





FROGS AND BUGS FROGS AND BUGS AND ANIMALCULA SILVER SHOE GOAL GIVE PROFS WOE

Collecting material for the zoology classes is often as much work as the teaching in the actual classes accord-ing to the instructors in the biology department. The work in these courses is progressive, so that material can-not be used as gathered. Each year new specimens must be secured and preserved for the succeed-ing classes. This necessitates much work in summer and winter for Mr. Le Roy Brown, instructor in biology, who gathers the local material used in the teaching of zoology. Frogs Are Croaked In Spring For Winter

Trogs which are not used until the beginning of the second semester in January, are hunted along the ditches and the lake about this time during the breeding season. The hydra or primitive plant-like animals are se-cured in Manzanita lake, as are the flatworms which are found in late whiter on the rocks around the edge One winter Mr. Brown had to break through three inches of ice to find the worms.

Small snalls are obtained on the hake but the larger ones are found in the sloughs of the Truckee river. When the Orr ditch is empty Mr. Erown gathers the needed mussels which are plentiful in its bottom. The crayfish, kin to the crab, in-habits the Truckee also and Mr. Brown has found a slough above Chisms where they are easily captured. 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
