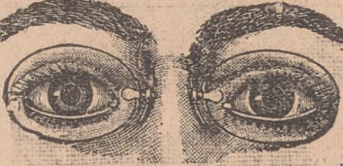

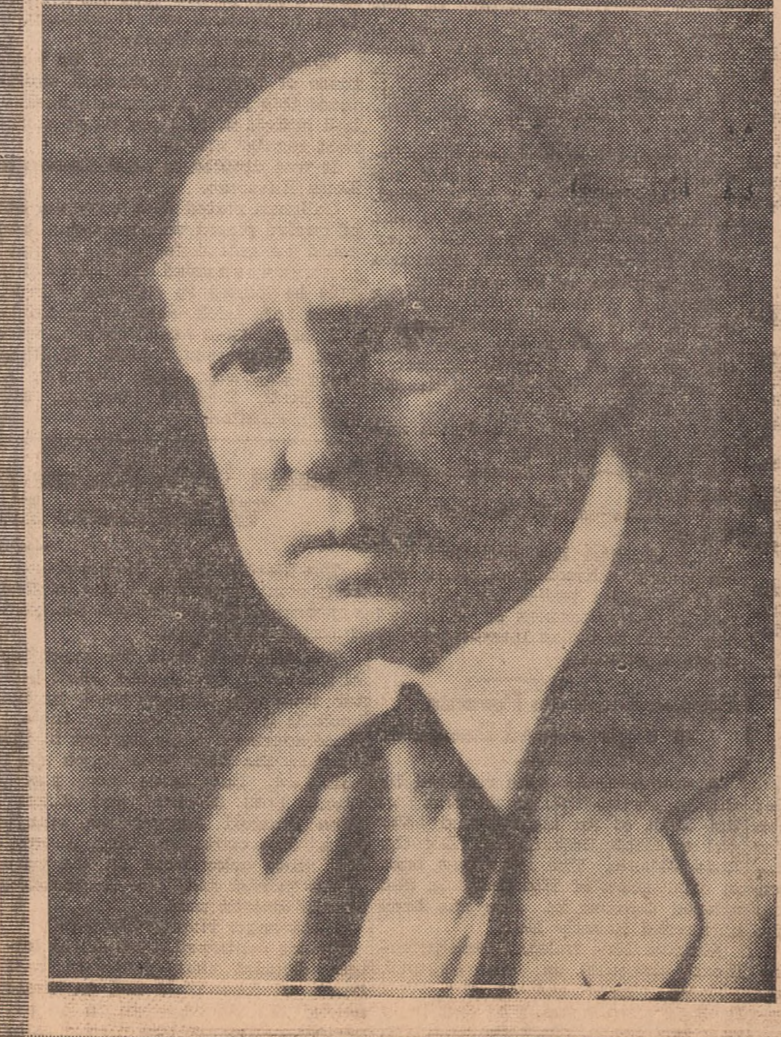

Proposed Changes In A. W. S. Constitution

Article IV Executive Department
Sec. 1. Officers—The officers of this organization shall be president, secretary-treasurer, one sophomore representative and one freshman representative.
Sec. 2. Executive Board—The executive board shall consist of the officers of A. W. S., and the president of Manzanita Hall association, president of Women's Athletic association, president of Pan-Hellenic council, president of U. W. C. A. and women's representative to Finance Control committee.
(a) Two-thirds of the active members of this committee shall constitute a quorum.
Article V Selection of Officers
Sec. 1. Officers and members of the Executive Board shall be selected to serve for one year.
Sec. 2. The president shall be the vice-president of the Associated Student Body and shall be elected at the general Associated Student Body election; the secretary-treasurer shall be appointed by the president from the incoming junior class; sophomore representative from the incoming sophomore class; freshman representative from the incoming freshman class; and song-leader to be appointed by the president.
Sec. 3. Vacancies occurring in any office of the executive board shall be filled according to Robert's Rules of Order.
Article VI Duties of Officers
Sec. 1. (a) It shall be the duty of the secretary-treasurer to record the proceedings of all meetings of the association and executive board, and to keep a permanent record of the same; and it shall be the further duty of the secretary-treasurer to keep a strict and permanent account of all receipts and expenditures, and to preside in the absence of the president, and to perform such other duties as generally pertain to the office of secretary-treasurer.
Article VII Meetings
Sec. 1. The Associated Women Students shall meet on the second Friday of every month at 11:25 a. m.
Article VIII Finance
Sec. 1. Membership dues shall be twenty-five (25c) cents a semester, payable on registration as a part of the A. S. U. N. fees.
Sec. 2. The establishment of all funds shall be under the control of the executive board, subject to the approval of Finance Control committee.
Sec. 3. At the beginning of each semester a budget for the amount of expenses for the current semester shall be submitted to Finance Control committee.
(a) All A. W. S. bills shall be presented for payment through said Finance Control committee.
(b) Profits from ice cream sales shall be deposited to the credit of A. W. S. through the Finance Control committee.
Sec. 4. All warrants on the A. W. S. budget must be presented to the president and secretary-treasurer of the association for signatures of

# Wolf Pack Overwhelms Aggie Team Saturday By 31-0 Score

### Mackay Cheers With Crowd As Nevada Shows Strength; Barthells, Hill Star In Backfield

With Clarence H. Mackay and party lustily cheering together with 6,000 supporters of the Wolf Pack, the University of Nevada gridlers came through in smashing style to down the California Aggies 31-0 in the eleventh annual Homecoming game at Mackay Field last Saturday.

Coach George W. Philbrook had his men primed for this Homecoming contest and upset the dope bucket by completely outplaying the 1929 Far Western Conference champs in every department of the game. The Wolves unleashed an attack upon the Mustangs from the opening whistle, taking advantage of all the breaks and fighting back with all that was in them whenever Nevada was penalized, which was too often for comfort.

Mixing wide plays and passes, with reverses and shots through the line, the Wolves were able to keep the Aggie defense spread out enabling them to roll up their biggest score of the 1930 season. Philbrook's offense, which has been improving with every game, seems to have finally come into its own, and from the results of last Saturday's game it has been proven that Nevada is a high-powered scoring threat.

In winning its second Conference start, the Pack was minus the services of five regulars who have been conceded among the most outstanding players in the league. The Pack made its second tally in the last part of the first quarter by way of a long pass from Drury to O'Brien which carried the ball from the Aggie 40 to the 3 yard line. Drury carried the ball over the center of the line, and with a place kick added the only extra point after touchdown of the five attempts in the game.

The third tally was made by a 9

yard end run by Scott after Hill and Backer had brought the ball within scoring distance by spectacular runs through the Aggie line.

Young accounted for the fourth touchdown for Nevada by catching Hill's bullet pass just over the line. The last touchdown, which was in the fourth quarter, was most spectacular, with O'Brien on the receiving end of Hill's 30 yard pass over the heads of the Mustang's secondary defense. This play started on the Nevada 49 yard line with O'Brien running the remaining 21 yards in a clear field.

The game was featured by the open attack used by both teams, with Nevada having the edge. The Aggies completed more passes than did the Wolf Pack but these that the Wolves did complete meant touchdowns or near scores.
