

Grabowski was again picked up by the Russians in 1946, on the same charges of espionage. He was placed in prison at Sieldce, Poland, a city near the Russian border. He was held there for five months, and just before he was to be transported to a Rus-

quota list first. Deciding not to wait for the U.S. quota to open, he left Sweden for Montreal. Late in 1950 he learned that his name had come upon the United Staes' quota list. He was able to enter the United States, and he joined In 1953, Grabowski managed to the U.S. Air Force in 1951.

In 1952 Grabowski was sent to Stead Air Force base where he was an instructor in the survival training course. Since he had been unable to bring any of his records with him when he fled from Poland, Grabowski was unable to prove that he had a high school When the Germans were forced education. While at Stead he took night courses at Reno high school and got a diploma in 1953. He also received his citizenship papers while stationed at the base.




