MAMMOTH CAVE FOUND IN NEVADA

AN INTERESTING CAVE DISCOVERED NEAR LOVELOCK—PROF. JONES HAS BEEN SENT OUT TO INVESTIGATE THE REPORT—CAVE IS IN AN ISOLATED HILL

It was recently learned at the university that several Indian relics had been found in a cave near Lovelock and Prof. Jones was sent out to investigate the report.

The hill is formed of a white granular marble that resembles dampened granular sugar in texture and firmness.

The entrance to the cave was originally through a wide horizontal cleft that pitched rather steeply back into the hill.

The cave was originally nearly filled with a mixture of bat guano and refuse brought in by the Indians who had inhabited the cave contemporaneously with the bats.

The cave was formed some time during the period of Lake Lahontan but the exact date of the formation of the guano can only be fixed with the closer identification of the Indian relics.

WHY A ONE DAY VACATION?

Why do we have only one day vacation at Thanksgiving? For two years now this fad has been practiced on the students without a good reason either sociological, pedagogical, physiological or psychological. The only reason that has thus far been advanced by anyone has attributed it to whims. What has been the effect of this curtailing this vacation is hard to tell in all its details but a few of the most evident effects can be perceived by any observer.

In the first place all the students grumble and become dissatisfied with the school in general and the vacation policy in particular. This produces disloyalty and all know that there is enough of that now. Next is that Thanksgiving is no vacation under the present plan as all the students must study twice as hard on a holiday of this nature as on any other

day to accomplish the same amount of work. Many of the students will not study and the wide-awake professors do not expect them to, and consequently Friday is a day of broken up classes. Again, students living within a short distance of the school will go home because they have not been home since August and their parents expect them and so will take great chances to go. Also, the present practice is in violation to collegiate custom throughout the American nation and those acquainted with these customs hold the University in contempt in trying to start something new. So this, the latest fad of only two years duration should be abandoned because it produces a disloyal student body; it is not a vacation but a day of work. All the students living close by will break the University rules and thus start a bad precedent and it is a breaking of an old American college custom.

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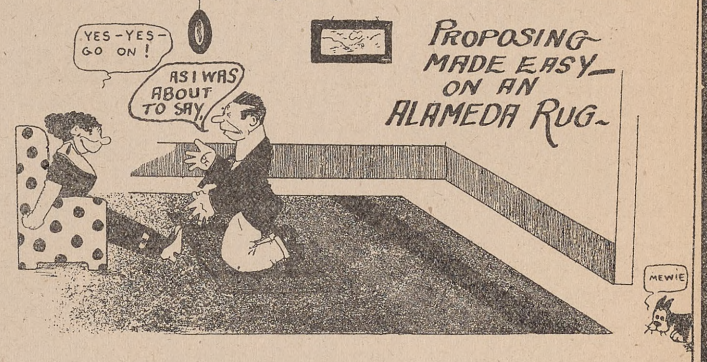
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**"SOME" SHOW AT

A half-breed of the Sioux Indian
is Miss Betty Caldwell, who is play-
ing the part of "Flower" in the musi-
cal comedy, "The Flower of the
Ranch", coming to the Majestic Tues-
day and Wednesday evenings. Miss
Caldwell was born in Oklahoma Terri-
tory nineteen years ago. Her mother
was a full blood Sioux, her father a
white man who was one of the first
to stake a claim when the strip was
opened up in 1889. They lived on
the ranch for nearly fourteen years
and then sold it and moved to Kan-
sas City, where the father was en-
gaged in the live stock business. This
change brought about splendid op-
portunities for an education, of which
Miss Caldwell made the best. In a
recent interview regarding herself
and the part of "Flower", Miss Cald-
well has the following to say:

"Oh, I am so glad that my mother
was an Indian, for the older I grow,
the more I realize that the North
American Indian is fast becoming ex-
tinct, and I have a feeling of love
for the race and, in fact, I really be-
lieve that every true American down
in his heart has a feeling of deep
regret when they realize the crush-
ing defeat that the redman has ex-
perienced; yet I realize it is all for
the best, for I can see both sides as
I travel about in this great country.
There is one thing that I notice, and
that is the attention that is some
times shown me, for the Americans
and Canadians are alike in their cur-
iosity to meet me, simply because I
am a descendant of the Indian; and
so few are in the theatrical profes-
sion. It seems that in the part of
'Flower' I actually live and breathe
the ranch atmosphere. It gives me
a longing for the level plains to be
there riding a broncho, helping the
cowboys during the round-up and to
mingle with the wild steers. Yet I
like the part of 'Flower' and hope
that I shall play the part for seasons
to come."

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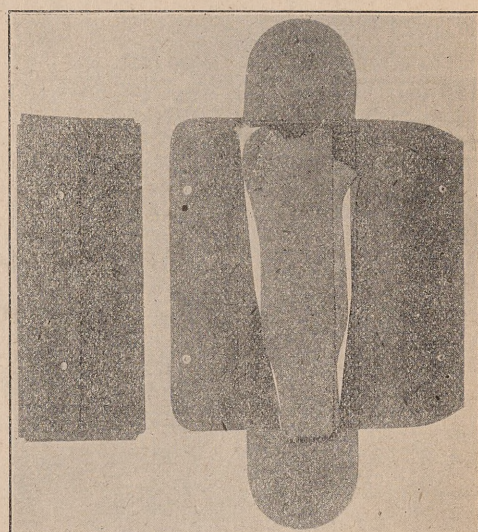
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Sophs Win Fast Game
