ADDITIONS MADE TO METAL LAB.

Several New Up-to-Date Machines Arrive for Mackay School of Mines

There was added this week to the equipment of the Metallurgy Department, a new polishing machine to be used in preparing specimens of metals and alloys for micriscopic examination. This branch of metallurgy, known as metallography, is a comparatively recent science. It is sometimes considered as a branch of physical metallurgy. t has been chiefly developed during he past 25 years and has now become one of the most important methods of examining metals. All of the large inamount of structural and other metals and alloys have laboratories specially equipped for this line of work.

By this method of examination there s revealed the physical and often the chemical composition of the metal or alloy. While the chemist can determine very accurately the elements composing an alloy he cannot always predict the physical properties or tell the mechanical arrangement of the various constituents, nor can he tell at all times the reasons for defects in the metal or alloy, this can very often be done after microscopic examination. Not only can the presence of flaws and impurities be detected but their nature and extent can be determined.

In order to carry out this study a surface of the specimen must be very finely polished and all scratches removed, this operation is very tedious hand. The new machine just received is used for this purpose and very greatly shortens the time necessary to polish a specimen.

This method of study has become so important that it is now used by geologists to study igneous rocks and ores and more recently has been used in the study of cements and slags. The science is capable of even further ex-

During the past month, besides this new polishing machine, a new variable speed motor, which is one of the best made has been added to the equipment. This motor will be used to operate the Janney Flotation machine and has been greatly needed for a long

Unique Method of Supplying Food to Animals Makes for Cheap Production

The biggest news feature of the week was the announcement made yesterday of the forming of the Cat Hide Co. This company intends to produce for the market enough cat hides to enable every girl from the working girl to those poor human beings who inhabit Manzanita Hall to wear her

own furs. The plan is a very simple one and will require but little capital. I wo big sections of government land be secured in the vicinity of Reno and secured fenced in. In one section be the cats whose fur will soon grace the necks of our Reno girls while in the other section will be kept the rats.

The idea of having the two animals so close together is that the rats will multiply fast enough to be fed to the cats while the bodies of the cats after they have been skinned will be fed to ly increasing number of cats and rats the rats. Thus we will have a constantcan skin at least twenty cats in a day and that these skins will bring from ten to a hundred dollars apiece, depending on the color of the fur and the quality of the same. The cost of operating the farms is very small as can be seen by the above cost estimates while the profits will be enormous. The idea has already been patented so there is no chance of serious competition arising.

Stock in the company will be on sale at a later date and will be offered to University students at half price. Faculty members will be alloted their share at the first meeting of the University stockholders at a somewhat higher price but still under that which the public will have to pay for it. The stock sale will be handled by I. Bull & Co.


