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MACKAY DAY OPENS NOMINATIONS

JUNIOR WEEK TO FOLLOW EASTER; MANY FEATURES ARE SCHEDULED

"Clean Cords" Will Be Asked of Men On Wednesday BIG '49 DANCE Prizes To Be Given For Best Costumes On Saturday

Junior week, a time of revelry for the juniors will begin with sunup Monday morning. The first big feature of the week however will be a banquet for juniors only at the Lincoln Hotel at Sparks, Tuesday evening at 7:30. Wednesday will initiate clean cords day. All juniors will be expected to wear clean cords on that day. Seniors are also invited to participate in this pastime. An attempt will be made on the part of the juniors to make clean cords day a tradition on the Campus. Cut Day Thursday has been designated as the annual cut day, and the junior picnic will be at Bower's Mansion. All picnickers are to be at the University library at 9:30 Thursday morning. A sign-up list for those who can get cars for this day has been posted on the bulletin board. Friday morning at 11:25 some of the juniors will put on tents before the student body in the Auditorium of the Education building. As the culmination of junior week a '49 dance that will be greater in its scope than any that has ever been attempted on the Hill will be given the students Saturday night according to a decision made by the committee in charge of the affair at a meeting held Tuesday. All final arrangements for the occasion are nearly complete, and there will be but one more meeting before the dance. '49 Dance Assured The decision to hold a '49 dance in place of the Whiskerino was made two weeks ago when it was found that formal dances were making too deep inroads on the whisker growing activity. At that time the '49 dance was suggested, and various members of the committee in charge began working on such a plan to test its feasibility, and now the means and methods of giving the dance on a big scale are assured, according to Robert Stewart, chairman of the committee. The dance is to be a costume affair with the old mining and cattle-king spirit running wild. Three valuable prizes are to be awarded. One for the best costume, one for the best couple, and one for the most humorous make-up. New Decorations Although the inside decorations will not be announced until next week with the program of the evening; the men in charge are guaranteeing a novel and new idea in the way of "atmospheric" decorations. The spirit of the old boom camps and cattle-punching days will be given full sway in the Gym. There will also be a number of entertaining features about the hall to keep the dancers busy during the intermissions. The largest and most secretive of these side shows will be in the west wing of the building. Characterizations Wanted Characterization of such pugnacious and wind-blowing old timers as Jesse James, Bret Harte, and Mark Twain will be especially considered when the awards are given out according to Stewart. He explained that "We will have some good characters there, and in more ways than the students think, but we are doing a lot to make this a real old '49 dance. BATH IN LIQUID AIR ADVOCATED AS SAFE METHOD OF REDUCING A bath in a liquid air well is advocated as "a safe, painless and harmless method of reducing," by the chemistry students of one of the sister universities. The article on the subject continues, "It feels no worse than a cold shower, although the temperature is 360 degrees below zero. In order to combat the intense cold, the body has to burn an unusually large amount of tissue, thus causing a loss in weight. The real difficulty, according to the article, comes after the bath.
