One case of scarlet fever caused considerable excitement

One case of scarlet fever caused considerable excitement on the hill this week when students discovered that the university infirmary would charge for inoculations. Most students felt that the \$6 fee charged for medical service at the beginning of each semester should bear the expenses of the vacine.

However, a university official in charge of the campus health committee cleared the situation yesterday. He explained that the students were being charged only for the serum for the inoculation which is very expensive. The materials and medical services are paid for by the university.

The official also pointed out that the inoculations were being given at a great reduction, as the same service off the campus would cost over twice the amount being charged at the infirmary.

If the shots were deemed necessary for all students, the university would order the inoculations and no charge would be made. As the situation stands, the shots are optional and students desiring them can have them at the reduced rate at the infirmary.

This medical treatment was required of the football team as the case of scarlet fever was among their ranks. Their shots were given free of charge and billed to the athletic department.
