Requirements Told For Block N Awards

Regulations regarding the awarding of Block N sweaters to university athletes have been clarified by the Block N Society with approval of the senate, according to Jack Good, president.

Sweaters will be awarded to athletes upon completion of the required amount of playing time, which varies for different sports, if the student is passing in at least 11 credits of scholastic work, Good said.

The required time standards are set up by the Block N Society, and determination of passing grades will be made at the end of each semester by the executive committee of the senate. In past instances the determination of passing grades has at times been based on mid-semester reports, he noted, but this practice has been discontinued.

Athletes leaving the university to enter the armed forces or because of injury or illness, who has completed the playing time requirement and received his university credits will also receive the sports award.

Lowrance Writes

In a letter received by Dr. Philip A. Lehenbauer, head of the biology department, Dr. E. W. Lowrance, now on leave of absence, writes with enthusiasm of his work at the University of Kansas.

In addition to the histology courses, which he was originally scheduled to teach at the Kansas medical school, Dr. Lowrance is now giving classes in human physiology.

Dr. Lehenbauer points out that his former colleague is thus teaching in both the college of medicine and the college of science at Kansas.

An eight months' leave was granted Dr. Lowrance in order to accept his present post, and he plans to return to the Nevada campus next fall.

Nevada Team Tops Reno Base, 46-35

University of Nevada hoopsters defeated the Reno Army Air Base Wednesday night, 46-35, in the old gymnasium. The game was packed with thrills, and rough and tumble tactics on the part of both teams.

Bob Klitch of the RAAB was high point man for the evening, tossing in six field goals and six free throws for a total of 18 points. Klitch's performance, however, was not enough to overcome the scoring piled up by the Wolf Pack.

Alf Sorensen and Ronnie DuPratt led the Wolf Pack to victory, scoring 15 and 14 points respectively. DuPratt scored seven goals from one court and was the shooting star of the game. Sorensen played a fine defensive game in addition to his 15 points.

"Little" Bobby Durham rang up five baskets in the short time he played, for a total of 10 points.

The Pack got an early lead with Joe Friel making the first basket, and were never headed by the Flyers thereafter. The score at the end of the first half was 25-20 with the collegians on top.

The Wolf Pack forged further ahead in the second half and breezed in with the victory.

BARNI MACARI KILLED IN ACTION IN FRANCE

Pfc. Barni Macari, former student of the University of Nevada, was killed in action in France, November 8, according to word received by his parents last week from the war department.

While on campus in '42 and '43, Macari was affiliated with Alpha Tau Omega fraternity and was enrolled in the college of agriculture.

Macari entered the armed forces in May, 1943, immediately after the spring semester was finished and trained at Camp Roberts, California; Amarillo, Texas; McCloud, Minnesota, and Camp McCoy, Wisconsin.

Margaret Griffin Named to Home Ec Post on UN Campus

Announcement of the appointment of Margaret Griffin as assistant director for home economics of the University of Nevada agriculture extension service has been made by Cecil W. Creel, extension service director.

As assistant director she will be in charge of home demonstration throughout Nevada, taking over her duties in January.

Miss Griffin has taught in high schools in Nevada and served with the state department of education. At the present time she is supervisor of nursery school and extended day child service for Witsap county, Washington.

She acted as regional director of youth personnel for the western division of the National Youth Administration in 1942 and 1943.

Miss Griffin was graduated from the University of Nevada in 1925. She received her bachelor of science degree in home economics then and later took post-graduate work at UCLA, Oregon State and University of California at Berkeley.

The majority of these students are now serving in various branches of the country's armed forces.
