Town Students Vote Davis; Faculty Turn Coolidge, as Do the Women

University of Nevada students would put Calvin Coolidge in the White House for a second term, according to a straw vote taken on the Campus Tuesday by The Sagebrush and the Nevada State Journal. Up to Tuesday night, returns from 575 had been tabu These figures included both lated. members of the student body and mem bers of the faculty.

The complete returns of the vote showed that Coolidge had been given preference over Davis by only seven votes. LaFollette was 99 votes behind Coolidge and 92 votes behind Davis in The Sagebrush-Journal presidential bal lot.

The total number of votes for each of the three candidates was Coolidge, 227; Davis, 220, and LaFollette, 128. Frat Vote Heavy

Voting was heaviest among the fraternity and sorority group. The fraternities voted 69 ballots for Coolidge; 59 for Davis, and 38 for La Follette. Sororities gave Coolidge 43 votes; Davis 35 votes, and LaFollette 31 votes.

Manzanita Hall, the women's dormi tory, was for Coolidge when the women cast 41 ballots in his favor as against gineering. 33 for Davis and seven for LaFollette
