





### Spring Football Starts This Week; Veterans Return

#### Newcomers Add to Outlook for Good Season, Aiken Says

With six veterans of the 1942 Wolf Pack answering the initial call, Coach Jim Aiken started spring football practice this week.

The six veterans who turned out were Kenneth Sims, stellar end; Warren Dark, tackle on the 1941 squad; Bill Parish, reserve lineman, and Jim O'Neill, John Hattala and Bob Clark, halfbacks on the 1942 varsity.

Augmenting the veterans were many new men from Reno and Sparks high schools and several new players from the east.

John Hattala, pint size halfback, has been handicapped by an injury, but will report and help out with the backfield men.

Dark was a member of the 1941 squad and did not attend school last year.

Of the newcomers the tackle combination of Gus Cifelli and Basil Petroski, Philadelphia boys, have shown up well in workouts.

**Reno High Veterans**

Reno high school contributes Bud Trowbridge, rangy end; Bob Mason, a tackle, and a young member of the Aiken family, Jim Jr., who is a quarterback.

Merlin Shea, all-state fullback from Sparks, has been working out, and the Burgarello brothers, both linemen from the same school, are expected out next week.

Ed Shayotovich and Pete Milkovich, center and fullback, respectively, hail from Chicago and have shown promise of being very good men on the squad.

George Mituzas, Philadelphia boy, has drawn attention by his fine defensive work. Mituzas is a guard.

"As a whole the squad is very young and inexperienced, but shows a world of promise, and some day should be a good football team," Aiken concluded.

### Engineering Math, New War Course, Offered on Campus

Engineering mathematics, the third war course offered on the campus, began last week with an enrollment of 15 students, according to Dr. Sigmund Leifson, university representative of the ESMWT.

This course, which will be completed in 12 weeks, is offered for those preparing for specialized war work. In order to qualify for technical and scientific war work, a thorough knowledge of high school mathematics is needed, Dr. Leifson said. The purpose of the course is to review high school mathematics. To be eligible to enroll, high school graduation is required and no person who plans to be in the university next year is eligible.

Engineering math is the third course presented on this campus by the U. S. Office of Education under the War Manpower Commission. This study covering algebra, geometry and trigonometry, will be taught by Dean Fredrick Wood. Classes meet every Tuesday and Thursday nights from 7 o'clock until 9.
