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
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

Doubt as to the feasibility of pre-registration of courses to be taken dur-ing the fall semester was advanced by a few of the students, but other opin-ions advanced seemed to feel that no more hindrance would be encountered over the summer vacation than in the shorter Christmas reces. "Theregistration is a good thing, and I am all for it," said Prof. A. L. Hig-ginbotham. Tt enables the student to think over his subject in consultation with his professor, and it enables the professor to advise the student in what course he might better take. I do think, however, that more time should be de-voted to the pre-registration process. A student should be allowed to take out his card any time during the last courses, and then secure his profes-sor's signature. In this way much of the changes in courses could be deim-inate."
