The petition was submitted to the committee for appropriation at the assembly last Friday by Steve Stewart, a senior, and several other university students.

The petition began as a result of an unofficial committee organized by Dave Ryan, sophomore. Among the other students who made up the committee are John Hall, senior; Janice green, senior; Duane Urban, senior; Leroy Wilcox, senior; Dwight Powell, junior; Sue Casey, senior, and Dave Traitel, senior.

John Hall and Steve Stewart drafted the petition.

The text of the petition is as follows: Be it known that we the undersigned, students of the University of Nevada, are petitioning the Legislature of the State of Nevada to request that the legislative body now in session appro- sible subsequent retributive measpriate funds for an investigation ures.

> We wish further to ask that the following points be seriously considered, in order to assure that the investigation will be carried to a successful and effective con-

> 1. That the investigating group be impartial, disinterested, and from outside the State.

2. That all monies necessary to obtain the services of the said disinterested group and to insure the completion of its investigation be appropriated by the current session of the Legislature.

3. That the said disinterested group initiate action as soon as possible, in any event prior to the termination of the current scholastic semester at the University.

4. That all persons offering testimony in the investigative action be required to give said testimony under oath and that such persons be assured protection from pos-

### Tentative Construction Date Set For Fleischmann Agriculture School

By this time next year, final plans for th future Fleischmann school of agriculture and home economics should be completed and into the actual construction

Although present blueprinting is strictly tentative, it seems certain that main units of the schools made possible by the recent two million dollar Fleischmann grant will be located in the stretch between Evans avenue and the Engineering building.

nown as the Max Fleischmann College of Agriculture and the Sarah School of Home Economics, and, under terms of the grant, will probably consist of the following: husbandry department, research Home Economics. chemistry, soils and plant nutrition, agronomy and range management, agricultural economics, and life sciences. Several classrooms will also be included in this main unit which present plans indicate will occupy most of the future site of the school.

The exact location of the main unit and the home economics unit have not been definitely assigned. Present suggestions point to a central location for the main agricultural unit with the home economics unit adjacent to the engineering building or possibly in the present site of the president's home.

New greenhouses, also part of the Fleischmann construction, will probably be located near the main agricultural unit. One plan has the greenhouse on the Valley road farm, which is also due to receive improvements from the Fleischmann grant. The future greenhouse will supplant and effectively enlarge the present structure and is intended to provide adequate facilities for the various concerned departments.

> Before drawing up final plans, university and Fleischmann representatives together with architect Edward Palmer, plan to tour the Sacramento, Berkeley, and Davis, California soon to observe agricultural facilities. Later in the year, a commission will visit the universities of Oregon, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming and Washington State.

> The recent grant to the university by the Max C. Fleischmann foundation totals more than two million dollars, all to be channeled into construction.

The next meeting is on Thursday, March 24.



### Senate Discusses Student Union

Bill MacDonald, chairman of the Student Union committee, met with members of the ASUN senate Wednesday night in an attempt to prepare a final draft of the proposed Student Union constitution.

MacDonald pointed out to the senators that the money for the building would be forthcoming within the next two weeks, and that bids for the building's construction would be let immediately thereafter.

The building should be complete within a year after construction has been started.

### Five Dollars

A major point discussed at the meeting was that of the five dollar membership fee. The fee is to go into effect the semester immediately following the construction bids. This indicates that a membership fee will be paid before the building has been completed, but the money will be applied to the fund for furnishing the building.

Furnishing the building will be the responsibility of the students. The estimated cost is \$70,000.

A revised draft of the constitution will be presented to the various fraternities and sororities for approval at the next regular meetings. To date only one organization has approved the document.

Voting on the constitution will take place April 15, the date scheduled for primary elections.







### **Editorial**

### Anachronism

Senator Lovelock, a Republican of Washoe county, was one of the chief opponents to the Victory Heights reconstruction bill. Many backward universities have used the self-liquidating loan plan to house their married students but Senator Lovelock, a member of the education committee is adamantly against it.

His reasons seem to be (1) it is poor business to borrow for 40 years, (2) low cost housing encourages too-early marriages, (3) the state is under no obligation to help married stu-

Well, he may be right about the immorality of borrowing money. Much literature written in 1890 can be dug up to support his view. The cash nexus is much to be preferred to the installment plan and if the senator has a few loose grand the administration would probably accept the donation. Senator Lovelock must fear the length of time, too. After all, the tenants would have ample time to welch on the rent in forty years.

The theory that low-cost housing encourages too-tender youths to marry is fallicious through. Love laughs at legislation. (ow). No replacement for Victory Heights will not deter matrimony—it will deter education.

Another point the senator has is that the state is not obliged to help married students. This is a good solid philosophy and if the senator's views were only more widespread, government would certainly be simplified.

His logic operates like this: the state did not ask these people to marry; ergo, why should it accept the responsibility of helping them. Marriage, while it may be unfortunate, is not the fault of the state.

The senator's views should be applied to roads and highways. The state did not ask itc citizens to buy cars. Why should it build and maintain highways? Let them go to pot like Victory Heights.

The state did not ask people to have children. Why should it build schools? Offering low-cost education increases the birth rate and just adds to the problem.

Why help single students with dormitories? It is not the fault of the state that they seek an education.

In short, why have a government? Ah, that's it. We have to elect people to teach us rugged individualism, i.e., how to make the best of what we have without trying to better it.

Yes, Senator Lovelock knows good business. It is hoped that the people will think it good business not to re-elect (the Sagebrush seems to be babbling of elections here of late) a man whose political philosophy was archaic, old-fashioned, and absurd before Nevada became a State.


