The various contests making up the affair will begin Thursday morning directly after registration, from 8:30 until 9:30, and carry through the following

Last year at this time over 200 people were associated with this affair which is sponsored by several groups in the student body of the school. Eighteen different high schools were contesting in the many phases of the

### **Funds For Senior Ball Present Big** Junior Problem

To Take Dollar Out of Blanket Fee

Plans of the junior class to secure funds for the 1932 Senior Ball through pledging a dollar to be taken out of individual blanket fees were blocked this week when President Walter E. Clark refused to consent to that means of financing the dance.

A committee appointed by the class president. Ted Lunsford, and headed by Vincent Casey, was given charge of drawing up a petition for junior stu-dents to sign. These were ready for circulation among those juniors who wished to contribute. Some measure, according to Casey, was necessary, because the Junior Jump, given recently to raise funds for the same purpose was a complete financial failure. Other means of raising money are now under consideration, but no definite plan has been decided on.

Clark Refuses President Clark, in refusing to allow the petition, declared that it would be setting a bad precedent, inasmuch as it has never been done for a similar

Heretofore, it has been the custom only to permit donations from students' blanket fees when the money given was to be used for something that would be of permanent good to the University. The senior ball, a social affair, would result in no particular benefit to the school as a whole, and therefore could not be financed

from the blanket deposits, it is said.

### **Former Graduate Returns From Far East For Sojourn**

Situation in China Described By Newspaper Woman Located Here

By KATHERINE WRIGHT Mr. and Mrs. Sutton Christian arrived in Reno last week en route from Shanghai, China, where both have been employed on the staff of the China Press. Economic conditions and di-sease plagues as an aftermath of the Sino-Japanese war, necessitated the Christians' removal from the war zone. the former Nevada Semenza '24, member of Pi Beta Phi sorority.

the present time the war is not the major issue in Shanghai, but the disease scourge fostered by the influx of fugitives from Chapei and the other war districts, to the international settlement has so complicated living conditions that the ecenmic and health situations are practically unbearable. Mrs. Christian said, "I don't know how I escaped contagion when I think of how I sat next to those diseased Chinese in the hospitals." Business is practically at a standstill since the war, and it is almost impossible to prevail upon the dealers to keep their shops open.

Former Women's Editor
Mr. Christian formerly acted in the capacity of editor for the China Press, while Mrs. Christian occupied the po-sition of women's editor on the same publication. Their marriage last summer in Shanghai was the culmination of a romance through their acquaintance as co-workers in the newspaper office. Their exit from Shanghai being necessitated by the present hostility in China, they were very fortunate in being able to take their possessions with them; however, they experienced much difficulty in getting natives to pack their goods to the ship. They brought many Oriental curious

After visiting with Mrs. Christian's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Semenza, in Reno, they expect to go to California and hope in due time to settle in Mexico to continue their newspaper



With Play Day no longer a substitute for the high school girls' state basketball tournament but a regular event occurring annually, W.A.A. is working on plans for the Play Day to be held the end of this month. There is considerable controversy throughout the state in regard to the merits of the occasion. The smaller high schools maintain that they do not have a fair competitive chance, their athletic training being limited mainly to basketball because of lack of material to enter in other events and lack of equipment for a varied sports schedule. Those farther away from Reno feel that the expense for the single day trip is not sufficiently compensated for by the knowledge gained by the delegates.

In answer to this, W.A.A. insists that the benefits gained from Play Day do not lie in the competitions but in the spirit gained from making new acquainances and contacts and the desire created to attend the University. Each year new games and sports are taught to the delegates, many of them requiring little or no equipment, which may be explained to the athletic departments of the high schools. Competent women on the campus have charge of the program of the day and can teach games which will be much more beneficial to young girls than a strenuous basketball season concluding with a tournament which usually ends in hard feelings and over-wrought nerves.
