





There will possibly be injustice done in a few cases where students have been particularly active in athletics or other student activities to such an extent that their college work has suffered by it as it is bound to, more or less, but the probability is that the cases will be few indeed. Eligibility for participation in athletics, for example, is dependent upon a fair degree of scholarship so the chances are that the number affected by this feature will be very small.
