# STUDENTS REQUIRED TO HAVE AT LEAST 2.00 AVERAGE

A new honor course system will be given a trial during the coming fall semester according to a decision reach-

emester according to a decision reach-ed by the Arts and Science faculty at a meeting held this week. This system provides for the superior student a special opportunity to pursue independent study in his major field, under supervision of his major instruc-tors. The Independent Study Plan will be optional with the various departments in the college.

Any student of junior standing with an average grade of 2.0 or higher is eligible to the Independent Study Plan. Grade average alone, however, shall not be considered in the eligibility of the student. Earnestness in study, initiative and ability of the student to do independent work should be con-sidered by the committee. A student may enroll at the beginning of the junior year or at the beginning of any semester thereafter. Enrollment shall be optional with the student, but he may enroll in one department only, that is, his major department of study.

Mast Apply The student who wishes to enroll should make application on a blank provided by the registrar's office be-fore the end of the semester preceding that in which the work is to begin. This application must be approved by the department in charge of the major study of the student and by the dean of the college.

The department shall outline, in con The department shall outline, in con-ference with, the student, a detailed program of work to be pursued by the student. At the end of the semester the progress and accomplishment of the student should be tested by oral or written examination or both, given by a committee of at least three, of which the major instructor is a member This committee shall be appointed by the committee on Independent Study.


If the results prove unsatisfactory the student will be required to return to the regular class program of the de-partment. Any student enrolled in the Independent Study course may volun-tarily return to the regular class pro-gram at the end of the junior year but
