KAT TURNS 200 POUNDS OF CLOTHING TO DRIVE

Approximately 200 pounds of used clothing collected at the Kappa Alpha Theta punch and popcorn party April 26 have been turned in to the downtown collection committee for shipment to war-devastated countries, it was announced by Mary Ancho, chairman of the campus salvage bureau. Clothing deposited at sorority houses and dormitories will be picked up in the near future for donation to the Red Cross. No estimate has been made of the total amount collected.

Dr. Ernest Inwood To Be Grad. Mgr.

Dr. Ernest Inwood, head of the economics department, was named acting graduate manager for the next year at a meeting of the board of athletic control held last Thursday night in the ASUN building, Gordon Mills, Theta Chi; and president of the Sagens, was named to assist Dr. Inwood in his new office.

Commencement services will begin Monday, May 14, at 10:30 am in the new gymnasium with Dr. Ernest Moseley presiding. An oil portrait of the late Leon W. Hartman, president of the University of Nevada from 1939 to 1943, will be dedicated in ceremonies on the campus Monday afternoon at 4:30, according to Dean Fredrick Wood, chairman of the university ceremonials committee.

The dedication will open with an invocation by Rev. Arthur L. Rice, pastor of the Federated Church of Reno. The University Women's Chorus will then sing "Lift Thine Eyes" from the Elijah, under the direction of Prof. Theodore H. Post.

Presentation

The portrait will be unveiled and presented by Silas E. Ross, chairman of the board of regents. Following this Miss Leslie Harvey will sing "Memorial," by Strauss, accompanied by Dorothy B. Post.

Dr. John O. Moseley, president of the university, will lead the audience in the ceremony of the dedication. The program will be concluded with a benediction by Rev. Fredric H. Busher, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Reno.

The dedication is an official part of senior week program, Dean Wood concluded.

Created by legislative act in 1895, the board is headed by the chief justice of the supreme court. Board members visit and inspect grounds, buildings and equipment of the university each year and report to the governor, making any recommendations they deem wise for the best interests of the university.

His wife, the former Thelma Charlton, also attended the university. She was a member of Kappa Alpha Theta and business manager of the Sagebrush.

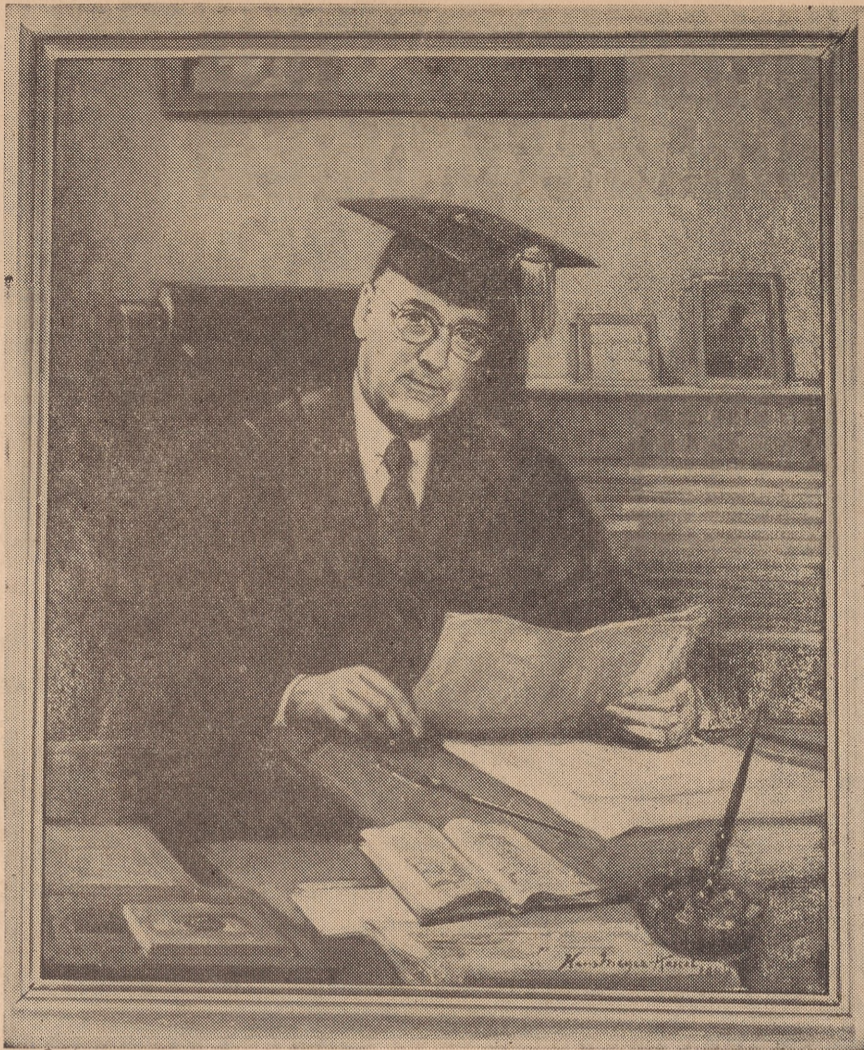

BOOK ON MUSIC ADDED TO LIBE

Music and electricity are the subjects of books received this week by the university library, James Hill, librarian, announced Friday.

"Music for the Millions," by David Ewen, is a reference book of wide scope for the radio listener, the concert-goer and the record collector. It contains short biographies of most of the great men in music up to our day together with lists of their works.

"A Treasury of American Song," by Olin Downes and Elie Siegmeister, contains 200 of America's songs ranging from statley, square-cut Puritan hymns to recent folk songs and ballads.

"Benjamin Franklin's Experiments," by Bernard Cohen, a new addition of an obscure book, puts again into circulation Franklin's volume on electricity, which was one of the most popular scientific works of the latter 18th century. It is an interesting fact that long before Franklin entered the arena of international politics, he was known throughout Europe as a leading scientist.

Billings to Continue Botany Experiments

Dr. William Dwight Billings, associate professor of botany, plans during the summer vacation to continue his experiments on the effect of soil from altered rocks on the growth of sagebrush.

According to Dr. Billings all evidence points to the theory that this soil has been drained of all bases by hot springs or weathering action and therefore will not support the growth of sagebrush. Pine trees will grow in this environment, though because they get no competition from sagebrush.

Dr. Billings' paper, the first on this subject, has been asked for by a national scientific journal.

Irwin stated that by giving these tests before the fall semester, faculty members could study the results and student advisors would be aided in guiding the student's choice of courses, based on individual aptitude.

TWO NEVADA STUDENTS PUBLISH COLLECTIONS

DR. CHRISTIAN MELZ COMPLETES TEXT BOOK

Dr. Christian Melz, professor of foreign language, recently completed a book entitled "Spoken German for Travelers and Students" in cooperation with Dr. Charles E. Kany of the University of California.

Containing practical conversation for beginners in German, Dr. Melz gave the German translations and Dr. Kany the English equivalents.

To be published by D. C. Heath and Company of Boston, Mass., the book will be off the press by the fall semester, Dr. Melz announced.

Dean S. Palmer Gives Electrical Demonstration

In a "one-man electrical show" last week, Dean Stanley G. Palmer demonstrated electrical engineering equipment of great variety, much of it newly set up in his laboratories, before the Sparks high school physics class.

Switchboard

He was particularly proud of the new switchboard, set up with standard powerhouse relays and switches, by which he demonstrated the operation of an entire power system. And of his combination high-frequency induction and dielectric heating generator, producing radio frequencies up to 10 million cycles for industrial heating. Though not yet hooked up, he explained the workings of the instrument.

Then he explained and operated the Crow rotating equipment which builds all kinds of motors and generators; showed them the Selsyn motors set up in series controlled by the master motor, and a new adjustable speed alternating current motor which operates as any one of 14 different types machines.

Other Equipment

They examined the electronic timer, used industrially to time particular manufacturing processes, and also experimented with the "electric eye." Next, he demonstrated a tachometer, a light cell of adjustable oscillation, which accurately measures motor speeds and amount of vibration, and explained the principle of the cathode ray oscillograph.

They then examined a demonstration transformer which shows the actions and characteristics of various transformers; a "street light" transformer, and a transformer which produces large amounts of current with very low pressure, used in resistance welding.

STEAMBOAT SPRINGS STUDIED BY GIANELLA

Prof. Vincent P. Gianelli, head of the geology department, is cooperating with the U. S. Geological Survey in a comprehensive restudy of the Steamboat Springs district about 10 miles south of Reno. He has done a great deal of work on Steamboat in recent years and has published a paper on the geology of that area.

Dr. Philip Fix, one of the survey's geologists, is already on the job, Gianelli states, and Dr. Daniel White, now working in Mexico, will join him about May 15.
