The questionnaire asked for the present standing of the honor system, what objections its opponents make, what constructive steps have been taken to improve the system and the student attitude in general. All that answered gave their opinions freely. Five replies came from institutions that have abolished honor system, 14 from colleges having honor systems in force and 31 from institutions that have never had a system.

Student enrollment of the institutions that answered varies from 300 to 10,600. The University of Delaware with 350 students is the smallest of the colleges with an honor system and the University of Michigan are the largest with 10,000 students each.

Eight First Places

In 1926 the Wolf Pack got eight first places out of the Far West Conference meet, while College of Pacific got three, Fresno two, and St. Mary's two.

In 1927 Nevada got seven firsts, Fresno three; Pacific three, and California Aggles one.

In 1928 the Wolves six firsts, Fresno four, Pacific four, and St. Mary's and Cal Aggles were shut out completely.

This makes a grand total of 21 first places for Nevada in the last three year's meets as opposed to her oppon-

This makes a grand total of 21 first places for Nevada in the last three year's meets as opposed to her opponents' total of 22. Nevada holds six Conference records out of a possible 15. Fresno and College of Pacific each have four, and Cal Aggies hold one. Nevada's track records, especially in track events, are up to a point now where it is difficult to break them. Many of them compare very favorably with coast records, and if the 1929 team keeps up the record-breaking that has been set up by the last two years or three year's teams, some startling results should occur.

Further, it has a claim on horse racing's title as the "sport of kings," for an Italian scholar at the University of California has not only found that "the game of the kick" was a popular pastime in sixteenth-century Italy, but it was played by high-born youths, several of whom later became kings, emperors and even popes.

In an ancient volume, 'Il Guico del Calcio," ("The Game of the Kick") Dr. Rudolph Altrocchi, professor of Italian and chairman of the department, found a sport described which is strikingly similar to modern American football, she declares. In fact, he says, it is more like the American game than like either rugby or soccer.
