"No candidates whatever have been given the least consideration as yet," aid "Doc" J. E. Martie, head of the athletic department, when approached on the subject of selecting a new coach. "The reason for this is that it must first be decided who will choose the coach and pay his salary, the Student Body or the University. Until that is done, no candidate can possibly be considered."

Last year the Associated Students cleated to select the head football coach themselves and stand his salary. Shaw was chosen to fill the position and was paid a salary of \$2400 from the start of the school term until the finish of the football season only. The assistant coach was paid by the University and acted as part of the Physical education department. In all previous years the selection of the coach was left to the University and the choice was made through the athletic department. The football coach, under this system, was hired for a period of one year and worked in connection with the Physical Education department when not occupied with fall football or spring practice. 

Affred Higginbotham, head of the Journalism department, sets downs his beliefs in the following words: "The fine reputation of clean amateurism which is the University of Nevada's wherever it has played should not be sullied by the taint of professionalism. The granting of such scholarships should be carefully guarded so that it will not developinto paying of athletes. General worthiness must be considered."
