Shortly before noon of the same first business day a member of the psychology department of Stanford gave the "Spencer test for executive ability" to all delegates. The results indicated that the great majority of students were "climbers" that few were thinkers and even less were well rounded.

His talk depicted the means used by the American government to convey information to foreign nations...

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Nevada Football Team Unable To Go To Nebraska

Cal Aggie Game Blocks Way To Wolves Arranging Game Date

Due to the inability of athletic officials to rearrange an already accepted schedule, Nevada's football team will be unable to accept the invitation of the University of Nebraska to meet the Cornhuskers at Lincoln on October 25 in an inter-sectional battle.

Nebraska's offer, said to carry a \$4000 guarantee to cover expenses, was considered favorably by Coach George Philbrook and the faculty committee represented by Professor R. C. Thompson and Chester Scranton, but all efforts of Dean Charles Haseman to reach a satisfactory agreement with the California Agricultural College, whose game with Nevada falls on the offered date, failed. A wire had already been sent to Nebraska officials informing them that Nevada was favorably considering the game pending rearrangement of schedules and it is hoped that a game may be arranged for next year.

Coach Philbrook would rather have his team meet the Cornhuskers next year when his newly inaugurated system will have had a chance to fully develop. At present a team of Nebraska's calibre could be offered little opposition.

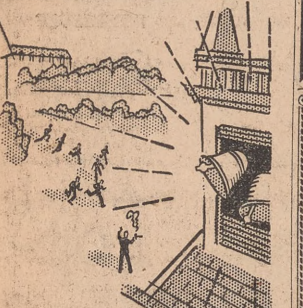
Louisiana Offer Made

Offers have also been received to play Haskell Indian Institute and the Centenary College of Louisiana. Haskell officials asked for a November 15 engagement at Reno but the Wolf Pack meets California on that date. The Louisiana school desires a game in 1931. These communications are believed to be the result of the publicity Nevada received when its team flew to Los Angeles this fall for the game with Southern California.

Inter-sectional games are proving a great attraction to football enthusiasts all over the country and it is to be presumed that record crowds would turn out for a Nevada invasion of the east. The fact that Nevada is considered to be the last of the Wild West States would add greatly to the color of a game between that institution and an eastern college and next year open dates should be left to take care of favorable offers.

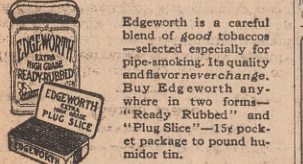


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Players Start Work Nevada Cage Team Trains For Provo
