Preparations Underway For 44th Mackay Day

Traditional dress of the 1870's will be the backdrop for the 44th annual Mackay Day celebration honoring the King of the Bonanza, John Mackay, with four days of festivities beginning Wednesday night.

The spring celebration will include sorority and fraternity competition for song teams, and obstacle races, a beard growing contest, prizes for the best costumes of the Comstock period, exhibits by the Mackay School of Mines, a luncheon and the traditional ball at the Mapes.

Ron Logar, chairman of the celebration, announced that the voting for the queen will be held Wednesday in the Snack bar by the male students.

Open houses at the sororities Wednesday night will touch off the celebration, which will be climaxed Saturday night at the Mackay Ball when trophies will be awarded to the winning song teams, to the best man's and women's costume, and to the winners of the obstacle races. Three-foot revolving trophies will be awarded to the winning fraternity and sorority song teams for the first time this year. Dance attendance trophies will be given to the living groups having the most costumed members attending.

Announcement of the queen to reign over Mackay Day will take place at the assembly Wednesday at 11 a.m. in the old gym. The assembly is under the direction of Dick Bryan.

Also on the agenda Thursday is the annual physical education show under the direction of Art Broten. The show is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. in the new gymnasium.

Costume day on campus is Friday when students will appear in

the habit of the Comstock days. According to Logar, the traditional penalty for not wearing a costume is a dunking in the Manzanita laue.

Displays and contests will be staged by the Mackay School of Mines Friday. Ore exhibits will be up in the Mackay building, and rock blasting contests will be held.

Activity will reach a peak Saturday with the bear judging contest at 10 a.m., the luncheon and song teams at noon, the obstacle races immediately following the luncheon, and the costume dance at 9 p.m.

Judging for the thickest, reddest, blackest, longest and best trimmed beards will be under the direction of John Darrah and will take place in the education editorium. The queen will present the awards for the best beard at the luncheon.

Song teams from each sorority and frat will again compete for the best arrangement and presentation and will provide the entertainment for the luncheon.

Immediately following the luncheon students will don roller skates, tricycles, and swimming suits for the obstacle races. Bill Adams is in charge. Manzanita Lake will be the scene of the fraternity swimming contest and the other events will take place on the filed.

Nello Gonfiantini's band will play for the dance Saturday night which will begin at 9 p.m. in the Fable Room of the Mapes hotel.

The festivities will not end with the scheduled events as the "little wall" will be jammed with celebrants.

The statue of John Mackay in front of the quad, looking solemn and antiquated as it is, is the reason for the gaiety of Mackay Day.

Five Nominated For Queen

The Mackay Day Queen, who will reign over the entire annual Mackay Day celebration, will be elected Wednesday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Snack bar. All men students are eligible to vote with their ASUN student body cards.

The winner will be introduced for the first time as Mackay Day Queen at the Mackay Day assembly, Thursday at 11 a.m.

Candidates include one woman from each sorority and one representing the Artemisia-Manzanita Association. They are Beverly Ricketts, Pi Beta Phi, Gloria Urriola, Kappa Alpha Theta, Margie Orr, Delta Delta Delta, Jan Chiatovich, Gamma Phi Beta, and Jaque Hunt, candidate from Artemisia-Manzanita Association.

Candidates for Mackay Day queen are traditionally senior students. The campaign is conducted by the AWS council under the direction of Bonnie Stewart. The women competing for the title have been visiting the fraternity houses this week, and also appeared on a television program Wednesday. They were introduced in their old-fashioned costumes and the story of the Mackay family was briefly reviewed for the TV audience.

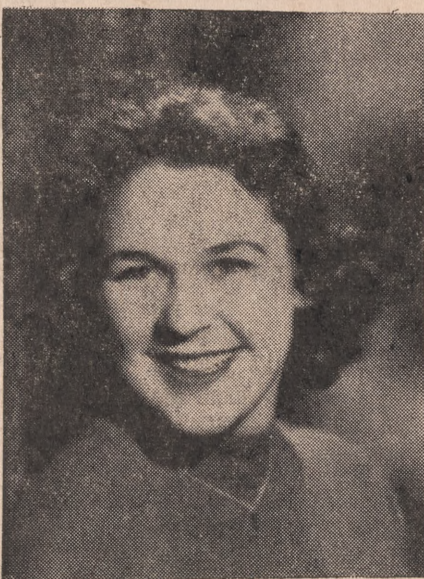
Sharon is a University song leader. She is a sports enthusiast and appreciates all kinds of music. Sharon also "part Indian."

A new policy for checking out books from the University Library will become effective next month, LaMar Smith, head of circulation, announced this week.

Books checked out after April 30 must be back in the library after two weeks. Two cents fine will be charged for each day the book is overdue. In the past students have been able to keep the books for an indefinite period of time. Only if someone else requested the book did it have to be returned before the end of the semester.

Grades are held up in the Registrar's office, and a student may not re-register if he has books out, Smith said, and urged that all books now out be returned by April 30. He added that the two-cent a day fining will begin about the second week of May.

School of Mines Holds Open House

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Hawks Hold Basketball Clinic

Basketball season may be over but the University of Nevada gymnasium resounded again with the sound of bouncing basketballs as the St. Louis Hawks, runners up in the professional basketball playoffs, conducted a coaching clinic for coaches and players from northern Nevada schools.

Alex Hanum, player-coach of the Hawks and former All-American in his collegiate days, introduced the players and filled in a brief background on each one. Heading the list of "little men," (under 6 feet 4 inches) was Slater Martin, 5 feet 10 inches, Med Park, 6 feet 2 inches, Jack McMahon, 6 feet 1 inch, Irv Bemoras, 6 feet 4 inches, and the outstanding rookie of the team, Cliff Hagan, 6 feet 4 inches.

The big men of the team led off with Charlie Share, team's tallest man at 6 feet 11 inches, "Easy" Ed Macauley, 6 feet 9 inches and basketball's leading scorer last year, Bob Pettit, 6 feet 9 inches.

In stressing the fundamentals of the game, Hannum had the individual players demonstrate their repertoire of shots to the amazement of the spectators. Hook shots, two-handed sets, one-handed sets and jump shots dropped through the net with the greatest of ease.

In emphasizing the basic principles of the game, the difference between intercollegiate and professional basketball was brought out in the rules and the style. Hanum pointed out that many finer points and techniques that seemed so easy in the professional game are too advanced for the high school and college player.

The techniques of team defense and individual defense patterns were stressed with emphasis on the practice of the maneuvers once they are learned.

A question and answer period gave second place in the National demonstrating the techniques that followed the clinic with the players Basketball Association final standings this past year.

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Constitutional Revisions to Be On Queen Ballot

The constitutional revisions will be on the Mackay Day Queen ballot Wednesday and not on the general election ballot, Chuck Coyle announced at student senate Wednesday night.

The revisions met mainly with approval from the students, senate members reported. Two added revisions were suggested however.

Tri Delt Nedra Norton proposed that freshman representation at leadership conference be provided.

Wuanita Combs of Gammi Phi suggested that senators from the colleges be chosen differently than at present, possibly by a complete college vote.

Possible drawbacks to a general college election in the Mackay School of Mines and the Engineering college were outlined. The civil engineers greatly outnumbered the electrical and mechanical engineers, and could control the college. The same problem might exist in the School of Mines, where the geology department is fairly large.

Coyle said he would turn the problem over to Ken Robbins and his constitutional revision committee. If they can work something up before next week, the changes will be presented to the senate for possible inclusion on the ballot, he said.

In other senate business, Coyle announced that the Washoe Medical Center has asked for help in its blood drive. Coyle said that six to 10 pints of blood from each organization would help considerably.

The Senate banquet will be held May 13, it was announced. This is a Monday night, but Coyle said he hoped he senators could be excused from their house meetings to attend.

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Basta Says Home, School, Cause Youth Problems

"The main problems of young people today are created in the home and school." This statement was made this week by Samuel M. Basta, counselor in student affairs at the University of Nevada.

Mr. Basta discussed the problems of youth before appearing as guest moderator for a panel of Sparks high school students last Thursday. Parents, teenagers, and youth officials met to discuss the problems of young people in this area.

Explaining the problem of juvenile delinquency before meeting with the panel, Mr. Basta said "if a young person does not gain the security and love that is necessary from the home and school, he seeks out this feeling of security by joining a gang made up of similar outcasts of society."

Explaining further the cause of juvenile and parental delinquency, Mr. Basta said that "materialism, the idea of keeping up with the Jones, along with overly publicized luxuries cause negligent Americans to seek material things for security rather than spiritual gains."

"It is only a small percentage of juveniles that cause the unthinking person to say that all young persons are hoodlums" said Mr. Basta. Further he explained that the percentage of bad youths today is not as overwhelming as it seems.

He said that the young persons who get into trouble today merely have bigger and better methods, such as the automobile, for their use in delinquency. As a consequence greater publicity is given to these anti-social acts of young people

Mr. Basta said that Professor Garold Holstine, dean of education, is planning a similar youth panel discussion in Downieville, California soon.
