

## Stag Night Plans Near Completion, Says Max Dodge

**Apostoli Feature Attraction On Best Card to Hit Reno in Decade**

With several rough and tumble inter-fraternity bouts being arranged this week, plans for the Block "N" Stag Night to be held May 8 at the university gymnasium are nearing completion, Max Dodge, Block 'N' president, announced today.

With a card featuring former middleweight champion of the world, Fred Apostoli, and boasting Golden Gloves and AAU champions the show should be the best to hit Reno in nearly a decade.

### Word Received

Word of Apostoli's acceptance of an invitation to box an exhibition was received last week-end after his third round knock-out of Bobby Volk in San Francisco.

Apostoli is the first big name in boxing to appear in Reno since 1934 when John Henry Lewis outpointed Tony Poloni at the rodeo grounds. Two years before that, Max Baer decided Kingfish Levinsky at the same spot.

### Strictly Stag

The annual boxing show, revived after three years of wartime inactivity, is strictly an all male function. With two weeks advance notice, all hale and hardy males are encouraged to go on a one night strike against the feminine sex and attend in force, Dodge added.

Other attractions being contacted to appear on the same show are such local "big names" as Dean Hubbard, Phelan Sampson, Moe Macias, Ivan George, Frank Winnemucca, Fred and Paul Williams, and others.

A free-for-all with several members of last year's football squad slugging it out blindfolded will be another attraction, Dodge concluded.

## Regents Settle Vexing Question

**Board Says Geology Dept. In College of Engineering**

Action taken by the board of regents at a meeting held April 12 making the geology department a part of the college of engineering officials settled the question as to whether that department should be in the college of arts and science or in the college of engineering.

The action taken by the board was based on a rule in the university catalog which states that for general administrative work, the head of the department is in that college in which his major work appears.

Reasons affecting the change were many, said Prof. Jay Carpenter, director of the Mackay School of Mines.

Since all geology classrooms were located in the engineering building and since the department itself was so closely associated with the Bureau of Mines and the Hunt fund, the regents decided in favor of the move.

Both the Bureau of Mines and the Hunt fund, which was established to finance inspection trips for the faculty and students and for summer field work in geology, are under the director of the Mackay School of Mines.

Though there are 400 students enrolled in all geology courses, they will not be affected by this recent change.

## System To Change, Says Dr. Moseley

A new system has been inaugurated governing the administration of departments, announced Dr. John O. Moseley, president of the university. The change, which will go into effect next semester, concerns the appointing of chairmen each new school year, to carry out the duties of the heads of the departments, instead of the former indefinite tenure of office.

Dr. Moseley pointed out that this was just a minor change in the original setup and not a radical move. Few, if any, departments will be affected by the new policy and it is believed that the experiment will help to alleviate the burden of work thrown on certain members of the faculty.

Under this arrangement, the department leadership will be placed on more or less of a revolving status. To insure equality for all those involved, salaries for the department chairmen and the professors are now on an equal scale so that there will be no embarrassment in case of a change within a department, Moseley said.

Tommy Kalminir, another fleet Independent, got off to a sizzling start to win the 100 in 10.3. ATO Smales and Bev Waller (Ind) were slow starting and placed second and third respectively. Kalminir also won the broad jump with a leap of 20-11.

"Butch" Smales upheld the family name by copping first place in the high hurdles.

John Subda of the Independents came from behind to win the 880 in 2:19.2. Orsie Graves repeated his 1946 mile win and cut down his time 15 seconds to 5:10.4. The two mile was a battle between Independent Flynn and Lambda Chi Fullstone (1946 winner) with Flynn winning in 11:53.
