#### Greeks Accept Proposal of Coach for Inter-mural Athletics

At the meeting of representatives of all fraternities, Lincoln Hall and Independents, which was held in "Doc" Martie's office Thursday afternoon, a new plan was introduced by Martie that will eliminate intra-mural sports.

As a substitute for his former plan Martie suggested the following changes which were accepted. As inter-fraternity basketball series interferes with varsity practice, it will be discontinued and intra-mural substituted.

**Selections as Usual**  
The basketball team will be selected as all other teams have been chosen, but those that do not make the varsity will be eligible for inter-mural. There will be no intermural until after January 1. There will be interfraternity volleyball, tennis, handball and baseball. Heretofore baseball has interfered with track so no track aspirants may be excused to play baseball for his fraternity.

The volleyball series will start Monday. All fraternities should have their lists of men in by that time. Tennis will begin later in the week.

### New Uniforms Issued Cadets

#### Complete Reversal Made in Style of Suits Now Worn

Cadets enrolled both in the basic and advanced R. O. T. C. courses at the University of Nevada this week made their appearance in the newly issued cadet uniforms which were especially ordered by the government for student wear among the colleges and universities in the United States, according to information received from the military department.

Second year men made their initial appearance in the new outfits last Tuesday, while Wednesday was the date set for the cadets in first year courses to array themselves in the new style uniforms.

**Straight aPnts Worn**  
The suits are a complete reversal of the "monkey suits" once so familiar on the campus. Laced breeches and wrapped puttees have been entirely thrown into the discard and full length trousers worn in their stead. Trench style overseas caps have been substituted for the caps previously worn, and a roll collared coat having a blue faced lapel and brass buttons has taken

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the place of the old button at the neck type.  
Added paraphernalia includes an O. D. wool shirt and black tie to be worn under the coat. Suspenders have replaced the old web belt, and shoes instead of oxfords, are now required.

**Other Colleges Outfitted**  
Similar uniforms are being furnished all land grant colleges and universities in the United States with the exception of 36. These institutions have military paraphernalia of their own design.

In commenting on the new uniforms this week, Lieutenant Wilcox said he believed they would add greatly to the appearance of the corps. He also expressed himself as satisfied with the progress of instruction to date. Because of climatic conditions and lack of an armory, he said, it is necessary to devote the first two months of the semester exclusively to drill, which would not ordinarily be the case.

## Motion Picture Will Follow All Nevada Games

### Camera Will Make First Appearance at Utah Game Here Tomorrow

Introducing an innovation in Nevada coaching methods, all football games played by Nevada teams on the Mackay oval will in the future be followed by a motion picture camera through their entirety, according to an announcement made this week by Bernard Hartung, graduate manager.

**Wilson Is Cameraman**  
The games will be shot from a 16 millimeter special camera by Tim Wilson, former Nevada student and at present proprietor of the Wilson Drug Company. Wilson has had experience in shooting football scenes previously, having pictured the California-Stanford game last fall.

After they have been developed, the films will be purchased by the Associated students for display purposes at special meetings and assemblies. Hartung did not say if the films will be used for the Hill Follies.

**Used in Skull Ractice**  
Approximately half of the film footage is to be utilized for slow motion close-up scenes for the use of Coach Philbrook in studying the relative merits of his players. Hartung says present plans call for using the slow motion films in chalk talks before the squad, letting each man see himself in retrospect. This method, it is hoped, will eliminate many flaws in technique.

He plays a smashing game at halfback and his passing and punting are as good as has been displayed on Mackay Field in several seasons. Al Lefebvre, Chuck Gabriels and Jack Hill, star of last year's Frosh squad, are showing up well and should be consistent ground gainers at this half-back position.

**Parsons Is Tough**  
Gail Parsons, fullback on the 1929 varsity, is back tougher than ever and much is expected of him tomorrow. George Drury, 200-pound fullback, is also in line for this position, along with Tony Tesone, former Compton Junior College star.

**Elliott, Flashy Los Angeles**  
Earl Elliott, flashy Los Angeles all-city halfback, is showing up well at right half, and is a good interference man. Bill Backer and Topsy Handley are also aspirants for this tough assignment and either should give a good account of himself.

**Quarters Are Named**  
Milt Young, understudy to Jake Lawlor on last year's varsity, is ably filling the quarterback berth. He is a heady player and tomorrow will be calling signals. Joe Risley, Bud Parsons and Bill Beasley are also fighting for a chance at quarter.

**Art Levy, outstanding end**  
from the 1929 Wolf Pack is being counted on to put up a stiff battle at the long-side wing, and his running mate, Speed Weaver, former Whittier flash, is handling left end in a manner that hasn't been equaled since the days of "Spud" Harrison. In addition, Weaver has an educated toe and tomorrow he can be counted on to be pulled out of the line to kick. Philbrook has two good reserve ends in Neil Scott and O'Bryan, two speed burners, who will be sure to see action tomorrow.

**Tackles Show Form**  
Wally Rusk, John Griffin, Hank Rampoldi and Ole Thies are all experienced tackles. Rusk and Rampoldi will probably start tomorrow but Griffin and Thies, two of the biggest men on the squad, will be in there before the game is over and it's going to be tough on the Utes who get in their way.

Members of the 1930 football squad who play at least 65 minutes in the "letter" games this coming season will be entitled to the Block N award. These games, every other one on the schedule, were chosen by the Block N society at its meeting Wednesday afternoon.

Bill Ligon, president, announced the following games to be "letter" games. Starting with the game tomorrow with the University of Utah, the other "letter" games will be October 11 with Santa Clara; October 25 with California Aggies and November 15 with the University of California. All these are tough games and Coach Philbrook will be using the most promising men of his squad of 60.

**Constitution Requirements**  
The constitution of the Associated Students reads: "The candidates in football, in order to be eligible for a Block N in football, must play a total of an hour and five minutes during the season in games which will be designated by the Block N society previous to the start of the season. The number so designated shall not exceed five."

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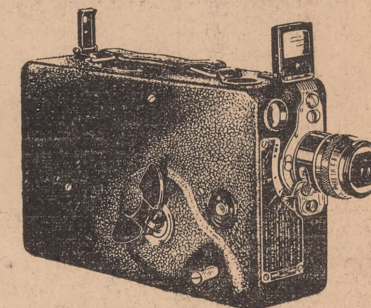


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
