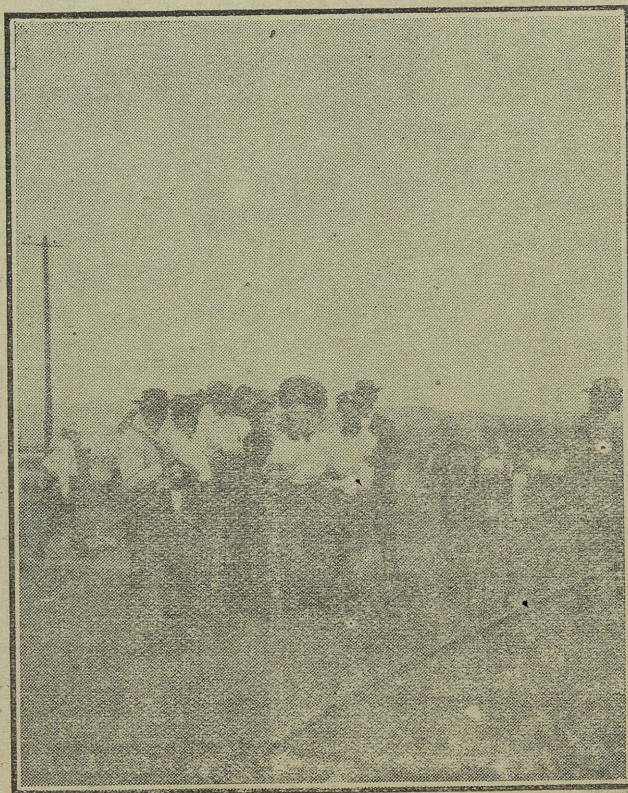
### Dr. George Louderback Is Prominently Mentioned For Position

There is just now going on in the State of California the sharpest kind of a fight over the appointment to the position of state mineralogist, now held by Lewis E. Aubury. The struggle involves the two great universities of California, the State miners' association and the United States Geological survey. The aspirants for the position are many and of high position in the mining and scientific world.

Mr. Aubury is a candidate to succeed himself. Among his opponents are Dr. George Louderback, of the University of Nevada and a graduate of the University of California, also A. W. Ransome, one of California's greatest fullbacks. Other candidates are Lewis Janin, E. H. Benjamin, H. W. Turner, W. H. Storms, Lewis Bond, Waldemar Lindgren and W. L. Watts, all prominent mining men and all having strong backing. The fight appears to be largely directed to defeating Louderback, who is considered the University candidate, as the charge has been brought up by Senator W. C. Ralston that the University is seeking to wrest control of the office from the miners.—Daily Californian.

**PROFESSORS PLANT  
MOUNTAIN PINES**

**Nevada Academy of Sci-  
ences Sets Aside Day for  
Planting of Trees**

The Nevada Academy of Science has set aside today as Academy Tree Day, and the members of the association will plant trees on the hillsides of the mountains near town. About two hundred pine trees have been purchased, and those who take the trip feel that they can dispose of this number without any difficulty. The following professors have signified their intention of taking the trip: J. E. Church, P. B. Kennedy, R. A. Adams, Henry Thurtell and Geo. J. Young. It is probable that a few of the wives of the professors will be members of the party. The party will leave early this morning and will spend the entire day in planting trees. An ample number of shovels have been provided, so no worry need be felt from that source. All the work will be under the supervision of Professor Kennedy.

The setting aside of such a day was inaugurated last year by the society, and their efforts did not prove as successful as they desired. Of the two hundred trees planted only seven lived. Those placed in shady spots and where there was an abundance of water thrived far better than the others. The members intend to profit by last year's experience.

It is probable that the lecture be given about May 10.

Prof. H. F. Ardley will arrive in Reno on April 24, and his lecture are scheduled for the two days following. The topic of his first lecture is "Egyptian Art." On the second evening he will discuss "decorative art." Dr. L. W. Cushman has already secured thirty-four names on the sustaining membership list of the English club.
