849 Students Are Registered For Fall Term At University

Freshman Class Found To Have Largest Registration

Enrollment Near High Mark Set Last Year At This Time

The fall semester's enrollment of students from Nevada homes is the largest this fall that has ever beer registered, the total number of Nevada students being 636, as compare with 634 of last year. At least two representatives are found from every county in the state, with Washoe county leading with 393 students.

The other counties have the following numbers: Churchill 35, Clark 16 Douglas 13, Eliko 26, Esmeralda 8, Eureka 4, Humboldt 10, Lander 8, Lincoln 6, Lyon 19, Mineral 8, Nye 24 Ormsby 18, Pershing 14, Storey 2 and White Pine 32. TEACHERS GRADE THROUGH HABIT

STUDENTS SHOULD KNOW METHODS THAT ARE

Chico.—"Students in high schools and coileges are entitled to a definite knowledge of the marking habits of their teachers," according to L. H. Peterson, associate professor of education at the University of California, speaking at the teachers' institute here recently.

recently.

'Investigation of periods as long as fifteen years have shown that beyond question of a doubt, teachers grade students according to a system established by habit. The so-called 'hardmarking teacher' is consistently a 'hard-marker' and the 'easy' teacher is just as consistent," Professor Peterson points out.

'University students spread word of the marking habits of their instructors from student to student, and frequently their estimates of the instructor are in

their estimates of the instructor are in their estimates of the instructor are in error. The same is true in the high schools. The records of the instructors, showing how they grade in relation to other teachers in the same school, should be made accessible to the students, and the easy and hard teachers should be equally accountable to the principal.

Get in Rut

"Teachers who are definitely in a 'rut' in their grading habits vary no more than 5 per cent in the relation of high marks to low marks.

Grades as the basis for recommending students to the university do not mean much unless a uniform grading system is in force in the school from which they are recommended", Professor Peterson declares.

The recommendation was made to high school principals in a round table discussion conducted by Professor Peterson at the Teachers' Institute of the North Central Section at Chico, where he also spoke on "The Secondary Education Program in California."

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

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

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
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Crucible Club Is Reorganized
