## Wolf Pack Will Be Out After St. Mary's on October 24

### CONTEST WILL BE PLAYED AT SAN FRANCISCO

Nevada Bucks Against Veteran Team on Saturday

### SAINTS PLAY CAL. Game Against Wolves May Cause Dope Changes

One week from tomorrow the Wolves meet the powerful St. Mary's team at Ewing Field in San Francisco. This looks like one of the hardest games of the conference. The Saints have a veteran squad and are playing their fourth year with the Notre Dame shift. Madigan is a clever coach and they will be playing on their home field. Nevada has something to buck against.

The team at present looks ready for the battle, and unless there are casualties tomorrow, will enter the fray with every man in the line-up with the exception of "Billie" Gutterer.

Have Won Two Games  
St. Mary's this season have played two colleges and came out ahead in both—Whittier, 45 to 6, and the Davis Aggies, 32 to 13. Tomorrow they play California, and dope may be upset if they should score a win. Last year they came very close to it, scores to the contrary, and they are out to show the Bears that they can come back.

Both Captain "Ducky" Grant and "Red" Strader, who have been on the injured list most of this season, expect to play against California. They are two of the reliables of the squad, Grant being an accurate kicker and Strader the hardest man on the coast to stop on line plays. Strader was picked last year for a position on one of Walter Camp's all-star elevens.

Saint Line-up  
"Dutch" Conlan, the Saints best quarterback, is at the line-up again this year and it will be up to "Whitey" Lawson to out-wit him. Conlan was hurt early last year and did not play for the greater part of the season, but he is a man who knows how to use his head in an emergency.

Rooney, Underhill and Merrick seem to be the best bets for the rest of the backfield. Rooney and Underhill are both clever open field runners, and Merrick bucks the line in good form.

Veteran Line  
On the line, Scarlett and O'Rourke, ends, are both heavy but fast men. They are both exceptionally tall and have a habit of snagging passes out of the thin air. Collins and Lawless, either of whom may be put in at end, are both men to be reckoned with also. Although Corrigan and Hungerford will be missed at guard and tackle, Madigan has two veterans for each position besides the new fellows. Bettencourt is almost sure to rate the pivot job, as Lorigan is not with the squad this year. Bettencourt has been center understudy for two years now and showed that he knows the position by his playing against U. S. C. last season.

Shaw vs. Madigan  
If the change of attitude does not effect the Wolves, they should make a good showing against the Saints, and the shift as worked in Nevada will have its real test against the shift used by Madigan. Both Shaw and "Slim" Madigan learned their football from Rockne, and although "Buck" has the latest angles on the play, Madigan has almost developed a system of his own.

A great deal will depend on whether the quarterback can think fast enough to outwit a team playing his own game. Nevada plays Santa Clara the week following the St. Mary's game, and the scores will be balanced to make dope for the "Little Big Game." So, aside from conference honors, the game on October 24 will mean a great deal to St. Mary's, and the Wolf Pack is the stumbling block.

Santa Clara won 6 to 0, from Fresno State College, the latter showing unexpected strength in holding their opponents to such a small score.
