From the office of Coach Jim Aiken comes the word that Brigham University has cancelled its 1945 football schedule. The Pack was scheduled to play the Utah eleven in Las Vegas in their final appearance of the season.

Simultaneously, came the announcement that the Great Bend Army Air Field from Kansas has been substituted on the schedule for that date. The Kansas' airmen will fly to Las Vegas to keep the engagement.

## Wolves Tounce Marine Team By Score of 65-0

Coach Jim Aiken unveiled his 1945 post-war edition of the Nevada football team last Saturday before 3500 fans who jammed Mackay Field and what the spectators saw was what they came to see—a winning Nevada team.

Tallying in every quarter, four times in the first 11 minutes of play, Coach Aiken's boys unmercifully tounded the visiting Pocatello, Idaho, Marines by the overwhelming count of 65-0, averaging better than a point a minute.

**First Touchdown**  
Lloyd Rude hit pay dirt on a line buck and made the first touchdown of the game. Buster McClure converted and the scoreboard read 7-0.

After Rude had kicked off and the Marines had punter, Farnsworth took the ball on the Marines' 21 yard line and behind perfect interference skirted his own left end again for another six points with McClure converting to run the score to 14-0.

Nevada's third tally came as the result of some nice passing on the part of "Happy" Reed who pitched a pass to Maurice Hagleen good for 55 yards to the Marine 3 yard stripe. Hagleen went over on the next play and McClure again split the up-rights to make the count 21-0.

**Farnsworth Scores**  
Farnsworth rolled 40 yards to go over standing up and for the first time, McClure failed to convert. Score at the end of the 11 minutes of play: 27-0.

Hagleen, taking the ball on his own 28 yard line, outspinted everyone, including his own interference, to reel off a neat 52 yard gain before he was finally nailed from behind. Farnsworth picked up five, Hagleen added another five for the first down, Matt Klemaszewski drove to the three yard line, and then Hagleen bowled his way over on the next play for touchdown number five, McClure added the single digit for the 34th point of the game.

**Second Team**  
Along about this time, Coach Aiken inserted a whole new team. This group added touchdown number six to the scoreboard. After Walt Polenske had intercepted an aerial thrust at midfield, Bobby Ravera rattled off several nice gains and then Nevada took to the air.

Highlight of the final two quarters can be summed up in just two words, Rude and Farnsworth. The Furlock, California, freshman probably made the outstanding play of the game when he kicked for 70 yards midway in the third period. The punt from behind their goal line, which was only good for eight yards from scrimmage. After three line bucks had failed to gain a single yard against the stiffening Idaho defense, Hap Reed dropped back to pitch his third perfect strike of the afternoon to Max Dodge, who took the ball and went through the position for another six points. The attempted conversion was blocked leaving the score at 46-0.

The eighth touchdown came when Rude, taking a punt on his own 45, traveled 55 yards for the score of 52-0. Hagleen made the last touchdown making the final score 65-0.

## Pigskin Portraits

Those who marveled at the running and blocking of Jim Taylor last Saturday will be interested in a little football background on this hard hitting ex-sailor.

He first came into football prominence at Cranbrook Prep School in Detroit, Michigan. Cranbrook plays in the Interstate Prep League, extending from Detroit to Buffalo, New York. This is notoriously one of the toughest prep circles in the nation.

Although he weighed but 150 pounds, Taylor was chosen on the all-interstate team. On the basis of his all-state performance, he was awarded an athletic scholarship to Kiske Prep School in Pittsburgh, Penn. Kiske is so powerful in prep circles that it is forced to play college frosh teams in order to get a full schedule.

Taylor proved his ability by being placed on the mythical all-state

team. To convince fans of his athletic prowess he also earned a spot on the all-state basketball team.

Upon graduation from Kiske, Taylor became a member of the U. S. navy. While serving aboard an aircraft carrier he was twice wounded and subsequently returned home. Taylor was anxious to get back into the football spotlight. He took a post graduate course at Fort Lauderdale, Florida, high school while trying to climb back to the 182 pounds that he weighed before entry into

the service. He showed he still had it as he was selected on the all-southeastern conference all-star team.

In the spring of 1944 he enrolled at Miami University where he made the starting lineup during spring practice. While in Florida he met Bobby Durham and Jack Musselman of the University of Nevada football fame. He told them of his

tentative plans to come west and play ball for the University of Southern California. Durham and Musselman persuaded him to stop at Nevada and look the situation over. He evidently liked what he saw since he went no further west. Taylor promises to contribute greatly to Nevada's bid for national football fame.

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# Thousand Volumes Presented to University Library

Gifts of three collections of books amounting to almost 1000 volumes have been presented to the university library during the summer months, James Hill, librarian, announced. The three collections were presented by Mr. and Mrs. Edmands, Dr. C. G. Laird and Mrs. W. O. Holmes.

More than 800 copies of miscellaneous volumes of fact and fiction were presented by Mr. Edmands in behalf of himself and his wife. Of particular interest regarding the Edmands collection are technical volumes some of which are more than 100 years old.

Dr. Laird presented 165 volumes of modern poetry to the library in memory of Mrs. Florence Laird.

Mrs. Holmes presented her personal collection of autographed first editions to the library in memory of her husband, Professor William O. Holmes, who died last February. The Holmes collection contains many interesting volumes including a copy of the "City of Trembling Leaves" by a Nevada author, Walter Van Tilburg Clark, about the city of Reno.

In addition to the three collections, a copy of the "Felix Mendelssohn Letters" was presented to the music library by John Erskine while he was in Reno this summer.

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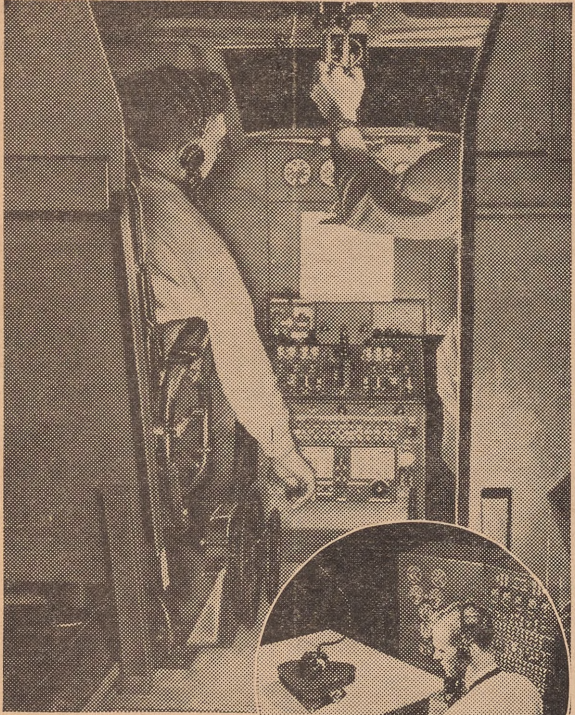
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
