Mackay Day queen candidates will be measured by women members of the committee instead of allowing individual groups to do it, Lyman Earl, chairman, said after a committee meeting last night.


This will eliminate ny chances for padding forms or using elastic tape measures. The Earl Carroll beauty charts will be completed on the six contestants this weekend.

regents at a meeting held April 12 making the geology depart ment a part of the college of engineering officials settled the question as to whether that department should be in the college of arts and science or in the college of engineering.

The action taken by the board was based on a rule in the university catalog which states that for general administrative work, the head of the department is in that college in which his major work appears.

Reasons affecting the change were many, said Prof. Jay Car-penter, director of the Mackay School of Mines.

Since all geology classrooms were located in the engineering building and since the department itself was so closely as-sociated with the Bureau of Mines and the Hunt fund, the regents decided in favor of the move.

Both the Bureau of Mines and the Hunt fund, which was established to finance inspection trips for the faculty and students and for summer field work in geology, are under the director of the Mackay School of Mines.

Though there are 400 students enrolled in all geology courses, they will not be affected by this recent change.

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
