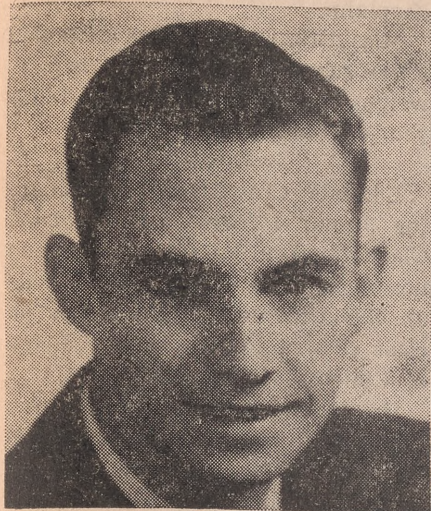
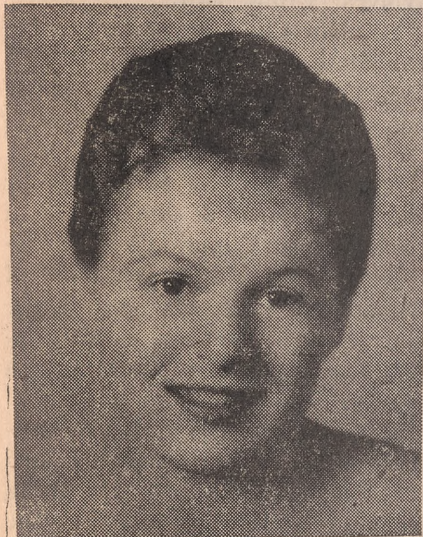


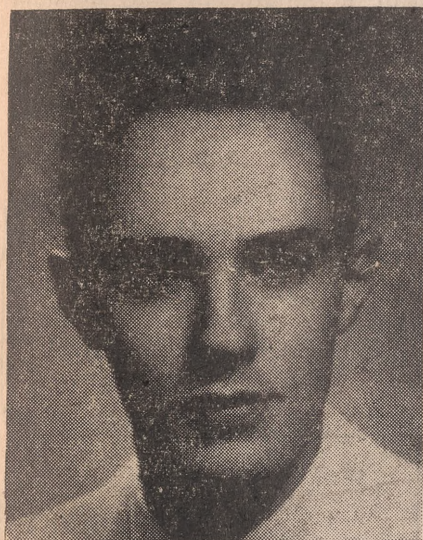

### Polish Student Grabowski Describes Guerilla Warfare and Underground

The Reno explosions and fire of February 5 made news behind the iron curtain. Paul H. Grabowski, a student at the University of Nevada, whose life story is as exciting as a movie scenario, received a letter from his mother in Poland containing a clipping of his story. She was anxious to learn if he had been injured.

The article appearing in "Glos Wyrzeza (Voice of the Coast)" stated that the explosions and fire in Reno had destroyed over half of the city, and that hundreds of people were injured. A picture of the Paterson sore in full flame was placed above the article.

"Glos Wyrzeza," a Polish united labor party newspaper, is printed in Gdynia, Poland, a Baltic seaport on the Bay of Danzig.

Grabowski, an unclassified student, plans to graduate from the University at the end of the 1957 summer session and enter a graduate school next fall. A political science major, he plans to do foreign relations work for the government after completing graduate school.

The Polish underground, Swedish merchant navy, and Russian concentration camps have all contributed exciting and dangerous events to Grabowski's life.

#### Guerrilla

The Polish underground was carrying on guerrilla warfare against the German army of occupation when Grabowski became a member in 1941. His first duties were that of a military courier.

Sent to Moscow with a message to deliver to General Sikorski, exiled Polish army officer, Grabowski was arrested by NKVD officers (Russian secret policemen). He was charged with

espionage and held for almost three years in various concentration camps, including one in southern Siberia. There he was forced to work in a coal mine and in the forests cutting timber.

In 1953, Grabowski managed to escape from a camp. He returned to Poland and re-entered the underground. He was admitted to the underground's officer candidate school, and after completion, became an ensign in the 34th Partisan Regiment whose headquarters were near Warsaw.

When the Germans were forced to withdraw from Poland by the invading Russian army in 1944, the Polish underground turned its efforts against the Red army, seeing in it a greater danger than the Germans. However, the Russians took complete control of the country, and the underground was forced to disband.

Grabowski was again picked up by the Russians in 1946, on the same charges of espionage. He was placed in prison at Siedce, Poland, a city near the Russian border. He was held there for five months, and just before he was to be transported to a Russian camp, he again escaped. This time he went to Sweden.

#### Sweden

In Sweden, Grabowski joined the merchant navy. He traveled to most of the seaports in western Europe. After a year of service he had saved enough money to enter school. He attended the Stockholm Technical Institute for two years, studying motor technical engineering.

While in Sweden, Grabowski applied for admittance to both Canada and the United States. His name came up on the Canadian

quota list first. Deciding not to wait for the U. S. quota to open, he left Sweden for Montreal. Late in 1950 he learned that his name had come upon the United States' quota list. He was able to enter the United States, and he joined the U. S. Air Force in 1951.

In 1952 Grabowski was sent to Stead Air Force base where he was an instructor in the survival training course. Since he had been unable to bring any of his records with him when he fled from Poland, Grabowski was unable to prove that he had a high school education. While at Stead he took night courses at Reno high school and got a diploma in 1953. He also received his citizenship papers while stationed at the base.

Immediately upon receiving his high school diploma, Grabowski applied for night courses at the University of Nevada. After completion of four years of service he was honorably discharged, and he entered the University as a full time student in the fall of 1955.

#### "Cross of Valor"

Grabowski earned the "Cross of Valor" while serving in the Polish underground. This medal is a decoration which can only be won on the battlefield or by extreme risks by a soldier. Paul earned it by leading a group that liberated prisoners from a Russian prison in Biala Podlaska, a Polish town near the Russian border. He was also wounded in both legs while serving with the underground.

Grabowski, born in Brodnica, northern Poland, in 1923, attended grade and high school in Warsaw, graduating in 1940.

Paul is married and has twin sons, Paul junior and Philip. His wife, Anita, teaches school in

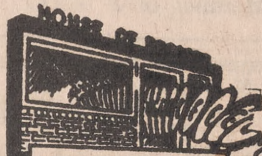
Dollinger was Freshman class

Sparks. Grabowski hopes that someday he will be able to bring his parents to the United States. He wants to "show them how democracy looks." He has one brother living in Poland, and another brother was killed by the Germans in 1943.

Paul's father works in Gdansk, (formerly Danzig) Poland, as a printer in a government printing shop. "Everything is run by the government," comments Grabowski in a disgusted tone. He feels that "Communism will some day be defeated. It is making some accomplishments, but it is too vicious a system to survive." He would like to return to Poland some day, but only for a visit, or maybe even to work for the government (U. S.) in that country.

"I'm an American now, and I am not changing," states Grabowski, "but I'm sentimental of course, and would like to see Poland improved."

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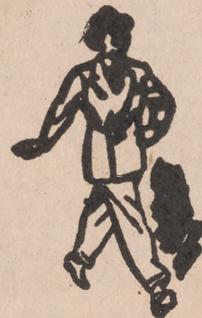
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## Rosemary Named LCA 'Sweetheart'

In a non-conference double-header March 23, Coach Lawlor's boys split the bill with Chico State. The Wolf Pack won one game 4-1 and dropped the opener 4-2.

Coach Lawlor was pleased by the pitching of his four hurlers in the opening series. They gave up only one walk between them in the two seven inning contests, and yielded only 11 hits.

John (Slugger) Flynn pitched the first four innings of the second game, getting credit for the win. Frosh Del Driver finished with three shutout frames as Nevada won 4-1.

Fred Jesser, hit by a pitched ball in the first inning, eventually scored on a fielder's choice. Flynn singled in the third, stole second

and third, and tallied on an error. In the fourth Jerry Tobin was safe on an error, and later was forced in via a walk. The final run came with aid of singles by John Miller and Roy Kidder in

the sixth. Chico's Harland Morley got the game's longest hit, a booming 475-foot triple, but was thrown out at home on a multiple relay, Lundergreen to Tobin to Jesser to Gardner.

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### RO Students Shot In Bacteria War

Most junior students began flinching last Monday as they dodged and ducked in an attempt to protect sore, swollen arms from fellow students.

About 36 third-year military students planning to attend the summer training camp at Fort Lewis, Washington started getting shots and vaccinations Monday. Captain Henry Clark, of the military department, said the stingers are given during class time by two Navy hospitalmen from the Nevada Naval Reserve center.

A total of four shots and one vaccination are given. The shots are for diphtheria, tetanus, and typhoid, plus the smallpox vaccination on Monday, March 25. Typhoid boosters will be given later on April first and eighth. To lessen the number of shots, the diphtheria and tetanus will be combined in one shot, as the typhoid and para-typhoid.

### Board of Regents Increased to Nine

The University of Nevada board of regents has been increased to nine.

New members are Cyril Bastian, Caliente rancher; Grant Sawyer, Elko district attorney; William Elwell, Las Vegas hotel owner; and N. E. Broadbent, Ely druggist.

The increase in board size was made possible by the Nevada legislature's passing of bill AB-342. Less than ten hours after the bill was signed by Gov. Charles Russell, the joint session chose the new members to the University governing body. Naming of the men came just three hours before the legal deadline for closing the sessions.

Enlargement of the board from five to nine was one of the recommendations of a survey team com-

posed of Western educators who investigated the University last year.

Both Mr. Sawyer and Mr. Elwell unsuccessfully sought election to the regents posts last November in the general elections.

The new members of the board now join Archie Grant, retired automobile agency owner, Las Vegas; Dr. Fred M. Anderson, of Reno, Dr. Louis Lombardi, of Reno; Bruce Thompson, a Reno attorney; and Roy Hardy, of Reno, a mining engineer, on the nine-man board.

The law provides that by 1956, the board of regents will have three representatives from Clark county, three from Washoe county, and the remaining three from the other sections of the state.

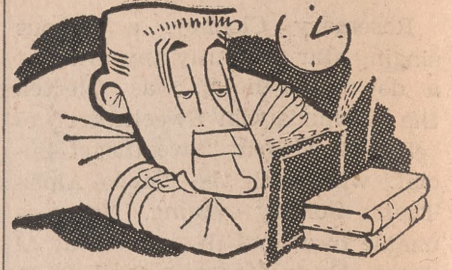
### Nominations Open Until April 4
