During the past week the rifle team has been improving, according to Sergeant Hustice. Many women are coming out for the sport and conditions are becoming more favorable.


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Nursery Rhymes Revived By Big He-Men of Campus

Three Day Conference To Be Held On Nevada Campus In Early April

A tentative program for the three day conference of the women's athletic associations of the far western colleges was adopted and committees to take charge of the visiting delegates who will come to the University of Nevada campus the early part of April, were appointed at a meeting of the W.A.A. executive committee held in the gymnasium Monday.

Although only fifteen of the thirty western colleges who received the questionnaire sent out by the association of the University of Nevada have responded to it, Miss Mae Simas, assistant director of physical education for women, expects about 60 delegates to be present at the Nevada conference.

Program Announced
The delegates, who are expected to arrive Thursday, April 9, will be given a dinner that evening at the Manzanita dining hall, which will be followed by a social gathering at the Century Club. The Friday morning program will open with welcoming addresses by Walter E. Clark, president of the University; Margaret E. Mack, dean of women; Elsa Sameth, director of physical education for women at the University; Dora Clover, president of W.A.A.; and Jack Walther, president of the associated students. The remainder of the morning will be given to reports and discussions. At 12 o'clock the visitors will be taken to Wa-neva lodge for a luncheon, prepared by the Gothic N Society.

Friday evening they will be guests at the annual spring festival, to be given in the gymnasium by the dancing classes.

Saturday morning will be given entirely to business meetings and reports. At noon the delegates will be the guests of the Cap and Scroll, honorary society at a luncheon. After a final meeting Saturday afternoon visiting members will be taken on a sightseeing trip to Virginia City. The conference will come to a finish with the formal banquet at the Century Club Saturday evening.
