Dean Sibley Gives

C. courses at the University of Nevada this week made their appearance in the newly issued cadet uniforms which were especially ordered by the government for student wear among the United States, according to information received from the military department.

Second year men made their initial appearance in the new untitis last Tuesday, while Wednesday was the date set for the cadets in first year courses to array themselves in the new style uniforms.



This method, it is hoped, will eliminate many flaws in teh correct running of plays by pointing out the defects. While the system is new at Nevada, it has had a thorough trial in other institutions, and is now a part of the regular pre-game routine. This method was inaugurated several years ago by a grid mentor in an eastern university and has since spread widely.


