After being carried from the field, Tyson remainded in the dressing room until an ambulance could be summoned.

RESPONSIBILITY

In a game as rough as football there easily can be injuries to players. Each player, as he takes the field, realizes that his chances for injury—slight or serious—are great.

In most schools at which football is played, steps are taken to have a doctor and an ambulance at the field and ready for immediate duty

Not so at the University of Nevada.

Saturday night the Wolf Pack opened its 1957 season. In the third quarter of the game, fullback Bill Tyson was injured. He suffered a nerve pinch in a vertebrae and was temporarily paralyzed.

For 10 minutes he laid on the field while "responsible" persons were looking for items one usually would have at his finger tips at an average game. They were looking for such off-beat items as a stretcher—and maybe even an ambulance.

Finally the injured player was carried from the field by members of the Nevada and Idaho State squads. The attending physician then sent for the ambulance.

Now, some might say the athletic budget just won't stand for the strain of such a useless bit of equipment as a stretcher —or such a useless thing as an ambulance.

If it is not a matter of budget, then the shameful display at last Saturday's football game is a matter of carelessness.

And carelessness which could result in even more serious in jury or death to a player is a terrible carelessness.

The problem must be laid to the feet of those in charge of the financial and policy matters in the physical education de-

Young men who play football for love of the game, for their school, or for whatever their reasons, are playing for their coaches and director of athletics.

These men owe it to their athletes and the student body to take necessary safety precautions so that the shameful exhibition which occurred Saturday night never again will happen while athletics are sponsored by this school.
