Frolic skits will be limited to 10 minutes with minimum of eight. All scripts must be turned in by next Tuesday, stated Gen Siri, Homecoming committee chairman. Mrs. Margaret Von Fluee, who directed last year's Skit Parade, is in charge of the performance. Following the committee meeting with Mrs. Von Fluee next Tuesday, try-outs will be held for in-between act skits in the education auditorium.

Arrangements are underway to secure a larger auditorium because of the bigger show this year and anticipation of a larger audience. Formerly held in the Granada theater, last year the Skit Parade was presented in the Civic Auditorium.

John Bradley's orchestra will again accompany the Frolic. Aiding Mrs. Fluee with the Wolves Frolic are Jo Miller, Buck White and John Bradley.

In Herman Wedemeyer, St. Mary's possesses possibly the outstanding back on the coast this year. The Hawaiian lad needs no introduction to grid fans. He can pass, run and kick.

St. Mary's also has another Hawaiian player, Spike Cordiero, who can also run.

Nevada will have an advantage in weight in the starting backfield line. The quarter of the Pack backs tips the scales at an average of 192 as compared to the St. Mary's starting four of 170.

The forward line has an 18 pound advantage over St. Mary's front line. Nevada has no individual star to match Wedemeyer, but can boast of a fast set of tailbacks.

Ralph "Happy" Reed's passes, Lloyd Rude's punts, Darwin Farnsworth and Maurice Hageleen's runs will keep St. Mary's busy. Also confronting St. Mary's will be Buster McClure, Gus Cammarano, Max Dodge, Jack Dieringer, Jim Welin, Stan Kitchener and Matt Picini.

That all sums up what Coach Aiken probably was referring to when he stated that "the team that wins will have to score four or five times."

Coach Aiken, assistant mentor, Jack Lawlor, and the 53 players making the trip to San Francisco will leave early tomorrow morning.

One case of scarlet fever caused considerable excitement on the hill this week when students discovered that the university infirmary would charge for inoculations. Most students felt that the \$6 fee charged for medical service at the beginning of each semester should bear the expenses of the vaccine.

However, a university official in charge of the campus health committee cleared the situation yesterday. He explained that the students were being charged only for the serum for the inoculation which is very expensive. The materials and medical services are paid for by the university.

The official also pointed out that the inoculations were being given at a great reduction, as the same service off the campus would cost over twice the amount being charged at the infirmary.

If the shots were deemed necessary for all students, the university would order the inoculations and no charge would be made. As the situation stands, the shots are optional and students desiring them can have them at the reduced rate at the infirmary.

This medical treatment was required of the football team as the case of scarlet fever was among their ranks. Their shots were given free of charge and billed to the athletic department.

Showing a powerful running attack coupled with precise passing, the '45 version of the Nevada Wolf Pack shellacked the Redskins of Utah, 35-14. Scoring in every quarter, the Wolf Pack dominated the entire game with the exception of a third quarter drive by the "never say die" Utes which netted them two touchdowns.

Utah has devised a defense to stop the Pack's running offensive displayed against the Pocatello, Idaho, Marines. They pulled their line backers up close to bottle up "The Horse" Rude before he could put his explosive 200 pounds into high gear. Buster McClure, Nevada's play calling all-American tackle, crossed them up by calling wide sweeping end runs, quick opening drives through guard and tackle and a variety of pass plays. Farnsworth, Taylor, Hagleen and Rude tore through the openings for substantial gains.
