



# Nevada Wolf Pack Is Defeated 37-27 By Bearded Five

## Wolves Hold Slight Advantage Over House of David at Half Time

### GYM PACKED

## Davidians Start Fancy Work In Final Half to Score Decisive Win

Before the biggest crowd of the season, the bearded House of David team defeated the University of Nevada basketball squad 37 to 27 on the home court Tuesday night.

**Nevada Leads**  
During the first period the Wolf Pack held the lead with the House of David team playing a slow game, and the score at the half was Nevada 18, House of David 16.

It was late in the second half that the bearded players began to use their trick plays, which consisted of little else than deceptive passes. Few of the spectacular plays characteristic of last year's team were used, but they managed to confuse the Nevadans with their defense.

**Jones Scores**  
Jones scored the first field goal for Nevada, and he was followed by Gould and Tregellas, both of whom made field goals which ran the score up to 6 points for Nevada. The House of David's first field goal was made by Curtis and the score was then, Nevada 6, House of David 2.

Jones and Gould scored three free throws for Nevada and Curtis followed with a free throw for the Davidians. Jones and Curtis both added another point to each of their scores, and Finley made the score 10 to 6 by two free throws.

Nevada kept the lead by several points until the half time.

**House Ties Score**  
At the beginning of the second half the House of David team made a field goal, tying the score 13-13. Nevada got a 7 point lead again with three field goals and a free throw.

After that the David team began playing fast ball, and in a few minutes they had scored 17 points, making the score 35-25. During the last few minutes of the game Finley and Kelley scored 2 points each, making the final score: House of David 37, Nevada 27.

**Curtis High**  
High point men for the two teams were: House of David, Curtis, 12, 10 of which were field goals, and for Nevada, Gould, 10, 8 of which were field goals.

Arguments over the referee's interpretation of the no tipoff ruling threatened to stop the game during the first half. One of the House of David men began to put on his warm-up suit early in the first half, but finally agreed to return to the game. The difficulties were ironed out during the half-time period, and the game proceeded fairly smooth for the remainder of the evening.

In a playful game, the Artemisia staff last night defeated the Sagebrush in the traditional basketball contest, played in the gymnasium. The score was 32-30, and women's rules were played.

The entertainment committee for the next meeting was named as follows: Madeline Miller, Charlotte Robinson and Helene Stark.

Freshman roll call was taken and absent members will be required to appear before the women's upperclass committee next week.

Contributions for the loan fund are all in and Dean Margaret Mack is ready to loan money to women at the university, Miss Lozano announced.

"Freshman women who fail to sell hot dogs when they asked to do so will be required to entertain the audiences at basketball games," Florence Kirkley, newly appointed chairman of the women's upperclass committee, said today.

## Campus Visitor Gives Her Views On Sorority Life

"Rushing is not the most important phase of sorority life," said Mrs. Alexander Grant, visiting national officer of Delta Delta Delta, when asked her opinion of the rushing and pledging systems on the Nevada campus.

"On this campus especially, rushing is so emphasized that it tends to lessen the more important aspects of what sorority life really is."

Mrs. Grant, when asked to suggest methods of improving the present system, remarked particularly about one of the local Pan-Hellenic rules that stated that no alumnae could be present during the period of rushing. Mrs. Grant's strong belief is that the alumnae play the most important part of rushing.

"The three phases of a sorority are the pledgship, period after initiation and after college—the alumnae. Therefore only four years are spent in college as an active member and the rest of your life is spent outside of the active chapter and in the alumnae associations. If the alumnae are present during rushing the rushees could better choose a sorority which would

Another aspect Mrs. Grant brought out during this interview was the fact that every sorority spends too much time on rushing. In the fall semester there is an entire month before college sorority women settle down to work at college. That month is full of rushing.

"In other colleges we have what is known as 'freshman week.' This week gives the new students a chance to get acquainted with the college and the students. The ensuing week is 'rush week,' when the rest of the students enroll, thus not conflicting with studies and not making rushing the most important event of the semester."

When asked about summer rushing, Mrs. Grant stated that high school and summer rushing should absolutely be done away with. This type of rushing makes the girl herself feel more

important than is necessary. Every sorority should, remember that the girl is not choosing the sorority but that the sorority is choosing the girl, Mrs. Grant said.

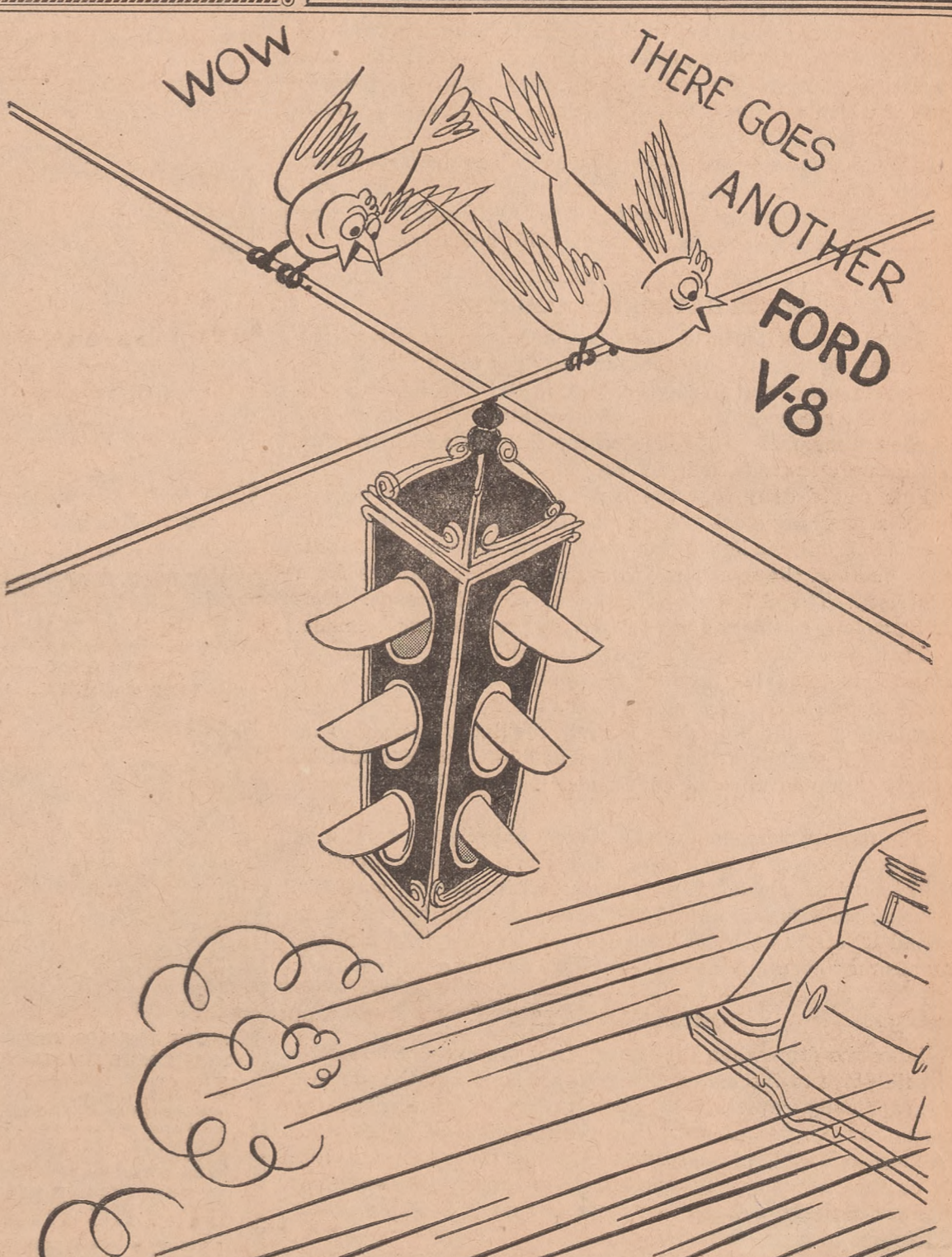

### Former Student Dies on Coast

Irwin W. Ayres '01, the student who gave the dedicatory speech when the university gates were set up at the entrance to the campus, died in San Francisco last Tuesday. He was 54 years old.

Ayres made an excellent record in scholastic activities and in athletics while attending the university. He was a member of the football teams from 1898 to 1901, playing regular end position. Ayres also ran the half-mile and made an outstanding record in debate.

### U. of N. Students More Interested In Foreign Affairs

That University of Nevada students are more interested in foreign affairs than matters in their own country, was evidenced by a test in contemporary affairs, given members of the class in interpreting the day's news recently.

Results of the test revealed that in answering questions on foreign affairs the average number of questions answered correctly was 63 per cent of the total while in answering those on national affairs only 62 1-3 per cent were answered correctly.

The position which science holds in the world today was shown by the fact that more of the science questions were answered right than those of business and finance or transportation. The Nevada students answered 55 4-5 per cent of the science questions correctly, while business and finance followed with 54 per cent and transportation with 51 1-2 per cent.

Books and music and art are rapidly losing the high position which they once held in university life, since the Nevada class showed less familiarity with these subjects than any other fields. Only 42 1-2 per cent of the questions on books were answered correctly, and music and art trailed far behind with only 30 per cent of these questions being answered right.

### Buildings Repaired In Campus Program

The extensive building improvement program which has been carried on at the University of Nevada for the past several months will be completed in the near future with the painting of the roof and exterior woodwork of Lincoln hall, the extension building and Mackay Science hall.

In the course of the improvement program the roofs of the Mining, Electrical and Mechanical Engineering buildings, the greenhouse, gymnasium and hospital have been painted. The interior of Mackay Science hall has been tinted and the old Chemistry building is being remodeled.

According to Joseph T. Lynch, superintendent of grounds, no work will be started on ground improvement until March.

### Enrollment Hits 1021 Mark for University Year

Enrollment for the school year totaled 1021, President Walter E. Clark announced Wednesday following the close of the registration period for the semester. This is the largest year enrollment in several years, Clark said.

Cards out for the semester amounted to 899, while the completed registration totaled 882. A year ago 869 cards were out, with 860 completed enrollments.

The total registration for the year which topped the full year number of 990 for last year was attributed by Dr. Clark to 83 students who were not registered last semester. This number included both new students and students who have returned to college.

The registration for this semester includes 518 men and 364 women, while in class enrollments the freshman class is leading. According to classes the enrollment is as follows: Freshmen, 269; sophomores, 222; juniors, 188; seniors, 100; graduates, 53; unclassified, 34, and specials, 16. Last year the number of men enrolled for the spring semester numbered 563, while there were 375 women.

Dr. Clark said that the enrollment for this semester was practically the same as that of one year ago, until the closing day, when the additional students completed enrollment.
