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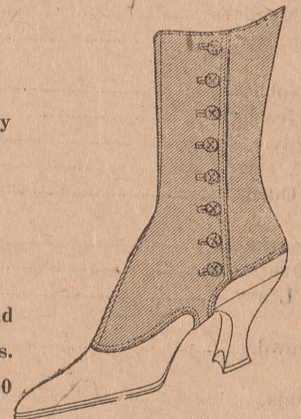
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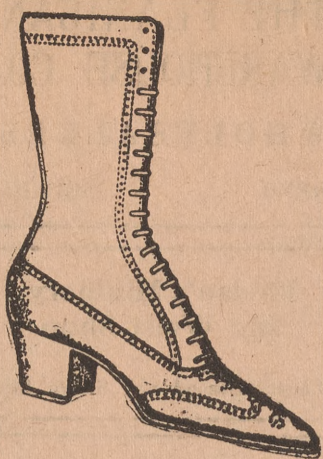

scattered three hundred feet apart for safety.

Many kinds of engineering were involved in the construction and equipment of the plant. Civil engineering was most extensively involved in the sewer and water systems, construction of railroads and highways, and surveying of grounds. The water supply of the plant involves the pumping of 90,000,000 gallons of water per day from the Kanawha river, this quantity being exceeded by the supplies of only four cities in the United States. One-half of this amount has to be passed through settling basins and also filtered. There are four different distribution pipes for the water supply. The sewer system is of relatively large capacity to take off the wash water passing through the manufacturing process and also to provide a means of disposing of storm waters.

The railroad system consists of twenty-five miles of standard gauge and forty-five miles of narrow gauge all within the grounds. It involves a great deal of railroad yard detail and switch work and considerable sharp curvature.

The maximum number of employes working on construction was about 18,500. When complete the plant will require a working staff of about 12,000 employes.

A great variety of mechanical, electrical and chemical machinery and apparatus is housed in the different buildings. The housing of employes, both on construction and for operation, involved all the problems common to city planning.

The plant is already making powder and probably will be ready to operate to full capacity by the end of the year. The greatest dangers in the process of manufacture are from fire in the powder areas and burning of employes in the acid manufacture and nitrating areas. Many of the buildings are provided with galvanized iron chutes so that workmen can make a quick exit from upper stories of the buildings. These are used in preference to the old-style fire escapes. In the acid manufacture ample provision of shower baths and water tanks are necessary to quickly wash off acid that is spilt on employes.

It is figured that when this plant is complete it will have cost the sum of \$6,000,000. There is only one larger plant in the United States and that is the duPont plant now operating at Nashville, Tenn., for the government.
