

By JULIAN SOURWINE Giving an almost faultloss presenta-tion of Sir Arthur Wing Pinero's cel-ebrated fantasy, "The Enchanted Cot-tage," the Campus Players last night held enthralled an audience which packed the auditorium of the educa-tion building to capacity. The interpretation of Sir Arthur's play which the Campus Players gave would have brought an ovation to any professional troupe, and when the fact is considered that the actors were but amateurs, their performance appears

We hope that this has not put too great a gap between Hughes and the University of Nevada. We don't beileve it has.

Such service as he has given it, such loyalty as he has shown through his untiring efforts for its advancement, the interest that has kept him in such close touch through the years since graduation that he knows personally almost every enrolled student, cannot be done away with or forgotten in any short while.

Hughes has just concluded a term as president of the Nevada Alumni Association, a banner year for that group. He has reorganized it till it is now a thoroughly cooperative group. He has backed the University of Nevada on every possible occasion and in every possible manner. His fight talks have cheered the student body in time of slump and he has rejoiced with them when Nevada has been victorious. And, lastly, he has been among the initiators of Nevada's latest dream, a Student Union Building, and has succeeded in bringing that dream to a point where it now seems close to realization.

In conclusion it can be said, as in the former, that Hughes has filled his office and served his university exceptionally well. 
